STATE NEWS.

Happenings in North Carolina.

Mrs. Nancy Halliford, who lives near Ellenboro, in Rutherford county, is 118 years old and is still enjoying good health.

Rev. E. D. Brown, pastor of the Kinston Presbyterian church, was elected moderator of the Albemarle presbytery, which convened in Oxford Tuesday. Reports of the proceedings of the presbytery say he presided with modest dignity and courtesy. The next meeting of the presbytery will be held in Washington.—Kinston Free Press.

A daughter of W. R. Massey, near Monroe, about 20 years of age, left home one morning last week to go alone to her brother-in-law's home, less than a mile away. Not returning home by the next day some member of the family went over to ascertain the reason, when it was found that the young lady had not been there. The neighborhood was aroused and began a search, but without finding any trace of the missing lady.

Two Good Sermons.

Rev. J. N. Booth, who has accepted the pastorate of the Baptist church here, to begin the first of October, came to Greenville Saturday evening and occupied the pulpit of the church Sunday morning and evening. There was a large congregation at the morning service, and it was even larger at night, the house being full. Both of Mr. Booth's sermons were excellent and greatly enjoyed by his hearers.

LIBERTY OPENED.

First Sale at New Warehouse.

Notwithstanding they were not entirely ready for business, not having all the roof on and no skylights in, the Liberty Warehouse was forced to have a sale today. So many farmers came along with a load and drove right in the house that something had to be done to accommodate them, and it was decided to unload the tobacco and have a sale anyway. About 25,000 pounds was sold.

Mrs. Dr. Brown Dead.

Mrs. Jane M. Brown, wife of Dr. W. M. B. Brown, died at 2 o'clock this afternoon at their home on corner of Fourth and Cotanch streets. Mrs. Brown was born April 14th, 1825, making her age 74 years, 4 months and 27 days. Her health had been poor for sometime. She had been confined to her bed for four weeks, and for a few days past it was seen that the brittle thread of life must soon be broken. All her family were summoned to her bedside and they watched anxiously, expecting yet dreading the moment when one so dear to them should be taken away. The end came peacefully, calmly, and her gentle spirit was borne to God who gave it.

Mrs. Brown was a daughter of the late Mr. Charles Greene. She was married to Dr. Brown Nov. 1st, 1854. She leaves a husband and six children, Mrs. L. V. Morrill, Dr. Zeno and Messrs. W. L., W. B., James and Wiley Brown. She was also a sister of Mrs. Henrietta Williams.

Mrs. Brown was a member of St. Paul's Episcopal church, a kind, Christian woman, loved and esteemed by all who knew her. There are many who mourn her death, and who sympathize with the children and the aged husband in their bereavement.

The burial will take place Tuesday afternoon in the Episcopal cemetery.

It certainly is gratifying to read the reports of so many schools beginning the present term with the best attendance in their history. This is so here at home, as THE REFLECTOR has already told its readers, and from reading our exchanges we see that the same is true all over the State. There is hope for the people that takes interest in education, and this increased interest now being shown in the schools indicates that North Carolina is going to change her position in the column of illiteracy as compared with other States.

Is 8-Cent Cotton in Sight.

The general advance in the price of all products except cotton, suggests that this one staple alone cannot, in the very nature of things, fail to be benefitted by the general advance.

Is 8-cent cotton in sight?

This question is asked by the Atlanta Constitution. We sincerely hope so. The Constitution says the above question is not merely asked because it is its desire that such price should be reached, but because of assurances which it has that the spinners, through whose hands it has to go in order to reach the world, could afford to pay that price for it and still make good profit. The natural market price for any raw material is that which leaves a sufficient margin for handling in its manufactured state.

That this condition has been reached in regard to cotton, is admitted by those best qualified to know, and hence the time has come for the farmer to get his dividend of the public surplus.

If 8-cent cotton should materialize, it will set in motion the greatest business revival we have experienced in years. The strongest whip the bears have held over the cotton farmers was that of debt. If our merchants and bankers will but stand in with our farmers during the next few months, a period of great prosperity will be assured to the south.—Concord Times.

A Sensible Grand Jury.

Baltimore, Sept. 8.—The grand jury for the May term, upon being discharged today by Judge Dobler, in the Criminal Court, made the following suggestion in its report: "The punishment of death, whether judicially or illegally carried out, would be considered the most effective punishment for rape which could be inflicted; it having failed, however, in its results, we would suggest castration and imprisonment in all cases of conviction, instead of hanging.

"This punishment, unquestionably, will prevent the criminal

from again committing this crime, and he will become a marked object and a living warning, which we think will cause others of the same brutal propensities to hesitate before they give way to their passions."

An interesting case was brought before the board of commissioners of Cumberland county at Fayetteville this week, and so far as we have seen it has not yet been decided. It seems that several churches and charitable institutions down there (the Knight of Pythias among the latter) have bought and own valuable property which they rent, but the claim exemption for taxation because the property is owned by churches and charitable institutions. We don't know how these cases will be decided but we are clearly of the opinion that all property owned by churches or charitable institutions, except that immediately occupied by such institutions, should be taxed just as other property is taxed. We do not believe there is any justice in allowing these institutions to accumulate valuable property and receive an income from it and then escape taxation.—Statesville Landmark.

NOTES FROM THE CAPITAL.

The mutiny on the United States Transport, Senator, brought about by the attempted introduction of canned roast beef as a ration calls to mind the fact that this "beef question" was not settled by the whitewashing investigating committees appointed by McKinley, and that the real truth will not be known until Congress has thoroughly ventilated the matter this winter.

The favoritism shown to Admiral Sampson during and since the war with Spain is once more made prominent in his assignment to command the fleet that will formally welcome Admiral Dewey to his native shores. Schley is still kept out of an important command, notwithstanding he is senior in rank.

The acquisition of the Philippines adds to our already large stock of race problems.

Attorney General Griggs is still placidly waiting for the return of Captain Carter's attorney from his European vacation trip, and in spite of the sentence of the court martial, Captain Carter still wears his uniform and draws full pay.

It is strange that the Filipinos question our motives when Senator Carter, of Montana, tells them and tells the American people that our attitude towards the islands depends upon whether enough can be squeezed out of them to make them pay us.

The original McKinley man who was removed in Alabama to provide a soft snap for President McKinley's cousin, naturally fails to see that it is impossible to provide for all the Ohio men in Ohio.

A consignment of dynamite guns has been sent to Gen. Otis at Manila. Now if the Filipinos will only be kind enough to step up to the muzzles and get killed, the thing will be easy.

An interesting experiment. That the earth revolves on its axis can be proved by a simple experiment. Fill a medium sized bowl nearly full of water and place it upon the floor of a room that is not exposed to jarring from the street. Upon the surface of the water sprinkle a coating of lycopodium powder. Then take powdered charcoal and draw a straight black line two inches long upon the coating—the line should be north and south.

After this is done lay upon the floor a stick so that it will be exactly parallel with the charcoal line. Any stationary object in the room will answer as well, provided it is parallel with the line. If the bowl is left undisturbed for several hours, it will be seen that the black mark has turned toward the parallel object and has moved from east to west, in a direction opposite to the movement of the earth on its axis.

This proves that the earth in revolving has carried the water with it, but the powder on the surface has been left a little behind.

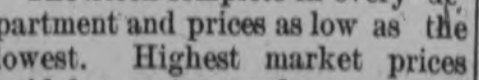

School Officers Not to Loan the School Fund.

Prof. C. H. Mebane, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, has issued the following circular letter to the county superintendents, sheriffs and county treasurers:

"I wish to call your special attention to sections 4 to 60 of the school law. You will see these sections refer to the school funds especially.

"It is my earnest desire to have the school funds separate and distinct from the county and State funds.

"I find that in some counties the sheriffs pay off the State tax first, without regard to the law pertaining to the school fund.

"I find there was no school fund in some counties to apportion in July last, because the county treasurer had paid out the school money on the order of the county commissioners for county purposes. They expect to pay this fund back to the school fund, of course, and will do so, no doubt; but they have no right and no authority for using the school fund thus.

"No wonder the county boards of education and the county superintendents never know just how much money they have or should have to apportion in any one fiscal year. We want to stop this approximating business with our school fund. We want our county board to know exactly to the very cent how much school fund they should have, not only to know what they should have, but we want them to have it."
