Let us look more carefully and consider more thoroughly this proposition, after the Senatorship is settled, before we get any deeper into a "plan" which bids fair to prove a cutthroatone wherein men of the same political blood and household seek to destroy each other.

How long can a party last under such conditions, if they become general, I ask you?

Democrats cannot afford to abuse each other and if this sort of thing is to be one of the results, we had better stop and carefully consider the matter again before we adopt "legalized primaries" or go any futher into the primary business. I have just read several editorials in South Carolina papers expressing disgust of the plan in that State after a faithful trial. But they may not represent the prevailing sentiment there.

WHO CAN VOTE FOR SENATOR.

I explained the resolution of Major Hale recently adopted by the State Committee in these letters several weeks ago, defining who can vote under it and the resolution adopted by the State Convention in April, and stated that the two combined would have the effect of making pretty much every white man east of Raleigh eligible. But it appears there is still uncertainty troubling some voters and newspapers. So it should be stated again:

Any elector who voted for Aycock and the Amendment (no matter who he votes for in the November election) can vote in the Primary for Senator, under the decision of the State Committee. This provision as it stood would have barred out Populists who will vote for Mr. Bryan's electors, while it would (and does still) admit "gold Democrats" who will not vote Mr. Bryan, even though they vote for Mr. McKinley. So Maj Hale introduced a resolution (adopted by the committee) to make Populists and others who vote for Bryan in November eligible to vote for Senator also, even though they voted against Aycock and the Amendment. As matters now stand, and will stand on election day, the only voters who cannot participate in the Senatorial primary are those who voted against Aycock and the Amendment and will also vote against Bryan and Stevenson.

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

Hobbs, Clerk of the Superior Court of Martin county, were shot by Mr. Jos. B. Bennett, son of ex-Register of Deeds W. H. Bennett, Saturday night about 9;30 o'clock.

Young Bennett and Misa Moore had been engaged to marry for about three years. Bennett went to Norfolk a month ago and returned to Williamston Saturday morning. He went around to see Miss Moore and during their interview they had a falling out and Bennett

In the afternoon Miss Moore went to the home of a married sister and remained until after tea, Mr. Hobbs accompanying her home in the evening. About 9:30 Bennett went back to the Moore residence and secreting himself Style, near the house made a noise to attract attention of the occupants. Miss Moore and Mr. Hobbs were both in the parlor and hearing the noise they went to the front door, the lady remarking that she ex-show in pected it was a cow in the yard.
