MASONIC HALL SCHOOL.

Pupils Presented With Badges—
The School a Fine Success.

The public will be interested to know that the Masonic Hall School is now meeting the full measure of success hoped for by the most enthusiastic of its founders. Sixty pupils are enrolled; in the music department nineteen; every seat in the Masonic Hall is occupied, consequently a larger enrollment is not desired.

The trustees are highly gratified at the faithfulness and efficiency of the teachers, and the quality of the work that is being done; and the teachers express themselves as being pleased with the general deportment of the pupils and the harmonious on-going of the school work.

On Tuesday afternoon some of the trustees and other friends visited the school and after a brief, appropriate address by Col. Harry Skinner, each pupil was presented with a neat button badge in red and blue, inscribed, "Masonic Hall School, Greenville N. C." with the world wide Masonic emblem in the center. Col. Skinner felicitously told the pupils that in the political world men were known by various badges and that henceforth the members of this school are also to be known by a badge of highest honor, bearing an emblem more widely known and more widely worn than any other in the whole world.

The trustees are also much gratified at the promptness with which nearly all bills have been paid; and with such ready co-operation and appreciation on the part of the public, they feel that the permanent success of the school is assured. This week closes the second month of the school, and as soon as the report can be made out THE REFLECTOR will publish the honor roll, that is, all pupils who make a general average of ninety-five and upwards. This will be an honor indeed, but it cannot be reached where the general grade has been materially lowered by absent or tardy marks. Parents should bear this in mind and see to it that their children are at school every day and promptly on time.

This thing of promptness is far more important than the average parent is aware. Other things being equal the pupil that is at school every day and present at every recitation will attain the highest scholarship, and what is more important form habits of faithfulness, promptness, industry that will be of incalculable value in all after work of like.

Reasons for Voting for Carr.

 We have not a word to say against any of the gentlemen who aspire to that high office. They are all men of ability and would doubtless reflect honor upon the State wherever called to serve.

But we are frank to say that our choice for United States Senator is Gen. Julian S. Carr. Our reasons for this choice are as follows:

1. General Carr has proven himself loyal to the best interests of North Carolina. From the time he began business to the present hour he has, with an unsparing hand, given of his means to build up our industrial, educational and religious enterprises.

2. General Carr's political record is clean. He has been a persistent and life long Democrat. The Vampire Parent.

Tom Yandle was arrested last night for being drunk and abusing his family and was locked up for trial this morning. If the usual custom follows he will be fined by the mayor; his children will pay the fine, and he will go home to loaf until he feels inclined to get drunk again.

Yandle is one of those vampire parents who are so frequently mentioned in the police court reports of The Observer. He has a very large family and when he was up before the mayor a couple of weeks

ago he said, with a certain pride, that his children made \$3.50 a night by working in the Atherton Cotton Mill. Therefore, he considers it not necessary that he should work. In his own sphere he lives like a lord, and in the part of his programme that includes cursing and mistreating his little children he feels no shame even when sober. Within the last three months it is shown by the police court record that he has been arrested, imprisoned and fined four times for drunkenness, and his children's money bought his whiskey and paid his fines.

As has been repeatedly stated in this paper, Yandle is only one of a type too common in this community. And 'tis a class that the law does not seem to get at somehow.—Charlotte Observer.

Sad Tragedy at Clinton.

Clinton, Oct. 22.—One of the most shocking tragedies in the history of Sampson county occurred here Saturday night. It was the killing of Lee Murrill by his brother-in-law, Lee Kirby. Kirby was drinking and Murrill was trying to get him off home when, in a drunken frenzy, he cut Murrill on both arms, severing an artery in one. The wounded man bled to death in a short while. He was beyond hope when the surgeons got to him.

The dead man leaves a wife and one child. Kirby was unmarried. Both were men of excellent families and the tragedy is greatly deplored in this community. Kirby is in jail and will be tried at the February term of court. He is overwhelmed with a realization of the enormity of his crime and has been speechless since becoming sober and learning of Murrill's death. The families of both have the sympathies of this community. Murrill came here from Onslow county and his body was taken there to-day for burial.

Mr. Simmons and Mr. Carr are both good men, but since only one of them can be elected, I am in favor of Mr. Simmons, not, however, solely because he so gallantly and successfully fought out the two last campaigns, but because he has better and higher accomplishments that will make themselves felt for the greater good and glory of North Carolina in the Senate of the United States.
