#### TOWN MATTERS.

##### Proceedings of the Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen held their regular monthly meeting on Thursday night, and had considerable business to transact.

Alderman H. A. White, for the cemetery committee, made a report of the work done to the cemetery. Mayor Moye took occasion to compliment the work of the committee and said the thanks of the Board and also of the citizens was due them, as the cemetery was now in the best condition he had ever seen it.

Alderman Hart, for the finance committee, reported \$617.79 in the Treasury. In the absence of Alderman Wooten he also made a report of the work done by the street committee for the past month.

Alderman J. B. White, for the lights and wells committee, reported the work done under the direction of his committee the past month.

Alderman McGowan, for the market committee, reported the market house in good condition, with about half the stalls rented.

The Chief of Police was ordered to take the regular street hands and look after some needed work to the cistern on the academy branch.

A committee was appointed to confer with the owners of the property on which the market house is located relative to securing an extension of the lease thereon, and report to a special meeting of the Board to be held next Thursday night, 13th.

The Tax Collector, Chief of Police and Assistant Police made report of their collections for the past month.

A list of the members of the different fire companies who have been released from poll tax was filed with the Board.

E. M. Cheek was granted liquor license for six months from Jan. 1.

A. J. Griffin, chief of fire department, presented a petition that shirts be furnished the members of Hope Fire Company. A committee was appointed to look after the matter.

Roy Evans was allowed to open a photograph gallery upon payment of itinerant tax until he shall become a resident, in which case the tax will be refunded.

The action of the Board at a former meeting releasing J. P. Taylor, photographer, from itinerant tax, was rescinded and the tax

collector was instructed to collect the tax from him from now on, he having failed to become a resident.

There being a suit against the town for the payment of certain sums on a hand fire engine some years ago, and a compromise having been offered by plaintiff, a committee was appointed to look after the matter and report next Thursday night.

Orders were drawn on the Treasurer for \$625.12 nearly \$200 of this being for notes and interest on the purchase of fire engine and hose.

##### Tobacco Growers' Convention.

Raleigh, Dec. 6.—About 100 tobacco growers were present at the convention today, and steps were taken to perfect the organization of the North Carolina Tobacco Growers' Association.

Every tobacco county is called on to hold a county convention on the first Monday in next January to select five delegates each to the

State convention to be held in Raleigh on January 17th.

The tobacco planters say there is plenty of evidences of the fact that the great decline in tobacco to the present low prices is due to the American tobacco trust. The main purpose of the association is to devise plans to fight the trust and obtain better prices for tobacco.

There were quite a number of speeches and much discussion, during which some opposition was manifested toward the tobacco warehouse system of selling. One plea suggested was to form a trust by the farmers and establish factories to manufacture all their tobacco.

##### The N. C. Conference.

Washington, N. C., Dec. 7th.—The North Carolina Conference of the M. E. Church, South, met here today in its sixty-third annual session. Bishop R. Hendrix, of Missouri, called the body to order at 10 o'clock and conducted the opening devotional exercises.

The roll was called and 113 members answered to their names.

Rev. W. L. Cunnigim was elected Secretary and the usual committees and boards were appointed.

The names of the superannated and supernumerary preachers were called and their characters passed.

The characters of the Presiding Elders passed and they made splendid reports of the work on their respective districts.

As much business was transacted today as is usually done in two days.

This is Bishop Hendrix's first visit to the N. C. Conference, and he spoke of the great pleasure it gave him to be present.

There are also a large number of visitors in attendance upon the Conference, and Washington is well taking care of both preachers and visitors.

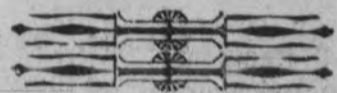

**FROM THE PHILIPPINES.**

Lyman Cotten Writes Again.

U. S. S. PETREL } Sept 19, 1899.  
 MANILA, P. I.

MY DEAR FATHER:

As the heading of this letter will tell you, I am once more on a regular man-of-war, and a nice one too. I was detached from the Glacier two days ago. My duty on her was not unpleasant, but I like the prospect of active service. The Petrel is a gunboat of some over a thousand tons displacement and has a very good battery. She is just the right size for service out here, and the other officers on her are very pleasant. The executive officer is a Lieut-Commander Smith from North Carolina. I am well pleased with the change and hope I am settled until the time comes for me to return to the States.

The army to the North-east of Manila is expecting an attack at any time. Every night the Petrel steams down the bay and anchors near the shore, where our outpost and the Philippine outpost are only about six hundred yards apart. Then we load our guns, and train our searchlight on the beach, and stand ready to help the army in case of an attack. Yesterday an expedition left here to make an attack at Subig Bay. I was anxious to go with it, but could not. Last week I rode out twice to our lines, once to the N. E. and once to the S. W. It is very interesting to see an army in the field, which you have seen, when you were a soldier yourself, and I was interested in seeing something of the rural districts. It is a bad country to fight in, being a succession of marsh and jungle, with very little cleared land. The roads are dreadful although we have had comparatively little rain recently. I suppose you read in the papers of the loss of the Transport Morgan City with 260 bags of precious mail, which is a sad loss to the men out here, for letters have a high value with us all. I hope you will remember this and write often. The full campaign is about ready to start now, and skirmishes are of almost daily occurrence. Yesterday there was quite a lively little one in which we had two men killed and five wounded. The Petrel is now getting ready for a little cruise, probably up to Lingazzen Gulf, and possibly we may get into something interesting.

I know you would be interested in the people out here. The girls are frequently quite pretty, and their dresses are exceedingly so, but I am not capable of describing their costumes. The Filipinos are very handsome, and in this particular they seem to differ from all the other

people in the East. Yesterday I heard a native band of about eighty pieces and they made as good music as I ever heard. Of course I have attended a cock-fight, as that is the National sport of the Philippines. It is one of the most disgusting things I ever witnessed. They take place on Sunday. As you draw near the cock-pit you see a howling mob of men and a few women. Almost every man has a cock under his arm. Two men enter the pit, with their cocks, and they are inspected by the master of ceremonies. Each cock has a very sharp knife about two inches long strapped to his left leg. They are held out near each other and immediately bristle up, while the crowd is talking and yelling and the money jingling as the bets are made. The owner of one cock then holds them and lets the other one peck his head several times to make him mad, and if he squawks the fight is declared off. The other one is treated the same way, and then at the word they are thrown down and go for each other. The crowd fairly howls and after two or three strokes one of the cocks falls to the ground dead, or staggers away with blood gushing from a deep wound that often proves fatal a few minutes later. I know this is not interesting from an esthetic standpoint, but as illustrating the taste of the natives.

U. S. S. PETREL } Oct. 5, 1899.  
 MANILA, P. I.

MY DEAR FATHER:

When I last wrote we expected to go up to Lingazzen Gulf for a few weeks, but something else turned up. The very next day we heard that our gunboat Urdaneta had been captured by the insurgents, and we were sent out to investigate. We found it to be sadly true, for near the mouth of the Irani River we found the wreck. Her captain, a Cadet, and most of her crew were killed and the remainder captured. So last Sunday we went over with several small gunboats to recapture the hulk of the Urdaneta, and to inflict punishment. We bombarded and captured the town of Irani, the insurgents, after slight resistance, taking to the hills. Then we raised the Urdaneta, and none of our men were hurt. I expect you will read of this in the papers before you get this letter, but you will not think then that I was in the crowd that went to investigate and to punish. The expedition to Subig Bay, that I wrote of was quite successful. We captured a six inch gun and had only one man hurt. The army has little fights almost every day now. To-night we can hear a battle going on not very far from where we are anchored.

Since I wrote last I have experienced the first bad effects of the climate here. I was in bed about a week with what is known as Cavite fever. It is a kind of malarial

A correspondent of the Atlanta Journal says that "Buck" Duke, president of the tobacco trust, now only 43 years old, has made the most conspicuous success of any southern born man since the war eclipsing even Samuel Spencer. It says that if he lives to be as old as Rockefeller he will be a greater man. "Greatness" is a word that needs a modern definition. We say that Gladstone, Jefferson, Napoleon, Rockefeller and Duke were great, meaning thereby that they are "the top of the pile" in their calling. Mr. Duke has certainly proven to be a Napoleon of the tobacco trade, building like Rockefeller upon the ruin and failure of thousands of competitors, and reducing the tobacco farmers to the condition of making only enough to pay for the cost of cultivating the crop and hoping for better things next year. That's what greatness in Duke's career has done for the men who before the trust was organized were the most prosperous farmers to be found. It transferred the profits in tobacco from the pockets of the farmers to the trust.—News and Observer
