Killed in a Baseball Game.

Reidsville, Oct. 28.—Mr. Stafford Turner, a member of the Berry baseball team, was killed yesterday afternoon in a game at Sunnyside, five miles from here. This team had an engagement with the Mizpah ball club to play at Sunnyside yesterday. During the game, Mr. Turner was on the first base and his friend, Temple Harrison, was coaching him. Turner tried to make the second base, but finding that he could not do so safely, turned, and attempted to return to the first base. In avoiding the first baseman he collided with Harrison, who was struck with such force that he was thrown to the ground and Turner fell upon Harrison's uplifted knee, causing some internal derangement that resulted in his death in about 45 minutes.

Immediately after the accident he was surrounded by friends. He told them that he knew he was going to die. They tenderly bore him to the shade of a neighboring tree. He summoned his brothers, sisters and friends to his side and affectionately bade them all farewell. He exonerated his friend, Harrison, of all blame in the matter and said that he himself was the cause of his death, but that he was not afraid to die. He was conscious to within 10 minutes of his death. A doctor had been summoned, but he did not arrive until a half hour after the young man had died.

Mr. Turner was to have been married before Christmas. He had brought his sweetheart to witness the game and her presence made the accident more pathetic.

The funeral took place this afternoon at Mizpah church, of which he was a member. Rev. Mr. Cecil, of the Haw River circuit Methodist Protestant church officiated.

Three months ago when the Democrats of North Carolina stood shoulder to shoulder battling for the success of white supremacy, one little dreamed that in this short time many of those same men would be turning on each other, and Democrats be fighting Democrats with all the bitterness and venom with which they ever opposed the common enemy. The characters of none seems too high to escape attack, the motives of none so pure but what they are impugned, and even the gray haired veteran of Democracy who has borne the heat and burden of campaigns for a quarter of a century and more, is insulted and thrust to the heart by supposed friends, all because he dares to express a preference for one Democrat above another, when each is equally true and deserving. Yet this is the spectacle the Senatorial primary has brought us to. It is a shame to the Democracy of the State that such a condition exists.

If the discussion incident to the Senatorial primary has developed as much bitterness and dissension all over the State as it has in Greenville (and from accounts in the papers we judge that it is even worse in some places than here) then it was a bad step for North Carolina Democracy when the State convention adopted the plan for the primary. To say that many good Democrats are becoming disgusted with the primary idea is but speaking the plain truth. It is too late to recall it now, but we think this one taste of it will be as much as the people of North Carolina want. If it was not too late it might not be a bad idea for the people to have nothing to do with the primary and not to vote for a Senator, but let the selection be left entirely with the Legislature.

THE REFLECTOR favors the election of United States Senators by a direct vote of the people, but in that event the candidates for the Senate ought to be nominated by our regular conventions just like we nominate our candidates for Governor and other offices. We do not favor a measure that brings as much disruption and discord into the ranks of the party as this Senatorial primary has brought. It is working injury to the party.

All kinds of underhand schemes will be sprung this week when it is thought the opposition will not have time to counteract their influence. But such is American politics, and it would be a good plan to believe nothing you see, hear or read concerning the candidates, for this week at least.—Durham Herald.
