It will also give us opportunity of devoting more attention to other departments of the paper, so that it will be better all around. This step as well as some other improvements, has been in contemplation for sometime and we hope a corresponding increase of patronage will follow. Mr. Harding is a young man of talent, popular and of pleasant address. He has been assistant postmaster for some years and is well known to all our people. He is going to carry his usual determination to secure with him in his new labor and both he and THE REFLECTOR will appreciate any assistance in the way of news items or business for the paper.

Chairman Simmons said to-day: "I have read the account in yesterday's News and Observer of the speech delivered at Newton last week by Assistant United States District Attorney Blackburn, in which, after referring to the recent assassination of Goebel, the Democratic Governor-elect of Kentucky by the followers of Governor Taylor, the Republican usurper, he said: 'Let the Democrats in North Carolina take warning from the fate of William Goebel.'"

"Mr. Blackburn is very close to Republican State Chairman Holton. Holton is United States district attorney of the western district and Blackburn is his assistant in that office and he is a protege of Senator Pritchard.

"Mr. Blackburn's warning to Democrats of what they may expect if they persist in their purpose to disfranchise the negro is but a repetition of the threats of violence recently made in Washington by his chief, Mr. Holton, the only difference being that Blackburn is more specific than was Mr. Holton and boldly predicts murder and assassination of Democrats.

"When Butler, at the recent meeting of the Populist executive committee, appealed to the fighting qualities of his followers and asked them to join hands with the Republicans (four fifths negroes)

and drive the white supremacy gang out of the State, I said in an interview in The Charlotte Observer that his purpose seemed to be to stir up and incite the negroes to violent resistance of the lawful purpose of the white people. Holton's threats, Blackburn's warning Pritchard's attempt to secure Federal aid, Linney's threat to pass a force bill election law through Congress, the negro White's impudent assault upon white women, the secret and mysterious activity of the revenue doodlers and the recent sudden outbreak of negro insolence and lawlessness not only confirm that opinion but arouse a strong suspicion that the fusion office-holders are engaged in some dangerous scheme and that, in carrying it out, the negro is being secretly organized and will be used as a tool. It would seem that the conspirators have discussed and pondered over their programme of violence so much that their minds have become thoroughly saturated with it, and, under the heat of excitement, they let drop hints of its dark purport. Under these circumstances ordinary prudence dictates that the white people be on their guard and watch every movement of the negroes and the white emissaries who may be engaged in secretly organizing them.

"I hope there may be no trouble during the campaign or at the election between the whites and the blacks and we will exercise reasonable forbearance, but if it comes we will know who has instigated it and who is responsible for it. We are trying peaceably and in the way provided by law to amend the constitution and the attempt to intimidate and deter us by threats of force and murder, while it proves all we have ever charged concerning the character of the Republican party on this State and its leaders, will make the undaunted but law-abiding white people of the State more than ever determined to remove forever the unbearable condition which have made such things possible in North Carolina."—Raleigh Cor. Charlotte Observer, 6th.

Individual Republicans Favor Amendment.

As we have said before the Republican party, as an organization, is controlled by the influence of the 120,000 negroes who constitute four-fifths of its voting strength, and will be forced by their influence to oppose the amendment, but that we are glad to know will not deter thousands of honest white Republicans who are under no obligations to the negro, and who believe that the future of their party is hopeless so long as it is dominated by him, from voting and working for the amendment. Republicans like General Cowles and Mr. Sharpe know that the negro hangs like a mill-stone around their necks and the neck of the Republican party, and that they will never be able to throw off the incubus so long as they follow the decrees of their party conventions, and they have determined to put the axe into the root of the tree and help to eradicate the evil. When the State have been freed from the menace and incubus of irresponsible negro suffrage, and their party has been freed from negro influence and control, they will, if they are fit to continue their allegiance to the republican party, become the dominant spirits in its councils, and its future in this State will be what such men as they are shall make it.—Carolinian.

A Masterly Paper.

North Carolina has a very decidedly able man of whom we do not remember to have as so much heard until Monday last. He is a republican in politics, a practicing lawyer and resides in Pitt county. We do not know how it is we never heard of him before, for he is a man of capital understanding and no little wisdom and penetration as well as of vigor of intellect. His name is E. Victor Cox. In The Raleigh News and Observer of Sunday he publishes a paper on the North Carolina amendment to the constitution that fills very nearly a page. It is a statesmanlike, wise, able production from start to finish. Clear, broad, conservative, acute and incisive, it must do good among all democrats who waver, all republicans who think, all populists who are not in favor of negro rule. We agree with a distinguished lawyer of this city in the opinion that it is the most important and most progressive publication yet made in North Carolina on the pending franchise amendment. He even puts it above the senatorial speeches on the amendment. Mr. Cox does not discuss the constitutionality of the amendment. That has been thoroughly well done by Judge W. S. Bryan, Mr. Fabius Busbee and others among North Carolinians, and by Senators Morgan, Money and McEnery in the United States senate. Mr. Cox in the beginning of his discussion says:

"It is not my purpose to attempt any argument as to the constitutionality of this amendment. We may well leave this to those with authorities at hand which they may quote to sustain them in their respective views. But the statement often heard that no man can vote for the ratification of the amendment without violating his oath to support the federal constitution is the veriest rot, and only shows to what extremities some may be driven for argument to sustain them. To vote for it or not to vote for it is a matter of individual point of view—a matter of individual conscience.

"What does this amendment propose? An educational qualification for voters. But its framers, knowing that there were thousands of voters in the state who could not come up to this standard, and yet who in peace and war had proven their fitness for suffrage, inserted a clause excluding from the provisions of the articles all those who were or whose ancestors were entitled to vote in any state prior to 1867. These by the formation of a permanent roll are forever insured the right to vote. After the year 1908 to those who come of age and apply for registration the provisions of the amendment apply whether white or black."

We read the entire paper at one sitting, and it delighted and strengthened us. It is calm dignified, persuasive, thoughtful, impressive—all of these and more. We put it among the most memorable of North Carolina discussions that we recall in a half century of hearing and reading. It should be circulated in every county. It is a capital paper to read in every township before White Mens Club's. It might be read at a meeting every month until the election. Wherever read it must do good among people of ordinary intelligence, who are not ashamed they are white and who desire to serve North Carolina with fidelity.—Wilmington Messenger.

The above comment from the pen of Dr. T. B. Kingsbury, editor of the Messenger, is indeed complimentary to Mr. Cox's article. A higher compliment could not be paid it.

Tantalizing the Reporter.

If there is anything in this world that makes a newspaper man feel like taking himself to a vast solitude and keeping himself company for the remainder of his days, it is to see the fine creations of his brain carefully and painstakingly brought out, butchered by the printer. Let him prepare an article fit for the gods and intended to be an exponent of his genius and brilliancy, and it is sure to come out in the paper, if it is impossible for him to see the proof, without sense, sound or sentiment.

For instance, in the write-up of an elegant dinner in which the various dishes were given, the word olives appeared in the first course. After the whole issue of the paper had gone out it was discovered that the printer had onions in that course instead of olives. Of all the things on earth onions! Another case, occurring in the neighboring town, was more diastrophic still. It was the account of a fashionable dance. With his kind heart warming with generosity, and with a desire to make others happy, the reporter referred to a young lady dancing as gracefully and stately as Juno. Being unfamiliar with the name of Jupiter's spouse but having heard more or less of Jumbo, the intelligent compositor slapped in the latter and gave it to the writing world.—Greensboro Telegram.

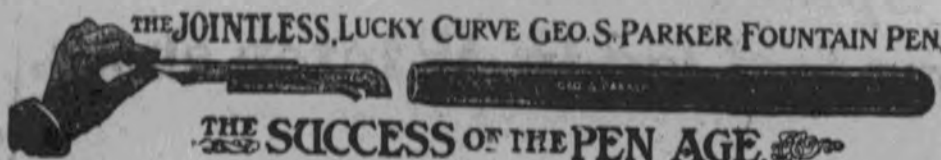
