It is generally noticed that the man who preaches economy leaves it to his wife to practice it.

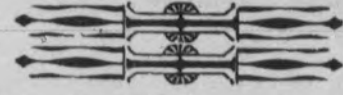

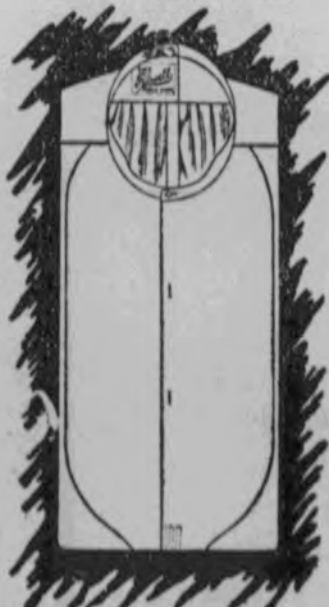

The year 1899 must be set down as a phenomenal one in the varied extent and immensity of the development going on.

This development and prosperity is not limited, it is world wide.

Wars or rumors of troubles of any kind have had no effect in checking the prosperity.

The wave of prosperity in the United States was on when the Spanish war came, but it was not checked in the least, nor has the effect to magnify the Philippines troubles retarded the tremendous business activity of the country.

England's threatened trouble with the Transvaal has not hindered the rush of trade in the British Isles, or impeded India's prosperity.

Shortage of copper has checked the electrical industry, aluminium being substituted as far as possible to make up the deficiency.

And yet the financial system is the same, the tariff is unchanged, and the fact remains that while production has increased immensely yet consumption has outdistanced it.

THE PEOPLE. We are Some of Them. J. B. Randolph went to Conetce today. H. T. King returned Wednesday evening from Raleigh. T. E. Roberts, of Chase City, Va., spent yesterday here and left this morning. Mrs. J. C. Tyson and little daughter left this morning for Baltimore to visit relatives. F. D. Cudlip, of the Western Union Telegraph office at Richmond, spent last night here. Frank Wilson returned Wednesday evening from the north where he had been after stock for his new store. J. Dail and son LeRoy, recently of Ayden, passed through this morning going to Williamston where they will soon begin publishing a paper.

What's The Matter Now? The fruit trade journals of New York say that the demand for fruit on that market this year is less than has ever before been known. The commission merchants of the big city are unable to dispose of shipments of watermelons from the South and refuse to accept them upon any terms. It is pretty much the same way with California fruit, which has heretofore found a ready market in New York. Hundreds of car loads of melons have been dumped on the Jersey flats because nobody was found willing to pay the freight bill, and the pushers of street fruit carts often dump their loads into the river as the only way to get rid of it. The trade journals are unable to account for this condition of affairs. At the same time, the Southern markets present identically the same peculiarities. Perhaps as many as thirty wagons loaded with watermelons came into Charlotte yesterday, and the farmers who brought the melons here, unable to effect either a wholesale or retail trade, hauled them back home "to feed to the hogs." None of the local dealers seem to be able to account for the situation. One of them says that on Monday of last week a farmer left a load of melons at his store. The dealer was to incur no risk, but was simply to do the best he could for the accommodation of the farmer. He offered the melons at 5 cents each, and when the farmer returned on Saturday they were all there—not a single sale having been made. A peculiar feature about the business is that the local watermelon crop this year is one-fourth short, at least. Last year, when the crop was an unusually large one, the supply was not equal to the demand, and the farmers sold their melons as fast as they could bring them to town. This season, when their crop is short, they haul their melons to market, only to haul them home again. Who can explain this? The Observer confesses that the question is too hard for its nut-cracker, but it is glad to know that the blame cannot be saddled upon the shoulders of the old Sheriff. Not a single owner of an unsold wagon load of watermelons in Charlotte this year can shake his gory locks at Cleveland and say he did it.—Charlotte Observer.

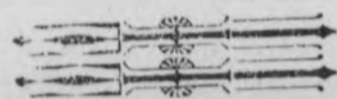
