The Mississippi Democratic state convention endorsed the Chicago platform and Wm. J. Bryan as the "greatest exponent of those principles." Three states have spoken for Bryan during this month.

Gen. Otis may find that by keeping the Administration in the dark regarding his proceedings, he has stirred up trouble for himself. As long as it was only the people who were flouted and hoodwinked the Administration did not care.

When it was finally announced that Thos. B. Reed had filed his resignation to take effect Sep. 4, a great big sigh of relief went up from the administration. But Amos Allen, his probable successor will continue the fight against expansion.

The Associated Press correspondent at Manila says "The censor writes stereotyped official phrases and adjectives into the dispatches, tending to magnify the American operations and to minimize the opposition." This explains why the reports appear so one-sided, and yet the war does not end.

O. H. P. Belmont of New York, now that Croker has punctured Van Wyck's boom is being actively pushed for the second place with Bryan. He is very wealthy, believes the silver question is one for Congressional rather than Executive action, strongly favors an income tax, and is against expansion.

Nebraska Democrats, Populists and Silver Republicans met in separate conventions at Omaha and nominated ex-Gov. Holcomb for Supreme Judge. Mr. Bryan was a delegate in the Democratic convention. Ex-Senator Allen could have had the nomination, but withdrew in the interest of harmony. The Democratic platform declares uncompromisingly for free silver at the ratio of 16 to 1.

The committee appointed by the Legislature to investigate the management of the penitentiary and State farms, is vigorously carrying on its work and is exposing the rottenness and inefficiency of the late fusion crowd. In addition to this the examination of the Roanoke farms discloses the most cruel and barbarous treatment of prisoners by the supervisors. The developments are shocking.

Where The Editor Rises Superior.

It is the exceptional editor who will lay claim to 'superiority over all mankind, who will claim to be proof against all temptations of the world, the flesh and the devil.

No profession in the world should be more given to cynicism, be more proof against the calls of charity, than the editorial profession.

"Accept all men as liars" might not be an inappropriate motto for an editor's sanctum, for truly against him are practised every keen male or female wile that is known or can be invented.

But however much the burden of the community may be, no matter how deep and important may be the secrets which are intrusted to his individual self, the editor is usually found to be the safe man of the community; no matter how poor he may be, funds are safe in his hands, for while he may be hungry and illy clothed, yet he is honest.

And in spite of oft deceptions, who is more liberal than the editor?

It may not be money, for this may not be his, but in giving free space in his paper, in giving his time to advance private interests or community interests, who is so prodigal as the editor?

But in rising above the little, men, petty actions of the world, is seen the special phase of the editor's superiority.

How many hundreds of opportunities are presented to the average editor where he might give way to human weakness and be personally benefitted at the expense of some one, and yet he does not.

An illustration in point, and the Journal asks pardon of the gentleman mentioned for the personal illustration, is that of Benjamin Bell, one of the editors and proprietors of the Wilmington Messenger.

Mr. Bell a day or so ago while attempting to board an electric car in his city, slipped and fell upon the pavement, dislocating his elbow and sustaining a severe fracture of the same arm, lower down.

In cases similar to this, the ordinary citizen would at once lay the full blame of the accident to the electric car company, and claim damages for injuries received.

It is always easy to sue corporations, and not usually difficult to secure a verdict when persons are injured; however contributory to the accident the injured person may be.

But Mr. Bell, as would most editors under like conditions, frankly acknowledged the accident was his own fault, and held the conductor of the car as blameless.

Take into consideration all accidents which have happened to editors, and how many of them have been brought to court for trial, and how many damage suits for personal injuries can be named as pending where editors are plaintiffs against corporations?

Here is where the editor shows his superiority over mankind, generally, in being perfectly honest, and not seeking to get personal benefits because the situation may favor him, and this regardless of the merits in the case.

This superiority of the editor does not appeal to the ordinary every day citizen, nor is this spirit of sincerity always made public, and if published it is seldom recognized and appreciated, nor does the editor receive due credit for those every day actions which bespeak the man and the good citizen. —New Berne Journal.

No Success Without Love of Work

"To win success in any vocation, the present day, requires hard, persistent, conscientious work, the best equipment that is possible, and the employment of every resource that can be commanded," writes Barton Cheyney, in a valuable article on "The Young Man and the Professions," in the September Ladies' Home Journal. "Even the young man's manner, his personality, is a factor that makes itself felt in his work, while executive ability and good, hard common sense are elements of genius that should never be lacking. The young man should clearly understand in advance that if he does not have the capacity or love for work there is no profession in which he can win success. But having this, he will find great opportunities to make a name for himself and to earn larger pecuniary rewards than men have ever before been able to coin out of their brains."

The following from the Laurinburg Exchange merits the careful attention of our farmers:

"The 12,000,000 bale prediction is rather discouraging, but we believe the farmers could realize a better price for their cotton than they usually do, if they would pay more attention to the picking. Usually the farmers are very particular in looking after the planting and cultivation of the crop, but when harvesting time comes, they turn loose in their fields a gang of reckless pickers, a great many of whom are children, and pay no attention to them. In their desire to have all they possibly can when weighing time arrives, they rush over it, mixing with the cotton, burs, leaves, sand and all manner of trash and when the cotton is brought to market the result is a lower price than it should be.

"The price is going to be low enough at the best and let every man stay in his field with his hands and see to it that his cotton is picked free from trash."

The man whose house is the best in the land, whose town is the best in the country, whose state is the best in the union, whose nation is the strongest in the world is a good citizen—whether he is a resident owner, a mechanic, a school teacher or a day laborer. He will do his trading at home, even if he does have to pay a little more. He will take his home paper, even if it is a size or two smaller than the big city papers. He will always say a good word for his home town and stand by every enterprise it may champion; he will be loyal to every education cause adopted in it and work for the success of the same in preference to that outside. Then as a reward for all this he will have prosperity and the highest regard of his neighbors.—Durham Sun.
