Happenings in North Carolina

The Presbyterian Synod for the State is in session at Raleigh. Rev. Dr. W. D. Morton, of Rocky Mount, was elected moderator.

Notice has been served on Congressman W. W. Kitchin, of the Fifth district, that his seat will be contested by his Republican opponent.

Clarence Scott, a young colored fellow, snatched \$50 from the hands of Henry Gregory, colored, this morning and ran. He was later arrested. Clarence said he did not mean to steal the money—but that Gregory owed him the money for work done on his (Gregory's) farm, and would not pay, so, seeing his opportunity he took the money that rightly belonged to him and made away; that he was not trying to escape, and as soon as he found out an officer was after him gave himself up. The case was compromised.—Kinston Free Press.

The Zionist Dream.

The re-establishment of the Jewish nationality and the restoration of Palestine to the Jews is a hope which lives in the hearts of millions of the Chosen People.

The Zionist movement which was organized a few years ago has attained considerable proportions and its leaders confidently predict its success. The fourth Zionist Congress was held in London recently and was attended by delegates from all parts of the world. Many favorable reports as to the growth of the movement were received and there was a display of great enthusiasm.

The American delegates on their return a few days ago were given a reception in New York by more than 3,000 sympathizers. On that occasion the secretary of the American Federated Zionists said:

"We political Zionists desire a charter from the sultan, authorizing us to take back our Holy Land, and we ask the Powers to approve and protect the charter. We desire a full local self-government under the suzerainty of the sultan. Thus ten millions persecuted persons will meet after three thousand years to work out that great destiny of saving the world for which they were called by God."

This is an authentic statement of the political side of the movement. Another member of the association interprets its spiritual side:

"The present movement is a revival of Judaism, which I hope will not cease until the Hebrew race is acknowledged, as in ages past, to be the spiritual leader and comforter to mankind. The God of Abraham is the God of all nations. The world has need of a renaissance of Judaism. The Jews are the only race sufficiently disinterested to be the arbitrators of war."

In the opinion of mankind generally, including, perhaps, a majority of the Jews themselves, Zionism is regarded as an "iridescent dream," but this does not chill the ardor of its advocates or cause them to doubt the ultimate success of their movement.—Atlanta Journal.

Leprosy's Spread in the East.

Mr. Stapleton, writing to The Temple Magazine on mission work among lepers, makes the following appalling statements:

"India has about half a million, China probably as many and Japan 200,000 registered cases. The moment leprosy appears in a man, woman or child, banishment is irrevocably decreed. There is no pity or compassion, for leper, young or old, are turned adrift as unclean things on the highway and by-ways and are dependent for substance on the casual doles of food thrown to them. In India the leper loses caste which is regarded the worst doom. In Japan he is treated with the greatest cruelty. The same is true in China. The leper there is often put to death by fire without compunction, and religion has not a ray of hope for him in the next world."—London Cable 10th.

The Supreme Court of the State has appointed Attorney General Z. V. Waiser as reporter. This leaves the office of attorney General vacant to be filled with appointment by Governor Russell. There are several aspirants for the position, but the Raleigh Post suggests that as it is so near the time for Hon. R. D. Gilmer, Attorney General-elect, to take the position that the Governor might as well appoint him and save putting a man up just to come down in a few weeks. However, the Republicans are too anxious for "pie" to even miss a chance of sitting at the counter for a few weeks.

Prices Rising.

The National Salt Company has put up the price of common salt of a fair quality to \$2.50 per 100 pounds. The price before was \$1.10 per 100 for the same grade. The National Salt Company controls directly 95 per cent. of the salt output of the country, and is able indirectly to dominate the remaining 5 per cent. of the production.

It appears to be settled that J. B. Joyce, late Republican candidate for Congress in the fifth district, will contest the election of Kitchin, Democrat. No matter whether Joyce has any grounds of contest worthy of consideration, he will be given the seat unless the Republican managers decide that they have a big enough majority in the House without him. The merits of the matter won't enter into the case at all.—Statesville Landmark.

Women and Strong Drink.

Chicago physicians are alarmed over the increase of drinking among women.

"I am fearful that such conditions as are reported from London will some time prevail in this country," said Dr. Nicholas Senn. "There is much more drunkenness among women than dreamed of by most people."

"During the last ten years drinking among American women has steadily increased," declared Dr. Sarah Hackett Stevenson. "The increase has been greater among the wealthy classes and the younger social set than among the lower strata of society."

Rhoda Royal Show.

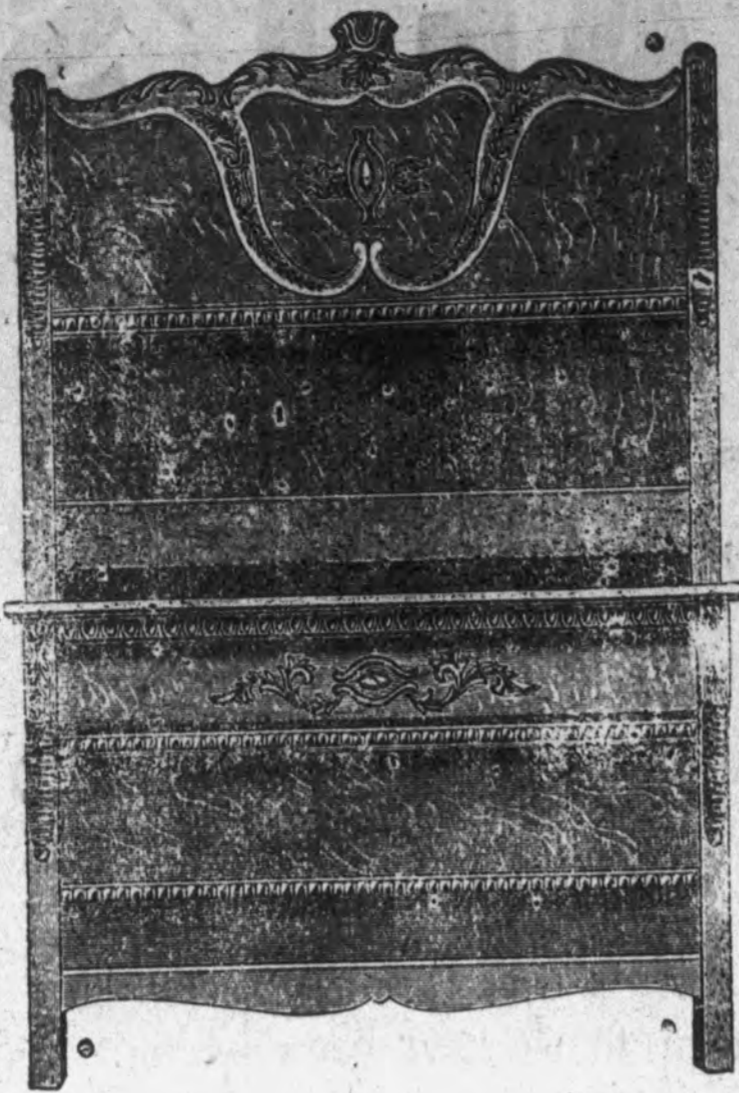

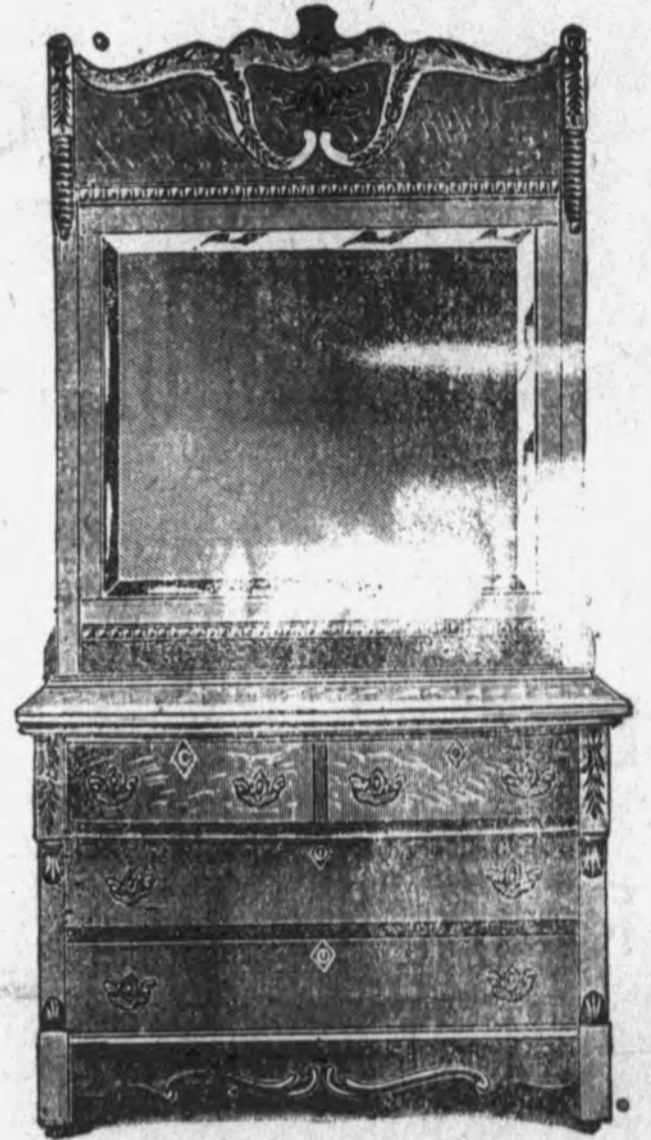
