

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



Thirty-seven the Fatal Age.

An examination of the records of the United States Government shows that more people die at the age of thirty-seven than at any other. Likewise at that age more calamities overtake people than at any other.

But what is true of this country is also true of other countries. History's full of examples in point

At the age of thirty-seven a great sorrow befell Aristotle, viz: the death of Plato, his friend and teacher, with whom he had studied is steerin straight an no mistake," he for nearly twenty years. This sornow plainly showd its effects upon his future life and to it may be attributed the sad tone of his later writings.

At the age of thirty seven Lord Byron died of fever in Greece. As Lord Beaconsfield says he was "greater as a man than as a writer and ms loss to the world was a great blow to it."

Raphael, the glory of Italian art, died at thirty-seven. He fell sick and fever and died on that day, Good Friday. In him the world lost one of its great st artists. In music, like art and poetry, England lost her greatest composer at the age of thirty-seven. Purcell, the most distinguished musician Britain produced, died within a fow they a mer attaining his thirty-seventh year. The regard in which he was held in England placed him on a par with Milton in epic poetry, with Shakespeare on thestage, Lock in metaphysics, and Sir Jame Newton in philosophy and mathematics.

At the are of thirty-seven, too Rogland lost a military genius that she regarded as of the highest rank and promise. Prince Henry of Battenburg died of fever in Ashantee in that year of his life.

60 days when water has been taken. Dr. Schaeffer, a German physician, notes the case of a woman, aged 47, who died after a fast of 43 days, during which she drank water freely, Her weight, which was 143 pounds a year before her death, was reduced to 99 pounds. It was a case of suicidal melancholia, and the woman patiently carried out her horrible undertaking so quietly as to scarcely attract the notice of her family and died at last calmly and peacefully without complaint or apparent evidence of suffering.-San Francisco Examiner.


