GOVERNOR JARVIS IS NOT SUPPORTING EITHER.

Seeing conflicting reports as to Governor Jarvis' position in the Senatorial contest. THE REFLECTOR called on him today and requested a statement from him; and the following interview we think makes plain his position.

REFLECTOR—Governor, we see it reported by a correspondent from Greensboro that you are supporting General Carr for Senator and by another correspondent from Goldsboro that you are supporting Mr. Simmons. Which is correct?

Governor Jarvis—Neither statement is correct. They are both good citizens. They have rendered valuable service to their party and to their State. They are both men of character and ability. Either is worthy of my support but I am not supporting either. Men who know neither have asked me to advise them how to vote. I have declined to advise them. While I have tried to do each justice when asked about them, I have not taken sides for either and I shall not. I formed this resolution when I withdrew and I shall keep it. If to forget that both have antagonized me in my ambitions, and to speak kindly and truthfully of them and their services, has helped either or both then, to that extent I have supported the one helped, and I do not regret it. I shall continue to speak kindly of each but I shall not attempt to influence a vote for either. Any statement that I am taking sides for either is unauthorized and untrue.

OUR RALEIGH LETTER

A Republican Trick.

RALEIGH N. C., Oct. 30, 1900.

I have just learned from sources not to be doubted that the Republican and fusion Populist "leaders" (all of whom are so anxious to see Chairman Simmons defeated at the primary next Tuesday have decided upon a new line of action.

A number of them have been in Raleigh during the last few days, and on Saturday last a conference was held, at which were present the visiting Rep-Pop leaders and local Republicans, "and others."

An exchange of views between them is said to have had a very depressing effect upon the congregation, in that the prospects of Mr. Simmons' success were shown to be entirely too bright to suit them and their purposes.

It was also agreed that they and their followers had made a mistake in so plainly and conspicuously advertising their preference for Gen. Carr, and their determination to assist in his selection at the primary.

It was agreed that all the Republicans and McKinley Populists present should return to their homes and immediately announce a "change of heart." That they should declare loudly and frequently that they are no longer advocates of Gen. Carr's election, but have "for reasons good and sufficient to them" decided that Mr. Simmons is the best man for the place, adding that they will "qualify" themselves and vote for him at the primary.

Of course it was understood that none would do this in reality, but that all will vote against Mr. Simmons when the time comes, on the evening of the day of the primary, after the Democrats have about all voted.

The idea of Republicans and fusion Populists supporting F. M. Simmons, in reality, for any office is so unreal and utterly ridiculous that most people will see through the sham without assistance from any one.

But there may be some who possibly might be tempted to give credence to the imposition which they seek to practice upon them, and to such, Mr. Editor, you will render a service by exposing this latest scheme of the enemies of the Democratic party.

The unlucky 13 is heard from again. The engineer of a passenger train of that number on the Southern railway thought he smelled a hot box and leaning out of his engine was struck by a mail train near the track and killed.

New York has been the scene of another awful fire. Tarrant's drug store, a seven story building caught on fire and a large quantity of chemicals in it caused several terrific explosions. The drug store and several adjoining buildings were blown to atoms and many people were buried in the ruins.

Thanksgiving Proclamation

Washington, Oct. 29.—The State Department to-day issued the following: "By the President of the United States of America.

"A PROCLAMATION.

"It has pleased Almighty God to bring our nation in safety and honor through another year. The works of religion and charity have everywhere been manifest. Our country, through all its extent has been blessed with abundant harvests. Labor and the great industries of the people have prospered beyond all precedent. Our commerce has spread over the world. Our power and influence in the cause of freedom and enlightenment have extended over distant countries and lands. The lives of our official representatives and many of our people in China have been marvelously preserved. We have been generally exempt from pestilence and other great calamities and even the tragic visitation which overwhelmed the city of Galveston made evident the sentiment of sympathy and Christian charity by virtue of which we are one united people; therefore, I, William McKinley, President of the United States, do hereby appoint and set apart Thursday, the 29th of November next, to be observed by all people of the United States at home or abroad, as a day of Thanksgiving and praise to Him who holds the nations in the hollow of His hand. I recommend that they gather in their several places of worship and devoutly give Him thanks for the prosperity wherewith He has endowed us, for seed time and harvest; for the valor, devotion and humanity of our armies and navies, and for all His benefits to us as individuals and as a nation; and that they humbly pray for the continuance of His divine favor, for concord and amity with other nations, and for righteousness and peace in all our ways. In witness I have heretofore set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done at the city of Washington, this 29th day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and one of the Independence of the United States the 125th.

[Signed] "William McKinley.
By the President:
"John Hay, Secretary of State."

There is a growing demand in this State for a reformatory for young criminals. Undoubtedly there is need of it and the subject will doubtless have the considerate attention of the next General Assembly. To build and equip such an institution and to provide means of employment for its inmates are the additional expenses to be met—they must be fed and clothed in the penitentiary. It is to be hoped that the General Assembly can see its way clear to appropriate the sum necessary, but it is to be borne in mind that in addition to the friends of the reformatory, there are others. Many interests, some of them highly deserving, will be clamoring for appropriations, and the prudent legislator cannot vote away money without knowing where it is to come from, let the object be never so meritorious. We should think that a reformatory could be provided at an expense which the State can stand, without inflicting injury to any other institution or interest, existing or prospective, for it need not be large nor expensively constructed. Certainly one is much needed and to the fact no class of our people is more keenly alive than the gentlemen who compose the newly-elected Legislature.—Charlotte Observer.
