

Treasurer Worth's Ruling.

In reply to a letter from the Worth writes the following, explanatory of the revenue act, which is of importance to merchants generally:

Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 20, 1899. Walter G. MacRae, Sheriff, Wilmington, N. C. DEAR SIR:

Yours of the 18th is to hand, and noted. You ask "If B is engaged in the grocery business as a dealer, also in tobacco, cigars, etc., does he pay tax on tobacco, cigars, etc., under section 21, and also on his capital under section 23''? In reply, I will say that he should pay all the taxes levied under section 21 on tobacco, cigars, etc., and alening prayer Wednesdays at 7:30P. so should pay under section 23 the tax on his capital employed less the amount of capital used in conducting the business taxed under section 21. The portion of capital employed, under section 21, is not liable totax under section 23. Your ruling has been strictly in accordance with the ruling of this office METHODIST .- Services every Sun. and is approved by the same.






