Have you listed your taxes? Next Saturday week and the time will expire. The tax listers have had their office open now since the first of June and only about half of the usual 6,000 abstracts have been written. Somebody's got to do some tall hustling this next week or they'll have to pay for their failure.

The above is from the Raleigh News and Observer. The same state of facts exists here today. The county and town each have a tax lister employed who sits in the Court House day after day during the month of June, ready and willing to list the taxes of all who apply, and we are told by the town lister that there are more than one third of the people of the town who have yet neglected to list, mostly white men. They must know that there are severe penalties for failure to do so. Why do they neglect? The negroes have nearly all listed, especially those who are young, for they are paving a way to register. We ask why such a state of affairs should exist?

There will be 930 delegates in the National Democratic convention. It will require 620 to give a candidate the required two-thirds for a nomination. 716 delegates instructed for Bryan have already been elected. It is all over except the shouting.

The newspapers are wisely dwelling upon the rapidly growing expenditures and extravagance of the present republican administration. There is not only useless and widespread extravagance, but it is found in every department of the McKinley government. It was enormous, most wasteful, before the Spanish war, but it is growing all the time. The New York World gives this: "In the fiscal year 1898, the year before war expenditures began, the cost of government was \$528,735,079. In 1899 it rose to \$893,231,615. In 1900 it was \$674,981,022. In 1901 it is to be \$709,729,477. The figures are those of the appropriation acts." The actual increase is \$180,994,39. The World says and is worthy of the consideration of all taxpayers and bread winners:

"This increase would more than pay all the pensions. It is more than enough to build the Nicaragua canal. It would pay the navy expenses of 1897 three times over. It would support an army seven times as large as that we had before the Spanish war." This is not enough so there is a movement to increase the expenditures by appropriating \$141,000,000 to dig the Nicaragua canal.—Wilmington Messenger.

A Republican Platform.

The Republican platform, adopted at Philadelphia yesterday, is a fabric neatly framed together and beautifully constructed, but, like these World's Fair buildings that are so pleasing to the eye, it will not stand wear and tear, and when examined crucially and critically it will be found to be made of political "stuff."

The clause perhaps of greatest interest to North Carolinians relates to white supremacy in the South and the fact that the G. O. P. lines up against the Anglo-Saxon rule is enough to damn the platform and the party as far as Southerners are concerned. This plank reads:

"It was the plain purpose of the fifteenth amendment to the constitution to prevent discrimination on account of race or color in regulating the elective franchise. Devices of State Governments, whether by statutory or constitutional enactment, to avoid the purpose of this amendment, are revolutionary and should be condemned."

The great mother of trusts, the Republican party, condemns her own offspring and weakly and with glittering generality says she favors making these bad children of hers be good. Protection is endorsed again in a way to hoodwink and fool the laboring man, the plank reading as if the protection policy of the Republican party existed solely for the benefit of the laborer. Reciprocity—the stolen Democratic principle of free trade in thin disguise—is favored in the next breath. Shipping subsidies are endorsed; and a sop is thrown to the G. A. R., of course, in the pension plank. An attempt to white-wash the Republican Cuban postal scandal is ludicrously made in these words: "The administration has acted wisely in its effort to secure for public service in Cuba, Porto Rico, Hawaii and the Philippine Islands only those whose fitness has been determined by training and experience." A good plank is that favoring good roads, and it is due to the sagacity of Senator Gailinger, of New Hampshire, one of the ablest of Republican leaders, that it is inserted. Boer sympathizers are reached after by the plank boasting of McKinley's efforts for intervention in the Transvaal war. The Republican policy for the future of the Philippines is rather faintly outlined in the averment that "the blessings of civilization" are to be guaranteed to the blooming heathen over there.—Charlotte Observer.

Boy Attacked By a Boar.

Mr. James H. Pou, who is just back from Johnson county brings news of a unusual accident—the serious injury of a boy by a big Poland China boar.

It seems that a 15-year old boy named Joe Edwards, living near Smithfield, was on Tuesday trying to run the hog from some plum bushes in a field, when it turned on him, ran him down and seizing him by the thigh struck its tusks into the flesh some two inches deep then tore them out, making a terrible wound. It is thought that if the boy had not escaped by jumping a barbed wire fence he would have been killed.

Yesterday morning the father of the boy took his gun and killed the boar.—Raleigh News and Observer.

Look out for hot weather. A French astronomer has discovered a 25,000 mile "spot" on the sun, and says that means hot weather in July, August and September. It is getting pretty warm already over in China.—Wilmington Star.

Sold its Output.

A few days ago the Carolina Canning Company of this city, sent a sample of its canned peas to Thomas Roberts & Co. of Philadelphia, wholesale grocers and canned goods brokers.

The Philadelphia house asked for price on goods and quantity offered, which was sent, and immediately upon receipt of this letter, the Philadelphia parties wired the Canning Company accepting its price and taking its entire output of peas, 1500 cases.

As this is the first season of the Carolina Canning Co. its success is quite remarkable.

The Company has put up some fine beans, 15,700 cans, which will no doubt prove equally as fine as its peas.—New Bern Journal.

Capt. David Hill, of the Str.
