STABLES BURNED

Two Horses Perish in Flames

Wednesday night about half past 12 o'clock, the stables of Mr. Alfred Forbes were found to be on fire. The alarm was given, but the stables burned down before the fire company could get a stream of water on the building. Fortunately the wind was blowing from the other buildings nearby and a few buckets of water kept them from burning.

Both of Mr. Forbes' horses were in the stables at the time of the fire and were burned to death. No positive idea can be given as to the origin of the fire, as the building was burning all over when it was first seen.

Ex-Secretary Worth Dead.

A telegram to Governor Jarvis announced the death of Dr. John Wilton Worth, at Asheboro, this morning at six forty-five o'clock.

It will be remembered that Dr. Worth ran on the ticket in 1876 for State Treasurer with Vance and Jarvis, and then on the ticket with Governor Jarvis in 1880. He was State Treasurer during Governor Jarvis' entire administration and the most intimate and confidential relation existed between them. Governor Jarvis wired the following reply to the telegram announcing Dr. Worth's death.

"Convey to the family my profoundest sympathy. A noble man has gone. He was my dear friend. Regret I cannot attend funeral."

Dr. Worth held many other places of public trust. He was faithful and efficient in them all. He lived and died honored and beloved. The State has produced few such men. He was over ninety years old when he died.

OUR RALEIGH LETTER.

Numerous News Notes of Interest.

Special Correspondent of Reflector.

RALEIGH, N. C., April 4, 1900.

Secretary Bruner of the State Board of Agriculture left Raleigh last week for Paris, France, where he goes to arrange the North Carolina exhibit at the forthcoming Paris Exposition.

Treasurer Worth states that the State debt on April 1 was \$6,501,770.

The death of Judge Dorsey Battle, of the criminal court of the Eastern District, which occurred at Rocky Mount last Wednesday, is deeply deplored here and all over the State where he was known. Elected to the bench in 1898, he had made a most enviable reputation as a learned and upright and just jurist, and of late years he had commanded and received the admiration of his fellow citizens as a man. Peace to his ashes! His death causes a vacancy which the State convention will have to fill permanently by a nomination. Gov. Russell will probably appoint some one to temporarily fill the place, until the election in August.

The new report of the Labor Commissioner will show that there are now 290 newspapers published in North Carolina. Over 200 of these are Democratic weeklies, which is an average of more than two Democratic papers to each county. No wonder the opposition find it impossible to carry far or for long the old ship of State from her Democratic moorings. The newspapers of this State, and particularly those known as the "country press," are the backbone of the Democratic party of North Carolina, and without their hearty and active work the so-called party "leaders" and the professional politicians could accomplish nothing. But the editors and newspaper men do not always receive just credit, even, for their work from some of them. And we all know it is little else that we ever succeed in capturing. It's not right!

The Raleigh postoffice now becomes a "first-class office," the only one in the State, the receipts exceeding \$40,000 per annum. Wilmington laid claim to this distinction some time ago, but it was later shown that the postmaster acted illegally (to use no stronger term) in bringing the receipts up to the required amount, a record which was not kept up.

The cotton manufacturing business continues to grow at a phenomenal rate in both North and South Carolina. Up to this year North Carolina has led South Carolina and every other State in new mills for about five years. But since January 1st to date this year South Carolina has incorporated more

new mills than North Carolina, although our own State has broke its own record in the same time. Over five million dollars have been invested in South Carolina and 27 new mills incorporated during the first three months of the year. In North Carolina 22 mills have been incorporated with a capital of about three millions. Eight millions in the two Carolinas in three months in cotton manufacturing alone! It is a great and unprecedented record of which we should all be proud.

Rev. Dr. A. A. Marshall, of Forsythe, Georgia, has accepted a call to the pastorate of the First Baptist church of Raleigh, succeeding Rev. Dr. J. W. Carter. Dr. Carter was the most eloquent pulpit orator of which any Raleigh church could boast, and was one of the most unaffected and purest of men. After ten years of service here he returns to his old home in West Virginia, to the regret of the major portion of the members of and worshippers at the First Baptist church, who wish him every blessing in the future.

Citizens of Raleigh contribute \$10,000 towards paying off the indebtedness of St. Mary's College here, the trustees of which have bought, largely on time, the beautiful property used by the college for more than half a century. Rev. Mr. Pruden of the Episcopal Diocese, has been appointed agent to raise the funds (about \$35,000 yet to be secured, I believe) and he will visit every Episcopal community in the State. Others outside the denomination, have and will assist in the good cause, however.

On next Thursday, the day following the State convention, there will held a meeting of the N. C. Democratic Press Association, and President Dowd expresses the hope that every Democratic newspaper man in the State who can attend will do so.

Some of the newspaper men are urging, through communications, that Col. Thos. W. Mason be restored to his old position on the Railroad Commission, to which Otho Wilson was appointed by the fusion legislature. Col. Mason is also regarded as one of the leading candidates for the Congressional nomination in his district. He would ornament and ably fill any position to which he was elected.

There is a small exodus of negro cooks from Raleigh, Charlotte, and perhaps other Southern towns, to the North. Yankee agents are offering them \$15 per month and transportation to New York. The bait has caught quite a number. They can be spared especially the poor ones. Which form the majority—experience proves that most of the negroes who have gone North

have been anxious to return South, and many have done so at the first opportunity. The average Yankee and genuine negro "don't gee worth a cent" largely because the Northern people do not, and never have and never will, understand the Southern darkey.

The death of Mary Troy, 14 year old daughter of Congressman Klutz in a Baltimore infirmary last week has caused much sympathy for the afflicted parents. Mr. Klutz is said to have been devoted to this child and the blow is a severe one to him.

Delegates to the Democratic State convention will be entitled to reduced railroad rates, on account of arrangements to that effect made by Chairman Simmons. The reduced rates holds good from April 9 to 14 inclusive. So you can start for Raleigh Monday and remain until Saturday, if you desire.

The State Fair authorities will this year pay \$2,500 in purses for "trials of speed," horse racing. This is more than usual.

A number of Rep. and Pop. "leaders" and machine manipulators held a secret conference here last week. It is said that pressure is being brought to bear on Dr. Cy. Thompson to make the race for governor, but that that wily and shrewd politician objects to embracing a forlorn hope.

A big crop of candidates for Supt. of Instruction have sprung up during the last week or two—cultivated by the many gentlemen who are actively opposing the idea of nominating the present Rep-Pop. incumbent, Mr. Mebane.

LLEWISAM.

"The farmer has no wages except as wages are measured by the price of his product, and when you place it in the power of the trust to fix the price of what the farmer sells, you place it in the power of the trust to lower the wages that the farmer receives for his work; and when you place it in the power of the trust to raise the price of what he buys, you do the farmer a double injury, because he burns the candle at both ends and suffers when he sells to the trust and again when buys of the trust." —W. 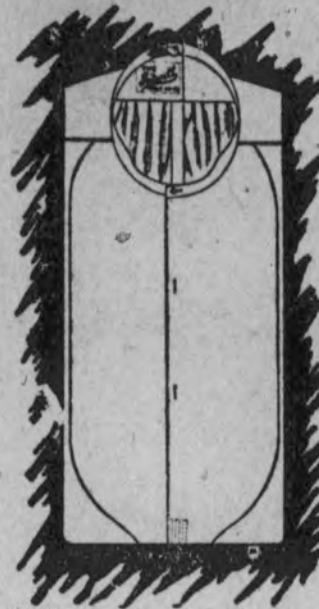
