Many are the regrets we hear today when the people knew there would be no court. And when it was said that Hon. W. A. Hoke, who last week finished up the work of Wake Superior Court had a week to spare, there was a lament among them that he had not been requested to come and hold this term of Pitt Superior Court. No man has endeared himself to the hearts of the people of all classes more than Judge Hoke. Splendid in all he undertakes, magnificent in his demeanor to all alike, superb in dealing justice with mercy, swift in the dispatch of business, without disparagement to the interests of any one but holding the scales equally poised, he is a model Judge.

Port Tampa City, Fla., has a "curfew law" in a new form. No male colored person is allowed on the streets after 10 o'clock p. m. unless he has a pass signed by Mayor Dempsey. All others are jailed and fined in the Police Court the next day.

The corporation commission has made a report showing that there are in this State 218 towns, railways in 86 out of the 97 counties, 13 telegraph and 65 telephone companies, 9 street railways, 58 steamboat companies, 87 banks and 34 buildings and loan associations.

Judge Purnell decides that a United States commissioner cannot punish for contempt but must certify the matter to the judge, so the latter can act. The case in question came up from Newbern where Commissioner Dewey undertook to fine United States Deputy Marshall Perkins \$50, and gave him 15 days imprisonment. The judge decides that the punishment in this case is not only unlawful, but improper.—Raleigh Cor. Charlotte Observer.

Grand Secretary Woodell, of the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows, has prepared his annual report. It shows 5,472 members, a gain during the year of 1,047, the greatest in any one year since 1841. There are 111 lodges. Expended for relief \$9,244. Total receipts \$26,148. Money on hand, \$17,810. Greensboro has the largest lodge, 173 members. Forty children are in the orphanage at Goldsboro. The property is worth \$32,000. There are no debts, but a balance on hand for the orphans' fund of \$2,800.

WASHINGTON LETTER

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 2, 1900.

The administration Programme is to jam the Porto Rican bill, tariff and all, through both Senate and House this week. It is certain that the Senate will pass it tomorrow, and probable that the House will do likewise later, notwithstanding the talk of republican members that they would vote for free trade if given another opportunity.

The Senate and all Washington are still laughing and are likely to be for days to come, at the humorous speech of Senator Pettus, in which he held Senator Beveridge, a would-be Demosthenes, up to ridicule, for his speech declaring his opposition to the Porto Rico bill and his intention to vote for it. The Senate and galleries were in a continuous roar of laughter from the beginning to the end of the remarks of Senator Pettus. After rubbing it in on Beveridge for charging all those who didn't agree with him, with enmity towards the government, Mr. Pettus said: "The government in his mind is—

"Me and my wife,
My son John and his wife
Us four
And no more."

Representative Rhea, of Kentucky, made a rattling good speech at a mass meeting of Washington democrats, in which he referred to Chairman Payne, the republican House leader as "the statesman with the one-night-stand state of mind," and to Representative Grosvenor, as the "garrulous gabbler, from Ohio, who acts as a mouth piece for the White House Sphinx." After picturing various phases of administration wabbling, which he likened to the track of a snake, Mr. Rhea said: "Oh, manhood, where is thy shame? Oh, Mr. McKinley, where is thy blush? Oh, Mr. McKinley, you are the saddest spectacle that ever rattled helplessly around in the seat filled by Washington, Jefferson and Jackson, and which will be filled by Bryan. You are the pitiful creature of the trusts, the combines and the monopolies, which have made you, maintained you, and still feed you."

The democrats of the House will antagonize the Naval Appropriation bill, as reported three grounds—armor-plate, construction of ships in government yards and the general extravagance of the bill, which carries \$61,000,000, against \$35,000,000 for the current fiscal year. The minority report favors establishment of a government armor plate plant.

It is suspected that a desire to increase the Republican campaign fund this year is behind the announcement that the Cabinet is considering the feasibility of recommending to Congress, a reduction of the war taxes, which are piling up a surplus in the Treasury, in spite of the facts that the receipts from the Dingley tariff are many millions below the advance estimate of the republicans. With out the war taxes there would have been a deficit of more than \$50,000,000, instead of a surplus considerably in the excess of the amount. It is said that the brewers are being sounded as to their willingness to contribute a proportionate amount to the Hanna corruption fund, if the administration will recommend a reduction of the beer tax to Congress.

Gen. F. H. Cameron, who was for years Adjutant General of this State, died Saturday night in Richmond.
