#### WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent. WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 20, 1900.

How little Mr. McKinley's promise to furnish any desired information to Congress meant was shown when the Senate, under orders from the White House, voted down Senator Pettiwrew's amendment to the Hoar resolution of inquiry, asking that the Senate be furnished a copy of Mr. McKinley's instructions to the Commissioners who negotiated the treaty of peace with Spain. That information would, there are good reasons to believe, show that there is a contradiction in the policy Mr. McKinley claimed to have when he gave those instructions and that followed by 10 him since the treaty was negotiated, and in order to avoid making 100 a public exibition of himself by 100 going back on his word, he called 100 on the republican majority in the 100 Senate to save him, and his orders were obeyed.

The Senate has agreed to vote on 1 the Gold Standard bill Febuary 15. 100

The Roberts Committee by a 10 unanimous verdict found him guilty of polygamy, and his seat 10 will be the penalty. The majority 10 report favors declaring his seat in 10 the House vacant, and the min- 10 ority report, signed by two members, favors seating and then expelling him. In either case it is 10 good-bye Roberts.

The administration is trying to bring Boss Platt around to its way of thinking on the vice-presidential question by trotting out the western candidate bogy to frighten Platt into the belief that New York will lose the place if he does 1 not accept the Hanna-McKinley programme without alteration. Of course, Mr. McKinley, and Senator Platt, know that there i little probability of the nomi on 1 of a western man for second but it pleases the former to p. and i otherwise, and it may please the several western men, including Senators Davis and Spooner, who i are being "mentioned" as possible 1 candidates.

Ye gods, what a change in Congressional sentiment! If a democrat had a few years ago used the language of Senator Chandler, when a negro petition for antilynch legislation was presented to 11 the Senate, this week, there would ! have been a republican howl that would have jarred the earth; and i what he said was so manifestly true that no Senator commented upon 1160 it. Mr. Chandler said: "There is 1161 no power in Congress to prevent or 1162 to punish crimes committed in the 1164 various States."




