## SHEPPARD vs. BERNARD.

### Complaint Filed in the Suit.

Some days ago a summons was served on C. M. Bernard in a suit to be started against him by B. S. Sheppard at this term of Pitt Superior court. On Wednesday afternoon the complaint was filed and reads as follows:

The plaintiff complaining of the defendant, alleges:

1. That Abbie A. Sheppard is, and at the times herein-after mentioned was, the wife of the plaintiff.

2. That at the time of the commencement of the wrongs and grievances herein-after named, the plaintiff was living and cohabiting with, and supporting his said wife, and they were living together happily as man and wife.

3. That the defendant contriving and wrongly and wickedly and unjustly intending to injure the plaintiff and to deprive him of the comfort, fellowship and assistance of the said Abbie A. Sheppard, wife of the plaintiff, and to alienate and destroy her affection for him heretofore, to wit; on the— day of September, 1883, in the town of Greenville, Pitt county and divers times and places for a number of years since that day, wrongfully, wickedly, maliciously and unjustly debauched and carnally knew her, the said Abbie A. Sheppard, the wife of the plaintiff.

4. That the plaintiff is informed and believes that the said wrongs and grievances continued to be committed, at intervals, up to and within the year, 1898.

5. That hereby the affection of the said Abbie A. Sheppard for him, the plaintiff, became and was alienated and destroyed, and also by reason of the premises, the plaintiff was deprived of the comfort, society, aid and assistance of his said wife, Abbie A. Sheppard, in his domestic affairs, which the plaintiff ought to have had, and otherwise would have had, and has suffered great distress of body and mind, to the plaintiff's damage, fifteen thousand dollars.

6. That none of the facts constituting the cause of action stated in this complaint ever came to the knowledge of the plaintiff until the—day of—1897.

## FIRE IN NORFOLK

### St Vincent's Hospital Destroyed Four Lives Lost

Special to Reflector.

Norfolk, Va. Sept. 21.—Last night St. Vincent's hospital in this city was destroyed by fire. The fire occurred about 1:30 o'clock, and besides totally destroying the building caused the death of four persons.

There were many heart rending scenes about the fire. Some patients of the hospital who had only a few days before had a leg amputated, crawled down to the street where they were found by firemen and taken to private residences to be cared for.

Fireman Barrett, who was injured by one of the falling walls, died today. The other three deaths were inmates of the hospital. One inmate appeared at a fourth story window and was seen to fall back in the flames.

The fire engines from Portsmouth and from the Navy Yard came across the ferry to help the Norfolk department, but all combined could not save the building.

The hospital was one of the finest institutions of its kind in the South, and the loss is nearly half a million dollars.

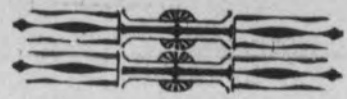
## Around the World

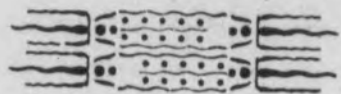

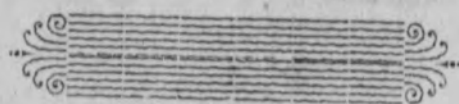

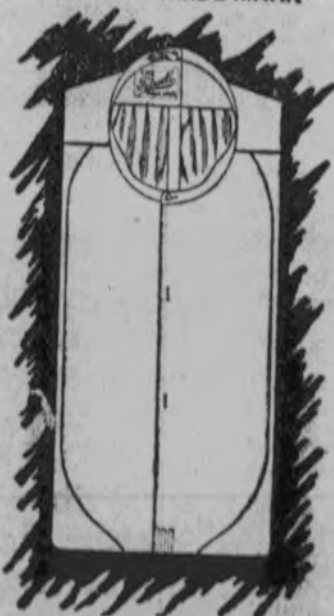

## AROUND THE WORLD.

Letters From Lyman A. Cotten On His Travels.

U. S. S. GLACIER,  
 At Sea, June 3rd, 1899.

MY DEAR FATHER:—

Just ten days ago I saw the sand hills of the Virginia coast sink below the horizon and I must confess that my heart sank also at the thought of all I was leaving, but it is not for sailors to be sad and so we turned to the sea and to each other for amusement, and not without success. Since that day we have been steadily moving toward the east at the rate of about two hundred and sixty-five miles a day. We are now about two thousand six hundred miles away and three more days of good weather will bring us to Gibraltar. The weather, of great import to a sailor, has been fine and the trip so far has been almost devoid of incident. For the first few nights we had a full moon, and often when I had charge of the deck at night I would think of you all at Cottendale and wish I were with you. Occasionally we sight a whale and find amusement in watching him rise slowly to the surface and blow up a fountain of spray, or watch the porpoises leap and play around the ship when it is not calm, for the porpoise does not play during a calm. Even a sail like a speck on the horizon is watched with interest.

I will mail this as soon as I get to Gibraltar so that you may hear from me promptly. After we leave Gibraltar I will write my impressions of that place and mail the letter at Port Said. This plan I will follow throughout the trip, writing of each place after I have seen it, and mailing at the next stop. Our stops will be short, and all the time I can get off I will wish to spend in sight-seeing, and do my writing afterwards at my leisure.

MEDITERRANEAN SEA,  
 June 11, 1899.

Well, everything went on in the usual way until the morning of June 6th when the cry of "Land ho!" brought us hurrying on deck and we saw far off the coast of Africa. Soon we were near enough to make out the rocks and trees on the shore. Soon we were heading through the Strait of Gibraltar. To the north was the rock of Gibraltar, to the south the rock of Centa, called by the ancients the Pillars of Hercules and supposed to be the western boundary of the earth. Between these two rocks the wind rushes with great force, but we forged ahead and soon came to anchor in the Bay of Gibraltar in the shadow of "the key to the Medi-

rock was devoid of advertisements and bore no evidence of American enterprise. As soon as duty would permit I "hit the beach" as we call going ashore. The town of Gibraltar is clustered around the water at the foot of the rock and is a very pretty and interesting town. The streets are paved and clean, and the shade of leafy palms is cool and inviting. No one is allowed to inspect the fortifications, but I kept my eyes open and saw all could from a distance, but my professional observations would not interest you. In strolling around I sometimes found myself in places where I was told I could not go, or in strolling through the public gardens I plucked flowers where I was told I could not pluck them. The flowers are bright, the palms are shady, and the many winding walks that lead to nowhere are lined with geraniums, morning glories, maiden hair ferns, century plants and others unknown, but all "quite English you know." I took a carriage and after following a winding road for about an hour found myself on a high crag at Europa Point, which is the southern point of the rock of Gibraltar. From far below came the roar of the sea dashing itself against the wall of stone, to the right, across the bay were seen the hills of Spain, to the left, across the Mediterranean was seen the coast of Morocco, while behind and around rose the lofty and jaggy points of rock-ribbed Gibraltar. Truly a grand sight, the mere looking at which makes a man grow.

Back again through the city, with its thousands of soldiers, on the market where I found a scene of life and movement. Boats loaded with fish, donkeys with pack-saddles as large as themselves load with fruit or vegetables, venders crying their wares in many tongues, while hundreds of Englishmen, Spaniards, Frenchmen and Moors were marketing. The Moors were by far the most interesting to me, because new to my sight. They are large men of dark complexions. On their heads they wear bright colored turbans, while on their bodies they wear a white or colored loose-flowing robe which covers one shoulder and the body to the knees. From their knees to their slippers their legs are bare.

### An Aged Minister Dead.

Rev. B. B. Albritton, an aged preacher in the Free Will Baptist church, died at 2:30 o'clock this morning at the home of his daughter, Mrs. H. C. Harris, about five miles from Greenville. Mr. Albritton was a native of Pitt county, and was in his 85th year. He had been in the ministry for more than half a century, and with the exception of one year had been pastor of the church at Parker's Chapel all of this time and it was one of his regular appointments for preaching. In all his ministerial labors with different churches he received and baptised 3,460 members.

About ten years ago Mr. Albritton moved to Pamlico county, where he married a second time, and that county had since been his home. He always came back to fill his appointments at Parker's Chapel. Two weeks ago he came to get ready for the yearly meeting, but was taken sick soon after reaching the home of his daughter and never got up again.
