GREENVILLE'S THANKSGIVING

The Day Properly Observed.

Greenville has spent another enjoyable Thanksgiving Day. The weather was beautiful and the people entered heartily into the observance of the day. The stores and other places of business were closed the entire day, the barrooms being the only exception. The town wore very much of a Sunday appearance. The orphans of the State will have cause to be glad of this Thanksgiving in Greenville, for wherever the opportunity was given liberal donations were made to the orphanages.

In both the Baptist and Episcopal churches appropriate services were held in the morning. At the Baptist church a collection was taken for the Thomasville Orphanage amounting to \$22.70. At the Episcopal church a collection for the Thompson Orphanage amounted to \$8.

At night union services were held in the Methodist church where short talks were made by Revs. I. A. Canfield, J. N. Booth and N. M. Watson and Prof. W. H. Ragsdale. Besides the full choir anthems and congregational singing there were solos by Mrs. J. B. Cherry and Miss Howell, of Goldsboro. The collection for the Methodist Orphanage amounted to \$21.75.

The Odd Fellows and Daughters of Rebekah sent their Orphanage at Goldsboro \$40.

The Masons sent their orphans at Oxford \$30.35 in cash and a box of clothing.
