Happenings in North Carolina.

The agitation of the proposed suffrage amendment has already been productive of two very important results. It has caused the Populist party to declare in its platform that no negro is fit to hold any office, and it has caused the Republican party to declare (by its action) that no negro is fit to have any vote or voice in nominating any candidate for any office.

If the mere agitation of the amendment has already had such an effect, what will be the effect of its adoption? Its mere agitation has forced the Populists and Republicans thus practically to acknowledge its need.—Pittsboro Record.

State Treasurer Worth yesterday made demand on the county commissioners of Wake for \$5,460.06, which amount it is claimed has been expended out of the taxes due the state without warrant of law, for making out the tax list of Wake county. Treasurer Worth has been advised by Attorney General Walser to bring suit against the commissioners of Wake, unless payment is made. The treasurer will take the attorney general's advice if he does not receive a favorable reply from the Wake county authorities. Treasurer Worth has retained Mr. W. C. Douglass as counsel in the case. The claim made by the treasurer covers amounts of taxes withheld for a period of years, dating since 1893.—Raleigh Post:

Drive the minutes, or they will drive you. Success in life is what Garfield called a question of "margins." Tell me how a young man uses the little ragged edges of time while waiting for meals or tardy appointments after his day's work is done, or evenings—what he is revolving in his mind at every opportunity—and I will tell you what that young man's success will be. One can usually tell by his manner the direction of the wrinkles in the forehead or the expression of his eye, whether he has been in the habit of using his time to good advantage or not.

"The most valuable of all possessions is time; life itself is measured by it." The man who loses no time doubles his life. Wasting time is wasting life.

Some squander time, some invest it, some kill it. That precious half-hour a day which many of us throw away, rightly used, would save us from the ignorance which mortifies us, the narrowness and pettiness which always attend too exclusive application to our callings.

Four things come not back—the spoken word, the sped arrow, the past life and the neglected opportunity.

Did we not know that there are stores of good honest men all over this country who do not fully understand the full and complete meaning of the constitutional amendment, we would not again mention the subject. If every one understood it, there would be no use for further discussion. They would all be for it, except always those who oppose it hoping thereby to reap personal benefit. But so long as there is a single white man within the confines of this state who has not been convinced that the adoption of this measure means great good to him and his posterity just so long will it be the imperative duty of every one who has a spark of state pride in his make-up, to continue the discussion.

The discussion of such a vital and paramount question should be far above the level of ordinary politics. It is a question of the greatest moment to the people of this state. Much depends upon it. The State can never reach that higher plain of civilization until this matter is settled. The eyes of the whole country are this way and a failure on the part of North Carolina to settle this matter would create the greatest wonderment everywhere.—Lexington Dispatch.

Must Be Carried.

The following copied from the Raleigh News and Observer expresses the sentiment of the white people of North Carolina:

The only spot on the globe where negroes, either directly or indirectly, either by themselves or in union with a few renegade whites assume to govern the white race is North Carolina.

Throughout the entire north and west there are only a few negro voters, no negro officers. The negro cuts no figure. Throughout the south wherever the negro is present in large numbers he is disfranchised by law, by force, and by management. The negro has no voice in the government of Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, or Georgia.

A negro has no more political power in Canada, Austria, Great Brittain, Germany, Russia, indeed anywhere in Europe, or even in Austria, than a steer.

Even in Africa, the home of the negro, where he might be supposed to have political rights, if anywhere—even in africa the negro is a perfect nobody. All the world is looking on while the English and the Boers are fighting over the country which belongs to the negro but nobody seems to care a rap about the negro, who is being robbed of his land.

In the District of Columbia the negro is disfranchised absolutely by a republican congress. In Hawaii, in Porto Rico, in Cuba, in the Philippines the white yankees and white southerners have run over negroes by act of a republican congress, direct by a republican president, paid for with republican gold currency, officered by old confederate as well as yankee generals.

Does anybody suppose that the white men of North Carolina are fools enough and cowards enough to stand still and submit to negro domination, when all the rest of the world is governing the negro? Manhood demands the adoption of our constitutional amendment.

Here's an example how the trusts are daily narrowing the chances of young men who would go into business and driving them from the State. It is a news item from the New Orleans Picayune.

"The tobacco business in North Carolina is too very roseate, if the young man chances to be looking for an occupation," remarked R. Walter Hawthorn, a guest at the St. Charles, who comes from Winston, a tobacco center up near the Virginia line. "The tobacco trust is grasping everything. It is only a matter of a short time, at the present rate, until North Carolina tobacco interests are in the power of the trust.

"In Winston there are twenty five or thirty tobacco concerns, and they are losing their identity. When I left there, a few days ago, it looked like one firm in Winston was bidding a central in everything."

Mr. Hawthorn has come to New Orleans to enter business here.

To Remove Confederate Dead to Arlington.

Washington, May 9.—An amendment to the sundry civil bill was introduced by Senator Hawley today to enable the secretary of war to have the bodies of 264 confederate soldiers buried in the Arlington national cemetery. A number of these bodies are now buried in Arlington and others at the soldiers' homes. The amendment seeks to bury them in one spot and properly mark the graves.

They Will All Be on Hand.

Hon. H. G. Connor has written to all the members of the General Assembly asking whether they would be in Raleigh at the extra session on June 12. Every one who has replied says "Yes," and many say that they will remain in Raleigh at their own expense as long as the public needs require them. The oldest member of the House, Mr. J. R. Abbot, of Macon despite the fact of the sickness of his wife says he will be on hand. One of the Republican leaders writes he will be present. The extra session will have a full membership present.—Wilson News.

Two Horses Killed.

At 3:30 Wednesday morning two horses belonging to Mrs. C. B. Flournoy were killed on the Mint street trestle by a Southern freight train. The horses had escaped from the Grimes' lot on Mullen's alley, and wandered to the railroad track, where they were caught at the beginning of the trestle on the north side. They were instantly killed and run over by several cars. As one of the cars, loaded with cotton gin machinery, came over the horses, it was thrown from the track, dragging the dead horses to the ground, a distance of about 50 feet.—Charlotte Observer.

Washington, May 9.—It seems impossible to get cable reports as to the actual state of affairs in that part of Columbia affected by the revolution, but the last mail advices received here makes it evident that the revolution has extended far beyond its original limits and is now a very serious menace to the existence of the present Columbian government.

The state department is watching the situation closely and has secured from the navy department the presence on the Columbian coast of two gunboats which may serve as a means of communication between the department and the American minister and consul in case communication is not re-established through the ordinary channels.—Wilmington Messenger.
