I've taken it from my pocket in the clubs in London and Paris, and have read, with all the interest of old, how Colonel So-and-so is in our midst, how 'John Jones Sundayed with us,' how 'our esteemed coroner sat on three dead men yesterday,' and how 'the editor is thankful for a mess of cabbage, but needs some bacon to boil it with,' etc. Yes, that little country weekly is a positive joy to me yet. And the editor doesn't have to dun me for my subscription, either."—Atlanta Constitution.

### A North Carolina Prodigy.

Lewis Lunark is in Norfolk. He came here in charge of his brother from his home at Currituck inlet, N. C. Yesterday he was on exhibition at Virginia Beach from which a purse of \$75 resulted.

Lewis is 16 years old and weighs between 500 and 600 pounds. His health is perfect and he eats as much at a meal as two ordinary men. It may be said that he is well proportioned and possesses a face of some intelligence. When 9 years old he weighed 250 pounds. He is gaining in flesh and weight every day.

In weight and size this youth is a prodigy. It is doubtful if the Old North State has his equal.—Norfolk Virginian-Pilot.

## WASHINGTON LETTER

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 14 1900.

Putting the American flag where it ought not to be is a McKinley specialty which has brought the country trouble and humiliation in big chunks. But that did not prevent his ordering the flag to be raised in the wrong place again this week. It is by Mr. McKinley's order to be raised over the notorious Li Hung Chang, who is to be taken from Shanghai to Peking under its protection, and on board an American war-ship if he wishes, and when he gets to Peking Gen. Chaffee and his brave American soldiers are to be his body guard. What a use to make of the American flag and American soldiers! This old rascal has been afraid to leave Shanghai—afraid alike of his own countrymen and the powers, with the exception of Russia which is said to own him body and soul. And now Mr. McKinley rushes into the breach and raises the American flag over him and takes him to Peking, regardless of whether the other powers consider such action an affront or not, and he goes even further. He has promised Li Hung Chang that he would use his good offices to persuade the powers to enter into negotiation with him, although several of them have already refused to do so. Mr. McKinley's friendship for Li Hung Chang is really suspicious.

Publicity the republicans pretend, of course, that their majority in Maine and Vermont are entirely satisfactory, but they put a very different face upon the returns when discussing them among themselves. Every man who has been through the kindergarten of politics known that if the same percentage of republican loss shown in Maine and Vermont is shown throughout the Union in November that it will mean the election of Bryan and Stevenson by a larger majority in the electoral college than McKinley and Hobart received four years ago. It isn't pretended overconfidence that exists among the republican leaders now, but genuine alarm. They realize that the trend of public sentiment is against imperialism, and that if they cannot stop it McKinley and McKinleyism are doomed to a crushing defeat.

Dr. Habercorn, who had charge of the German work for McKinley four years ago and who is now working for Bryan and Stevenson, says of the outlook, as judged from extensive correspondence with prominent German voters: "The Germans know all about imperialism. They know that imperialism can only be maintained by militarism and that militarism means heavy taxation and inroads on the young and producing element of the population and most likely conscription. Following the European models compulsory service in the army or navy for all men might be demanded. The German voter is going to strangle the empire before it strangles him. I don't think the President's letter of acceptance did him any good. The most that can be said of it is that it is the strongest argument that can be put up in a weak cause."

Hon. Roger Q. Mills, of Texas, who was a leading democrat in the House for 26 years and in the Senate for six, indignantly denies the report that he had flopped to McKinley. In his own words: "There is not a word of truth in it. I am a rawhide democrat. I am not taking an active part in politics, but you can bet your life I will vote for Bryan and do all I can for him."

Ex-Gov. Campbell, of Ohio, who

enjoys the reputation of a close and conservative political observer, is in Washington. When asked his opinion of the situation he said: "The democrats are now making steady gains. They are gaining strength every day in New York, in Ohio, in Indiana—in fact all over the country. If the election occurred today the democratic vote would be larger than it would have been yesterday. This far, I think there has been no day when we were not stronger than the day before. Such a condition surely promises well for success."

### A Too Much Loved Man.

The Winston Sentinel prints the following about the elopement of a young lady well known in Johnston county and a young man who was recently a student at Wake Forest College:

"It is said that about five years ago Miss Sarah Stancill, a member of one of Johnston county's best families, went to Davie county to teach school near Augusta. She boarded with Mr. Pack, of that county, and was seemingly happy with her surroundings. Mr. Pack had a son named Jesse, with whom Miss Stancill fell in love. After teaching her term out the young woman went to her home and Pack went to Wake Forest College. Last year, however, he taught school in Davidson county, near Tyro, and fell in love with one of his pupils—a Miss Koontz, a daughter of one of Davidson county's best citizens. She reciprocated and a license was procured. The couple went before a magistrate and the certificate is now on record at the Davidson county court house.

"Shortly after this Pack took his wife up to his home in Davie county. Miss Stancill decided to take an advanced study in New York and made all preparations to leave for that city. She had, in fact, begun her journey and gone as far as Greensboro, when whom should she meet but Pack. He told her that he was still waiting for her. The result was that the couple eloped to the West and are still there.

"Mrs. Pack No. 1 is still living with her father-in-law in Davie county.

### Let Them Stand Shoulder to Shoulder.

The editors of North Carolina can accomplish much if they will stand together for business, says the Durham Sun. At the Asheville session of the Press Association, a resolution was passed favoring the establishment of a paper mill in this State, and giving such an enterprise encouragement and patronage, all things being equal. A committee was appointed to investigate the matter and also look to the formation of a company. Our townsman, Gen. J. S. Carr, heartily approved of the movement, and immediately said he would take stock in it to the amount of \$10,000. By this act he shows his interest and faith in the newspaper fraternity in the State; he loves so well, and it is a handsome start for the organization of a first-class paper mill in North Carolina. With this incentive we hope the committee will be able to report soon gratifying progress. With such an enterprise, conducted by business men, the newspapers of North Carolina will be independent of the newspaper trust, and we have not least doubt but what it will be a success from the start.

### SEEN AND HEARD IN WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, N. C., Sept. 14th

Early on Thursday morning our community was shocked by the sudden death of Dr. C. M. Payne the beloved pastor of the Presbyterian church in this town. He was buried today.

About one o'clock fire broke out on Water street and resulted in the worst by long odds, since the war. It originated near Farrow's railway, and swept the river front up to Swindell's fish house, and on the north side of Water street everything from the front of the oyster canning factory to Market up both sides of Market to Main, including (on Main street) Mrs. Jarvis' residence and Dr. Rodman's office with Bergeron's store. Miss Marcia Rodman's dwelling was badly damaged. West of market, on Water, several buildings were burned. The authorities realized the gravity of the situation and soon the cheering news, in answer to appeals for help, came, Greenville was coming, as well as Tarboro and Rocky Mount, Greenville got in, but the fire was pretty well under control, but that does not detract from our feeling of gratitude to them for their prompt response to the cry for help. I can only say, may we never have an opportunity to repay in kind, the debt. Losses are roughly estimated at \$100,000 to \$200,000.
