The executive committee of the Georgia Cotton Planters' Association, organized here May 12th has adopted a plan for future conduct of the association and also a constitution and by-laws. There is a president, vice president and secretary-treasurer, whose headquarters will be in Macon. These officers are to employ local organi zers throughout the State, who are to form county organizations. Each member is to pay 50 cents a year to carry on the work.


