OVER THE COUNTRY.

The Cutchogue (L. I.) section markets nearly 100,000 bushels of potatoes a day.

Federal Judge Call, at Jacksonville, has declared Florida's anti-cigarette law unconstitutional.

Brazilian newspapers deny a projected South American alliance against the United States.

A subsidy has been raised to construct a telegraph line from Skaguay to Dawson, Alaska.

Daniel Coughlin, of Chicago, Ill., has forfeited his bond of \$15,000 for jury bribing, and is a fugitive from justice.

The twenty-seventh annual convention of the International Fire Chief's Association met at Syracuse, N. Y., Tuesday.

The Union Reform party of Ohio has put a State ticket in the field, headed by Seth H. Ellis of Warren County, for Governor.

Harry Ward was instantly killed by coming in contact with a live electric wire while at work in the basement of a Philadelphia church. When the news of his sudden death was borne to his aged father the latter also fell over dead.

The Mormons are not persecuted on account of their religious belief, but for evil deeds engendered by a want of religious belief. Their doctrines not only offend the morals of the people, but violate the laws of the land in which they live. No invasion of religious liberty should be countenanced anywhere, but immorality, in whatever form it appears, should be rebuked, and violation of the law should be punished. The Mormon elders are not promulgating the doctrines of Christianity, but are sowing the seeds of immorality and death. The people of the South will protect their homes against any such invasion just as surely as they will protect them against the rapist and the seducer.—Concord Times.

Is The Country Prosperous?

"Just think of it," exclaimed an employment agent in Chicago last Wednesday to a representative of the Times-Herald, of that city. "Six dollars a day for engineers to run threshing machines, \$4 a day for feeders, \$4 for good sack men, and \$2.25 and \$2.50 for common harvest hands, including board. This is the word from Minnesota and the Dakotas. There is no hoar about the figures. They are offered by good people with cash to pay. And yet the big farmers in the Northwest complain that they can't get hands to harvest their wheat." The same information comes from Duluth, Minn. A dispatch from that city says that the labor shortage in that neighborhood is greater than ever, notwithstanding the fact that wages have been raised, every inducement offered to workingmen, and even Indians brought in to help.

Among all the proofs offered that the country is prospering these facts are the most significant. They show that the good times have reached right down to the common laborer and that he is getting his share of the returns.—Philadelphia Press.

Accidental Shooting.

A few days ago Mrs. Levy R. Cherry who lives a few miles in the country was accidentally shot by her little boy. The mother and boy went into the barn to shoot a snake. Mrs. Cherry sprung the pistol with which she proposed to shoot the snake, but could not fire it. She handed it to the boy and told him the pistol was worthless, or would not shoot. Upon taking it the boy pulled on the trigger and it fired. The ball struck his mother just above the knee and made a flesh wound that was not serious.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

A Terrific Explosion.

Mr. T. H. Pritchard returned from Norfolk Tuesday. He had been down to see the result of the explosion of Hitch's mill. Mr. Pritchard says the loss will be from six to ten thousand dollars. He thinks it a wonder that more people were not killed. A boiler 16 feet long and 6 feet in diameter, weighing between three and four tons, was thrown 1,000 yards, Mr. Pritchard says, and a man standing within five feet of it was practically unhurt.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

STATE NEWS.

Happenings in North Carolina.

Robinson's circus will be in Winston Sept. 12th.

Druggists in Hickory have been prohibited from selling malt.

Col. Thos. W. Strange, of Wilmington, died Tuesday morning.

The Raleigh section had a considerable hail storm Tuesday evening.

The Free Press says a factory to prepare tobacco stems to be made into fertilizers will soon be in operation in Kinston.

As an inducement for people to pay their city taxes early, Raleigh Aldermen are considering the plan of giving one percent discount on all taxes paid during the month of September.

William Casey, of Surry county, got on his mule and started to church last Sunday morning. Some parties met him on the road and noticed that his head had dropped, and on going to him found that he was dead.

Carolina Beach cottagers were treated to a fine sight Sunday in the shape of an immense school of porpoises. There seemed to be several hundred of them and they came within an eighth of a mile of the shore.—Wilmington Dispatch.

Nearly all the banker ponies were drowned in the recent terrible storm on our coast. A gentleman from Beaufort told us this morning that one man counted fifty-two dead ponies within a distance of a few miles.—Goldsboro Argus.

About 12 o'clock Monday night Mrs. W. M. Matthews, of Mecklenburg county was found in her garden with her clothing on fire. She had been suffering mentally for some weeks and it is thought she got out of the house and set herself on fire. She died before she could be carried back in the house.

Complaints were made in Seattle, Wash., recently that the fire alarm system of the city was working very badly. Investigation of the boxes showed that "yellow jackets" had clogged many of them by deposits of clay, which had hardened. The wasps had crawled through the keyholes and built their fireproof houses.

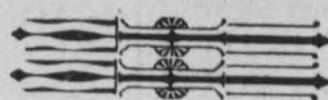

Alger says he is out of politics, but he talks like a man who is not satisfied with the situation.

We should send teachers to Manila, and not soldiers, says Mr. Bryan. The McKinley Administration responds to this sentiment by calling for ten more regiments of volunteers. The day of reckoning is, however, not far off.

Germany owes it to the world to speak out and tell the name of the real offender in the Dreyfus scandal, and it is believed that she will not permit Dreyfus to be sent back to Devil's Island without revealing the whole truth.

There is going to be no differences over the candidate at the next Democratic National Convention. By that time the party will be united and aggressive, and with it in that shape, there is an excellent chance for victory in the campaign which will follow.

Hobson, who is now at Manila, has suggested to the Navy Department to establish a Yard of Equipment and Repair at that place, but unless we intend to make our new acquisition the base of operations for wars with other nations, we will have no use for a Navy Yard at that place.

American prestige seems to be threatened by the action of Canada in insisting on an outlet from the Klondike on the Pacific coast. And unfortunately for this country, McKinley seems willing to compromise with England and give Canada a free port. It is all she has been working for.

Here is one of the latest stories about Admiral Dewey. They are becoming as numerous as Grant's jokes. It seems that Dewey, on his return from a cruise, was attacked with an abscess of the liver and had to stop over at Malta where he underwent a surgical operation. Some days afterwards one of the surgeons said: "It was too bad, Commander, to rob you of your liver as we did." Dewey replied: "Don't mention it. It gives me great pleasure to think that I shall never be so bilious again as I have been."

The troops in Cuba are coming home. Now, if the Government will only withdraw, the United States forces from Manila and permit the Filipinos to set up a Government of their own, we will have shown to the world, that our late war with Spain was a war for humanity and not for territory.

The Sultan of Sulu, one of the Islands of the Philippines, is a bigamist of the worst type, and when Mr. Roberts of Utah takes his seat in Congress next winter, it is on the cards that he will introduce a resolution for an investigation of the cause for the favoritism shown to the Sultan in permitting him to hold on to his wives.

Just at the time when there was a fair prospect of a decrease in the pension appropriations, along came a war with Spain, and now the war in the Philippines, which is adding every day to the pension list, for there are very few soldiers who participated in the Spanish war who have not already filed claims.

6,500,000 Of The Untried.

I believe now, and have always believed, that Bryan was elected on a fair count of the ballots; but if he was defeated it was by methods forbidden in morals, most corrupt in politics, and utterly subversive of good government—by unprecedented coercing of voters, by wholesale use of boodle, and by such debauchers of the suffrage as made honest men everywhere stand aghast.

But, nevertheless and notwithstanding all the odds we fought, thank God, there were 6,500,000 American freemen who could not be bribed, wheedled, or bullied into voting for the Republican candidates, and our peerless young leader received more votes than were ever before cast for a Democratic candidate for the Presidency and stands forth the foremost statesman of the age.

If we stand courageously and unflinchingly by the great principles enunciated in 1896 we will win a decisive victory for truth and right and justice and representative government, and will earn not only the approval of our own consciences, but the plaudits of lovers of liberty to the remotest generations; but if we abandon these principles, if we permit the time servers, double dealers, and practitioners of expediency to obscure these issues, or shunt them to the rear, we will not only lose but will be "damned to everlasting fame."—Champ Clark.

Pension Roll Decreasing.

The report of Commissioner of Pensions Evans, for the fiscal year ended June 30 last, shows a total disbursement of \$138,253,923, leaving a balance of \$1,857,188 in the Treasury, out of the \$140,000,000 appropriated. The total number of pensioners on the roll June 30th was 991,519, a decrease of 2,195. There were 10,991 names added to the roll and 43,186 dropped.

The report shows the pension roll is decreasing. Of those dropped 34,345 were because of death, and 8,841 because of re-marriage, minors attaining their majority, failure to claim pension and other causes.

The war with Spain brought a total of 16,986 claims, of which number but 295 have been allowed. —Washington Dispatch.

The Philadelphia Press gravely inquires, "What has become of the whistling boy?" The time was, it says, when whistling was an audible expression of every passing mood; grave or gay, and when it was a solace in sorrow, a satisfaction in pleasure and a support in difficulties. Now it is changed and the blithesome whistle of the boy is seldom heard. Anyone who has ever tried to whistle with a cigarette in his mouth will understand the difficulties under which the average American boy labors to sustain the reputation of his forefathers.

Uncle Sam's Only "Tip."

Tips given to Pullman car porters by government employees while performing official duties are considered legitimate charges against Uncle Sam. They are the only tips which are accorded this distinction. This interesting fact has just been gleaned through the display by a government official of a bill of expenses which he intended to present for a recent trip which he made in the service of the government. He exhibited the statement as an evidence of the close manner in which the government did business. He had to present a receipt for every expenditure made, even a receipt from the Pullman car conductor for his berth.

The only item for which there was no receipt was "Tips, 50 cents." When asked what the tips were for, the officer said: "They were tips which I gave to Pullman car porters. The government allows those, but they are the only tips which are allowed. If I tip the waiter at my hotel or the man who carries my bag, the tip comes out of my pocket, but the tipping of Pullman car porters, a quarter for each journey made on a sleeper, is such a recognized custom that the item for such tips is always allowed by the government to officers when traveling on government business."—New Orleans Times-Democrat.

How Emery Is Quarried.

Emery comes from the island of Naxos, in the eastern Mediterranean, whence it has been exported for the last two centuries or more. The beds are in the northeast of the island, the deposits descending into some of the neighboring islands, the emery being found in lenticular masses, resting on layers of schist in limestone almost identical with Parian marble, the finest marble known, which comes from the island of Paros, close by.

There are about 300 men engaged in the trade, all of whom have to be married before they are admitted to the fraternity. The material is much too hard to be dug out or even blasted. Great fires are lighted around the blocks till the natural cracks expand with the heat, and levers are then inserted to pry them apart. This system is continued until the blocks are reduced in size to masses of a cubic foot or less, and they are then shipped as if they were coal. There are said to be 20,000,000 tons yet available at Naxos, and the last reported year's export was 3,950 tons. It is one of the hardest substances known.—Ironmongery.

Don't Put a Bird in the Window.

"Never put a bird in the window," said a bird fancier to the reporter the other day. "I rarely go into the street in summer, or even on a mild day in winter, that I do not see unfortunate canaries hung in the windows. Even if the sun is not broiling the brains under the little yellow cap, a draft is blowing all the time over the delicate body. People have been told a thousand times that they must not put a bird in the draft, yet how few remember that there is always a draft in an open window."—Bertha (M.D.) Herold.

to teach this element of education
