FROM FAR AWAY LANDS.

Walter Pender Writes an Interesting Letter of His Cruise.

Saturday night, 26th, Mr. D. D. Overton received a letter from Mr. W. I. Pender, one of the crew of U. S. S. Marblehead that is now on a cruise around the world. Mr. Overton turned the letter over to THE REFLECTOR to make some extracts from, and while it is largely of a personal nature there is much in it of interest to Walter's host of friends here in Greenville.

The letter was written from Talcahuano, Chile, dated July 15th, showing that it required one month and eleven days to reach its destination, having traveled thousands and thousands of miles enroute.

It bore two postage stamps, one yellow in color for 10 cents and one blue for 5 cents. There was also a collect postage notice for 10 cents that Mr. Overton had to pay here.

Walter starts out by speaking of just receiving a letter from Mr. Overton and "Uncle Leon" (Mr. L. H. Pender) the night before, which letters bore date of May 26th, and contained the first news he had heard from the United States since he left Kingston, Jamaica, in March. Seventeen letters were awaiting him at Talcahuano. He says every move now brings him nearer to the "only country" in the land of the living and he longs for the time when he can once more greet his friends in Greenville. He expects this time to be next spring when he will have a three months furlough from March to June. Now to quote from the letter:

We have had a smooth voyage so far, could not have wished for any better, only we have had very little liberty. We had none at all in Brazil owing to yellow fever and smallpox. At Montevideo, Uruguay, was our first, and there we lost twenty-two men, but we learn that the Montgomery picked most of them up. She is coming on our same route.

Uruguay is a pretty country, also Brazil, but most of Argentine is desolate and the lower part infested with cannibals and heathens. Our passage through the Straits of Magellan was very exciting. The scenery was grand. We stopped at Punta Arenas for coal. There it was very cold, everything covered with snow, in fact all the way from Montevideo here. When we came to anchor for the night, as we had to do in both the Straits of Magellan and Smith, some of the

Patagonia Indians would spring up from the deep gorges and paddle out to see us in their skin boats. These boats had fire in the centre around which the dogs would huddle and the children boil water, while the men and women begged us for clothes, etc., especially tobacco and whiskey. (The latter was not furnished for I judge some on here wanted it worse than they did.) They did not look like human beings—dirty, with black hair hanging around their shoulders in a million kinks that had never seen a comb, and no clothes on. We threw them some clothes and it was lots of fun to see how they would tug to get them on. I don't see how they could stand all that snow and cold. They are the laziest class of people on the globe, and nothing more than cannibals.

Chile had a man of war wrecked in there not long ago and those of the crew who got off in life boats had a hard fight with those Indians, and would never have been saved but for a German steamer that happened along just in time to save them. They would have been killed and eaten. It is a dangerous passage through there, as the channel is very narrow, and high mountains arise from the water's edge, some barren rock and others very dense. It looks as if you were in a bay and can't see how you got in or how you are going to get out. That is why the ships cannot run at night. There are so few anchorages going through some 35, 40 and 80 miles apart, that some days we anchored at noon. No bottom can be found except at these points. Just think of the depth of water under you and such high mountains on each side with nothing visible but the sky overhead. It is a wonderful passage.

We entered the Pacific at the northern entrance of Concepcion Gulf. For the first twenty-four hours out we had quite a rough time, a heavy swell on the sea causing the ship to roll as if she did not intend to return to an even keel, while she could run only half speed.

We saw lots of seals through the Straits and fine furs at Punta Arenas were very cheap.

When we go ashore it would be so much more entertaining if we could talk to the people. I have met some one in every place whom I could understand. In Montevideo I had an old negro to talk for me, he was from New York. I did not succeed so well here there-

fore have been ashore only once. It is nothing but rain day and night and the country is flooded. Besides there is not much to be seen as this is only a naval station built around the harbor on the mountain side.

It is only a half hour's ride by rail to Concepcion, so we go there. It is quite a nice little city and the trip affords a nice view over the mountains. The people have queer habits and are very lazy. Houses are small, floor laid on the ground, no chimneys, an oven in the centre of the room to furnish heat and candles for lights. The poorer class are dirty looking and wear a horse blanket with a split in the centre to stick their heads through and let it drop to their shoulders. It is amusing to see the big ox carts, a man walking in front with a long pole, one end resting on the yoke. Which ever way he wants to go he puts the pole against the ox on that side. For \$5 of our money we get \$16.50 of theirs in exchange, so you can figure up how much it cost me in our money to mail this letter.

Tomorrow is Sunday, and I know you will enjoy a good sermon from Brother Watson. Wish I could be there as I have not been to church since I joined the navy. The last sermon I heard was in Greenville and am afraid I will not hear another until I return. Sunday is no more than any other day with us, except when in port, and then we have to stand regular watches.

Yes, I am traveling much this year. We left New York on the 2nd of March and made a six thousand miles cruise through the West Indies. Then started out on this thirteen thousand miles run and expect to end that sometime in September. Don't know where we will go then, to Manila I suppose. We leave here on 17th, stop at Valparaiso for a day or so, then sail for Callao, Peru, where we may stay ten days. I am going to the capital, the ancient city of Lima. We may stop at Iquique, Chile, and at Esmeraldas, Ecuador, thence a run to Quito the capital.

I am keeping a daily diary so that when my cruise is over I can write it up with all the dates, etc.

In his letter Walter mentions many of his Greenville friends by name and sends his best wishes to all. He expressed regret at hearing of our fire (May 4th) and expressed the hope that the town would soon rebuild much nicer than ever.

MURDER NEAR WILSON.

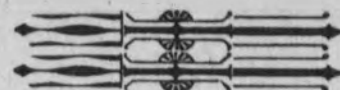
Prominent Citizen Assassinated on the Highway.

Wilson, N. C., Aug. 29.—Capt. Calvin Barnes, a prominent citizen of Wilson, was assassinated on the public highway about half past seven o'clock, Monday evening, within half mile of town. Capt. Barnes was in a buggy returning from his farm, and was accompanied by two little grand-children. The shot came from the side of the road, struck him in the left shoulder and passed entirely through the body. He died at 2:30 o'clock this morning. A negro suspected of being guilty of the murder has been arrested and is held pending investigation.

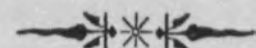

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.
Washington, D. C., Aug. 28, '99

Have we, as a people, anything to gain by joining hands with Great Britain in a Napoleonic policy of world-conquest? Although the administration is at present carefully concealing any disposition it may have to enter upon such a policy, the disposition is believed to exist, and that question may become a leading one in next year's Presidential campaign. In diplomatic circles it is believed that the first steps towards such a policy have already been taken, and that the suspension of Dr. Bedloe, as United States Consul at Canton, China, at the request of the government of China, is one of them, although it is stated at the State Department that the suspension of Dr. Bedloe was brought about by some irregularity in connection with his issuing papers to an American vessel engaged in supplying arms and ammunition to the Filipinos and in issuing certificates to Chinese merchants trading with the Philippines.

The present attitude of greatness occupied by the United States was attained by following from the days of Washington a policy of strictly attending to our own affairs and leaving the people of other nations to do the same. The glamour of foreign conquest has turned the head of the people of other nations many times in the past, and a few months ago there appeared to be danger that Americans would be blinded by the same glamour, but the common sense for which Americans are renowned, has come to the rescue, and our people are realizing not only the meaning, but the danger of the adoption of an imperialistic policy by the United States, and present indications are that that realization will result in a restoration of the democratic party to power, and a resumption of the only safe foreign policy for this government to follow.

Men who at the beginning supported the expansion policy of the administration, are now severely criticising the results obtained by following that policy. For instance, the Washington Post, which has to all intents and purposes been an expansion sheet, says editorially: "Either we have not the genius and the temperament for successful colonization, or we have been grotesquely unfortunate in the selection of our agents. It is impossible to see at this moment where and in what respect we have accomplished anything important either in Cuba or in the Philippines. In the latter we have undertaken to set up the regime of law and order and civilization, and we have failed utterly. In the

case of Cuba we have undertaken to give the people self-government, or at least to test their capacity in that line, and we have done neither. In the Philippines we have for six months or more been engaged in a petty and perfectly fruitless war with the natives. In Cuba the government consists of a military autocracy, little if any more beneficent than that conducted by the Spanish Governor Generals in times of peace. In Luzon it is actual war we have upon our hands. In Cuba, it is smouldering discontent, turbulence in various parts of the island, and a fatuous and feeble tyranny at Havana."

Two designs for the new \$5 silver certificate, one having upon its face a vignette of Washington, and the one of Jefferson have been submitted to Secretary Gage. It is said that a republican Senator heard about this and at once hurried to see Secretary Gage to tell him not to adopt the Jefferson design, because, if he did, it might become known as a democratic note. Be that as it may, Treasury officials say that the Jefferson design is not likely to be adopted.

The prediction that all of the 35,000 volunteers, authorized by Congress would be enlisted, has been almost verified. An order for the enlistment of one more additional regiment which will bring the number of volunteers nearly up to the limit, has been issued by Secretary Root, and the new regiment will be composed of negroes. The officers will be white men.

Notwithstanding the statement of Secretary Gage that the Treasury would be able to meet all of the expenses incidental to the large army we are preparing to send to the Philippines, in addition to other governmental expenses, without asking Congress to impose new war taxes or issuing more bonds, expert financiers who have carefully studied the matter, and whose opinions are not influenced by political exigencies, still predict that more bonds or more taxes will be necessary, and when it is remembered that there was a deficit of \$90,000,000 in round figures, at the close of the last fiscal year, the prediction seems reasonable. It may also be mentioned that special agents of the Internal Revenue Bureau are known to have been engaged for months in investigating the working of the various stamp taxes, presumably with an eye to more Congressional legislation in that direction.

Philippine women are inordinarily fond of jewelry, but at the same time show excellent taste in the matter of design and display. Those of the wealthy classes often order pieces to be made and sent out by the best Parisian firms at enormous expense; but in the way of its exhibition no criticism could be made except, perhaps, at a dance, and then the profusion of glitter is sometimes a trifle bewildering, and conducive to monetary estimates.—Woman's Home Companion.

Dallas, Tex., is making preparations for a big celebration to be held on October 5 next, the occasion being the return to Terry's Texas Rangers by the State of Indiana of the battle flag which was taken from the former in the civil war. Governor Mount, of Indiana, will present the flag to Governor Sayres, of Texas, who in turn will present it to Colonel J. I. Weiler, formerly a resident of Indiana, who captured the emblem. Weiler will then turn it over to some member of the Rangers. It has been decided to present two large silken banners to the Governors in honor of the event.

How to Stop Worrying.

"The usual way people set about stopping worry is a wrong one," writes Mary Boardman Page in the September Ladies' Home Journal. "That is why it is so unsuccessful. If a doctor tells a patient he must stop worrying, the patient is likely to say impatiently: 'Oh, Doctor, don't I wish that I could! But I can't. If I could have stopped worrying a year ago I would not be ill now!'—all of which is probably perfectly true. And the doctor does not always know how to help him, because both doctor and patient have an idea that it is possible to repress worry through an effort of the will. This is a mistake. It is not possible to repress worry. You have got to replace it with something else.

"Let me illustrate this by a figure. Suppose you were to go into a completely dark room, wishing it to be light. How would you set about the work? Would you try to scoop the darkness up in buckets and carry it out at the door? Not at all. You would just open the windows and shutters and let in the blessed sunlight. You would replace the darkness with light. So it is with worry. The only possible way to get rid of it is to replace the worry attitude of mind with the non-worry attitude. And this can always be done when the person is sincere and patient in his desire to bring it about. All he has to do is to be passive and let Nature have her own perfect way with him."

Every year the Treasurer of the United States is called upon to redeem millions of bank notes, which have become badly worn as a result of constant handling. During the fiscal year recently closed Treasurer Roberts gave new bills in exchange for old to the amount of \$290,000,000, breaking the record of the last six years. This is an indication that, with the return of prosperity, money is in free circulation.
