Have you ever experienced the feeling of not knowing where your next meal was to come from? And worse still, have you felt your powerles ness to secure food for the little ones dependent upon you? No? Well, until you have felt these things do not presume to judge Catherine Meyer. The debt of \$1.06 stood like an inaccessible mountain before the frantic woman. Think of it, Andrew Carnegie! Think of it, John D. Rockefeller! Think of it, millionaires and plutocrats! You give your thousands for libraries and universities. What do you do for the Catherine Meyers?

True Heroism.

The Charleston News and Courier tells a pathetic story of Steph en Moore, in that city last week, and whose obsequies could have searcely been more impressive had he borne a commission and rendered some service of conspicuous gallantry. He was one of three brothers, two of whom fell in battle for the South, and the third himself, came out of it with his eyes forev er darkened to the light of the world. Working with his own hands at a toil for which the thoughtfulness of his Confederate friends had equipped him, he was led by the hand through the streets to attend himself to the disposal of the fruits of his labor, bearing everywhere a smiling face and honored everywhere as an upright man and conscientious Christian."-Charlotte News.

We are the Fourth Naval Power in the World

The report which Representative Foss submitted to the house with the naval appropriation bill is a comprehensive and artistic composition, filled with information concerning our own and the other na vies of the world, and shows the result of his visit to Europe last Summer. According to Mr. Foss we stood No 20 in the list of naval powers 17 years ago. Since then we have spent for new ships \$98, 529,529.85, and the vessels now will cost \$62,570,610.23. We now rank ifourth amongthe naval pow ers of the world-England first France second, Russia third, the United States fourth and Germany fifth. We are ahead of Germany to day only by 2,230 tons—a cruis er about the size of the Atlanta.

Another interesting fact in the report of Mr Foss is that 88 per cent. of the whole number of the officers and seamen in our navy are citizens of the United States, while 65 percent of the remainder have taken out their first papers. O the other enlisten men 75 per cent are citizens, and of the apprentices over 71 per cent. are native bern.-Chicago Record.


