OUR RALEIGH LETTER.

Agricultural Board Attacks the Fertilizer Trust—Simmons Scores White Republican Leaders.

Special Correspondent of Reflector.

RALEIGH, N. C., March 12, 1900.

Chairman Simmons has been "rubbing it into" disclaimer Spence Blackburn, Ass't U. S. Dist. Attorney, on account of the threats he made in a recent speech.

It will be recalled that the "boy orator" warned the Democrats and the white supremacy advocates to beware (of what, is not clearly understood) lest the fate of Gov. Goebel of Kentucky overtake certain N. C. Democratic leaders.

In other words he threatened assassination of the men who are conspicuous in the attempt to overthrow negro domination and make negro rule impossible hereafter in this State.

It is believed by the Democratic managers here that Blackburn's threat amounts to more than a mere "wordy noise," that he (being close to Chairman Holton and Senator Pritchard) was inspired, and that it is the intention of Republican leaders, and particularly the revenue gang in the western and central counties, to create trouble. It is also alleged that their white leaders are organizing the negroes into secret clubs, with that object in view.

These white leaders are warned by Mr. Simmons that the responsibility will be fixed, if trouble comes through their precipitation, and that they need not think that the negroes will be the only one to blame, nor the only ones to be punished for engaging in such a conspiracy against a fair and peaceable campaign and election.

THE STATE OFFICES TO BE FILLED.

As there are several officials to be elected for the first time this year, the following complete list of offices to be filled, and for which candidates are to be nominated at the State convention on April 11, is printed by request:

Governor, Lieut-Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, State Auditor, Attorney General, Supt. Public Instruction, Commissioner of Agriculture, Commissioner of Labor, Corporation (or railroad) Commissioners, two of the last named, The Commissioner of Insurance will not be elected by the people, as some suppose, he being appointed by the Governor, as the Adjutant General and some other officials are.

The next elective officers are Commissioner of Agriculture, Labor Commissioner. These are all

very desirable positions, with nice salaries attached, but, strange to say, only one candidate for either of the positions has publicly announced himself as yet. The successor of Dr. Abbot, Republican corporation commissioner, is one of the officials to be nominated. No names have yet been suggested however.

AFTER THE FERTILIZER TRUST.

The State Board of Agriculture, of which Hon. John S. Cunningham of Person is chairman, has been in session here during the past week, and transacted a large amount of business of special interest to the farmers of the State. Although the presiding officer of the Board, Col. Cunningham took an active part in the discussions and deliberations of the meetings, as is the custom with him, and as heretofore exhibiting by that activity the deep concern he feels in the welfare and prosperity of the farming classes, of which he is a conspicuous representative.

The most important subject brought before the meeting was the complaint of the increase in price of fertilizers. Among the most active in denouncing the present high prices was Hon. J. Bryan Grimes of Pitt, one of the leading members of the Board. He scored, also, the old fusion Board of Agriculture, and Agricultural Department officials, for their leniency to those who evaded the tax on fertilizers. He produced a lot of interesting and valuable information and figures giving prices of the raw material used in the manufacture of fertilizers, and declared that these figures proved conclusively that the existing high prices of the manufactured fertilizers are unwarranted and unjust. The evasion of tax was also commented on and denounced by Mr. Grimes. He declares there is a good deal of work some one ought to do just now.

Mr. Grimes and others stated that the matter of prices and evasion of the law by fertilizers manufacturers ought to be thoroughly investigated and vigorous action taken to better protect the farmers. To this end the following committee was appointed to prosecute the investigation: Commissioner Patterson, Chairman Cunningham, Mr. J. Bryan Grimes, State Chemist Kilgore and Major W. A. Graham.

NUMEROUS NEWS NOTES.

Congressman Bellamy, of the 9th district, has appointed Thomas D. Osborne, son of Hon. Frank I. Osborne, of Charlotte, to a cadetship in the military academy at West Point.

The State Board of Agriculture has decided to request the Legislature to restore the old tonage tax on fertilizers (25 cents), it now being 20 cents. The reduction, it is said, has resulted in an increase in price and a consequent loss to the farmers, while the Department receives less revenue than formerly.

In some of the eastern counties farm labor is demanding higher wages (as much as \$10 per month) on account of its scarcity, caused by activity in saw mill circles. Some farmers are saying that this and higher fertilizer prices will increase the cost of production of cotton visibly. Better not plant too much of it, gentlemen!

Two well known North Carolinians were married last week—Ernest A. Holt of Alamance (nephew of the late Gov. Holt) to Miss Julia Settle, of Greensboro (daughter of the late Judge Thomas Settle), and A. C. Avery, Jr., of Morganton (son of Judge Avery) to Miss Mary Johnson of Birmingham, Alabama; (niece of Gov. Johnson of that State).

The "Pembroke" of New Bern is the latest cotton mill company to

be chartered in this State. Capital \$100,000.

Dr. Robah F. Gray of Winston, one of the best known physicians of the State died last week.

Gen. Julian S. Carr delivered two ringing speeches in Alamance county last Saturday, 10th instant, at Graham in the morning and at Burlington at night. There is no more enthusiastic and earnest advocate of the Amendment in the State than General Carr.

The Southern Railway has just given an order to the St. Louis Car and Foundry Co. for one million dollars worth of new rolling stock. A pretty good sign of prosperity in this section, that, and faith in the future as well.

The talking of testimony, before special Master J. E. Shepherd, in the railroad tax assessment case begins April 28. Each side will be given three months time to produce evidence before the Master.

Republican head quarters are sending out, to the farmers especially, thousands of Senator Pritchard's recent speech against the Amendment.

Dr. George H. Kirby, Supt. of the Asylum for the insane here (the most efficient superintendent that the institution has had in many years) has received some high and voluntary compliments recently, on account of the splendid work he has accomplished in several cases under his care.

LLEWEXAM

The Committee on Codes of the New York Legislature has favorably reported a bill to prohibit the publication of any paper which may be found on any person who has been dangerously wounded, committed suicide or died suddenly or who has been found dead, unless such paper shall have been produced before a Coroner at an inquest.

"Hoot mon!" replied the Highlander. "Hoo did I ken he was gaen tae shoot oot o' his turn?"

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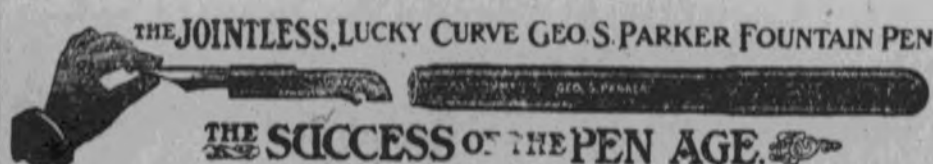
