Mr. Aycock Makes a Great Speech.

Saturday afternoon Hon. C. B. Aycock addressed a large audience of the citizens of Pitt county in the Court House.

A Successful Precedent

The tobacco farmers, who are fighting to secure fair prices for their tobacco adopted a plan known as the Jordan plan, which looks to controlling the product of bright tobacco. Many have doubted whether it was practicable, though they had no plan they regarded as better. There is a successful precedent for the plan adopted. Mr. J. G. Johnson, of Kansas, vice-chairman of the Democratic national executive committee, has written a letter to Mr. W. J. Groom, of Guilford county, saying that the Jordan plan is the most practical method of dealing with trusts he has yet heard of, and adding some account of this successful precedent:

It is practically the same thing as has been adopted with very satisfactory results by the grape growers in western New York. Prior to their adoption of this scheme they were all at sea about prices, and nobody was making any money. Now, instead of selling grapes in a miscellaneous way, they are turned into the mutual company which they have organized. There they are created and sold by the company, and the total proceeds for the season distributed among the growers, who are in the pool, in proportion to each one's production and the grade of his product."

Since the organization of the Tobacco Trust, it has systematically robbed the farmer of at least one-third of the true value of the tobacco he has produced, and reduced the growers of tobacco from independent, successful farmers to the verge of ruin. In the day of general rise in prices, the trust has been powerful enough to keep the price of tobacco down to the price of cultivation. It is to be hoped that there is relief for them from present intolerable conditions.—Raleigh News and Observer.

Kissed the Negro.

A disgusting sight was witnessed at the Lynchburg and Durham depot Friday afternoon. A Northern man and his grown daughter, who have been visiting in this community for several days, left on the afternoon train for Roxboro.

They were carried to the depot by an old negro man and when the father and daughter told him goodbye the woman laid her hand on his shoulder and kissed him. Such cattle as this should stay at home. They are not wanted in Durham or the State.—Durham Herald, 4th.

A Suggestion

It is not our habit to tender advice to the hybrid, black and tan, ring streaked and speckled party composed of negroes and low white office seekers, that is called the Republican Party, but will deviate from our custom and assist them with advice in their quest for Republicans to fill the State Offices in North Carolina. We know that Butler, the Simian, whom the Deity in mercy has written the word "Beware" all over his frightful phiz. We know that he is now in search of some weak or degraded Democrat to put up as the candidate of the Republican party for the office of Governor of the State at the next election for State Officers. We know that the Republicans, and Butler himself knows it would not answer to put such a frontispiece as Butler before the people of North Carolina for the highest office in their gift. Therefore we suggest with all due consideration for the party that we address, that it would be well, and proper, and becoming in them to put in nomination Hon. Jeter Pritchard for Governor, and Hon. George H. White of color, for Lieutenant Governor. Pritchard is a Tennessean, of Buffalo lineage and White is a pale face negro, with the worst instincts of the worst elements of the negro race. He is a leader of his race in North Carolina. He is defiant, impertinent and offensive. He has, in a public speech, invited a race conflict with the white race and challenged them to a contest for the supremacy in North Carolina. He made this wicked and indiscreet speech in a negro convention in Raleigh and on the 23rd of February on the floor of the House of Representatives he made a speech, which was said to have been inspired by Jeter Pritchard which arraigned the State of North Carolina for its treatment of negro criminals, and was composed of so many false statements that he was afraid to confront the people of North Carolina with the speech, as it was delivered in the House of Representatives and it was changed and expurgated, when published in the Congressional Record; all which dirty work, it is said, was the handy-work of Senator Pritchard. These two dirty, disgraced representatives from North Carolina are close friends, socially, and politically, and working together on the same political lines. Both invoke Federal military intervention in the political affairs of North Carolina, Pritchard to control the election on the Constitutional Amendment to protect the State in white supremacy, and White to control the general franchise, as it applies to the negro race.

Let Pritchard and White be the candidates and running mates for Governor and Lieutenant Governor of North Carolina, and the true white sons of North Carolina will meet them in a square stand up fight.—Elizabeth City Eco omist.

THE AMENDMENT.

The following is the amendment to article 6 of the State constitution, adopted by the General Assembly of 1899, and to be submitted to the voters for ratification next August:

Section 1. That article VI of the constitution of North Carolina be and the same is hereby abrogated and in lieu thereof shall be substituted the following article of said constitution:

ARTICLE VI. SUFFRAGE AND ELIGIBILITY TO OFFICE—QUALIFICATIONS OF AN ELECTOR.

Section 1. Every male person born in the United States, and every male person who has been naturalized, twenty-one years of age, and possessing the qualifications set out in this article, shall be entitled to vote at any election by the people in the State, except as herein otherwise provided.

Sec. 2. He shall have resided in the State of North Carolina for two years, in the county six months, and in the precinct, ward or other election district in which he offers to vote, four months next preceeding the election; Provided, That removal from one precinct, ward or other election district to another in the same county, shall not operate to deprive any person of the right to vote in the precinct, ward or other election district from which he has removed, until four months after such removal. No person who has been convicted, or who has confessed his guilt in open court upon indictment of any crime the punishment of which is, or may hereafter be, imprisonment in the State prison, shall be permitted to vote, unless the said person shall be first restored to citizenship in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 3. Every person offering to vote shall be at the time a legally registered voter as herein prescribed and in the manner hereinafter provided by law, and the General Assembly of North Carolina shall enact general registration laws to carry into effect the provisions of this article.

Sec. 4. Every person presenting himself for registration shall be able to read and write any section of the constitution in the English language; and, before he shall be entitled to vote, have paid on or before the first day of March of the year in which he proposes to vote, his poll tax as prescribed by law, for the previous year. Poll taxes shall be a lien only on assessed property, and no process shall issue to enforce the collection of the same except against assessed property.

Sec. 5. No male person who was, on January 1, 1867, or at any time prior thereto, entitled to vote under the laws of any State in the United States wherein he then resided, and no lineal descendant of any such person, shall be denied the right to register and vote at any election in this State by person of his failure to possess the educational qualifications prescribed in section 4 of this article: Provided, he shall have registered in accordance with the terms of this section prior to December 1, 1908. The General Assembly shall provide for a permanent record of all persons who register under this section on or before November 1, 1908, and all such persons shall be entitled to register and vote at all elections by the people in this State, unless disqualified under section 2 of this article: Provided, such persons shall have paid their poll tax as required by law.

Sec. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot, and all elections by the General Assembly shall be viva voce.

Sec 7. Every voter in North Carolina, except as in this article disqualified, shall be eligible to office, but before entering upon the duties of the office he shall take and subscribe the following oath: "I—, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and maintain the constitution and laws of the United States, and the constitution and laws of North Carolina not inconsistent therewith, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of my office as— So help me, God."

Sec. 8. The following classes of persons shall be disqualified for office: First, all persons who shall deny the being of Almighty God. Second, all persons who shall have been convicted or confessed their guilt on indictment pending, and whether sentenced or not, under judgments suspended, of any treason or felony, or any other crime for which the punishment may be imprisonment in the penitentiary, since becoming citizens of the United States, or corruption and malpractice in office, unless such person shall be restored to the rights of citizenship in a manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 9. This act shall be in force from and after its ratification.

Township Primaries will be held on Saturday, March 24th, at 2 o'clock P. M., to appoint delegates to the County Convention.

The several townships will be entitled to appoint the following number of delegates, to-wit:

All persons who are in favor of the white people controlling the State and County governments are invited to participate in these meetings.

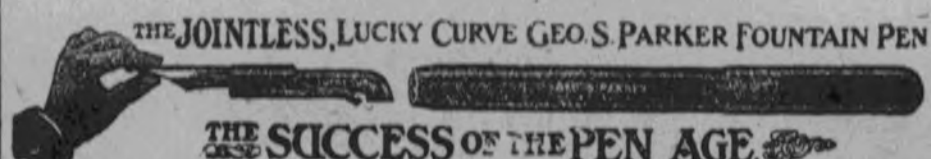
