SECOND DAY.

Washington, N. C., Dec. 8.—The second day's session of Conference opened this morning at 9:30 o'clock, the religious exercises being conducted by Dr. E. A. Yates.

The calling of the roll was dispensed with for the remainder of the session.

Dr. Norman presented a report of the committee for the establishment of a Conference organ, which was read and referred to proper committee.

Reports of Epworth League and Sunday schools were read and referred.

Dr. C. M. Payne, of the Presbyterian church, was among those introduced to the Conference. He made a most happy and witty talk which called forth a pleasant and humorous response from the Bishop.

Dr. J. J. Lafferty, editor of the Christian Advocate, Richmond, delivered a lecture for the benefit of the M. E. church in the opera house last night.

FROM THE PHILIPPINES.

Lyman Cotten Writes Again.

U. S. S. PETREL, Oct 10, 1899.

MY DEAR MOTHER:

I wrote to father just as I was getting well of Cavite fever, and I fear you will feel uneasy about me. I hasten to assure you that I have entirely recovered, and the fever has left no bad effects.

Last Sunday we went down to where the Petrel was stationed when I first joined her, and we took part in one of the hottest little battles that we have had at all. The little fight at Irani, of which I wrote, was nothing to this one. The army moved down from the east about four hundred marines moved along the coast from the north, while we shelled the insurgents in the angle between our forces. I could see the movements of the different forces. First we could see our scouts advancing from bush to bush, then our skirmish line, and behind them the main body. We poured shells into the brush ahead of them but the insurgents were strongly intrenched and soon the fight began in earnest. The rifles cracked, and our six inch shells exploded in the trenches, or went singing over the insurgents' heads, while over from the east several miles came the rattle of the army rifles and the boom of their artillery. The insurgents fought well but we had them on too many sides, and they began to retreat, while we followed them up with our shells from one position to another as our troops pressed on. Cavite Vilgo was captured in the morning and Novellita in the afternoon. Early in the afternoon we saw wounded marines being brought down to the beach and I was sent in to bring off the wounded ones to the ship through

surf. It was a sad duty. One poor fellow that they brought down had a Mauser bullet go right through his head and the blood was pouring out. Such sad sights reminds one of the awful solemnity of war. All this occurred only about ten miles from Manila. The Petrel is in need of some repairs, so we may remain here for a few weeks. I hope I may get to Japan before I return to the States but see no prospect of it now, though we never know what developments a day may bring, but I hope every day brings me nearer to the time when I will see you all again.

MY DEAR FATHER:

I have just been ordered to duty as executive officer of the U. S. S. Pampanga, and as we will leave here tomorrow, I write to let you know where I am, although by the time you get this there is no telling where I will be. The Pampanga is one of the little gunboats we got from Spain and is just the kind of duty I want out here. She is just the right size for active service around the islands, and very much smaller than the Petrel. I am still attached to the Petrel but will probably do duty on the Pampanga for several months. I do not know where we will go tomorrow

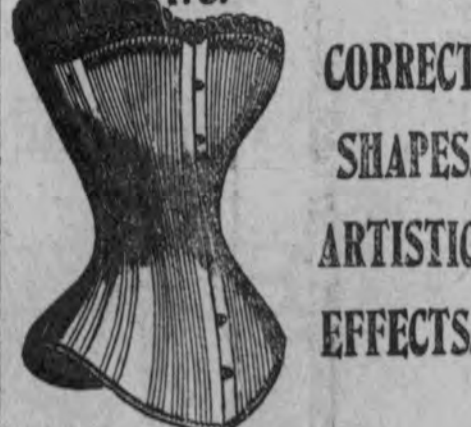
