How They Go After Poll Tax in Mississippi.

The man who does not pay his poll tax in Mississippi on or before the 1st day of February next, under the bill which has passed the Legislature of that State, will have his name published in the county paper as a delinquent, as a man who refuses to contribute \$2 to the education of his own children, but is willing for his neighbor to do so, and let them reap an education by the sweat of the other fellow's face. Moreover, he will be disfranchised and will run the risk of a \$200 fine and six months in jail if he hereafter attempts to vote at a primary election, for, it is asserted, the taxpayers are tired of having their votes killed by such political driftwood, and the judges of the State may be expected to charge the grand juries, who are composed of taxpayers, to indict such persons, and the district attorneys, who in the future must look to the taxpayers for election, will fail not to do their part of the business up to the hilt.—Baltimore Sun.

College hazing appears to be quite the thing just now and before the investigation into the case of Cadet Booz is fairly begun, another one is in order. A dozen toughs who belonged to a university near Chicago disguised themselves with masks, and going to the room of a young student named Frank Lust, carried him to the woods, where he was blindfolded and his clothes removed. Then he was coated with ink and soft soap from head to foot, after which his tormentors lined up and compelled him to run the gauntlet. It is time that the law should furnish protection to the gentlemen students who desire to attend some of the colleges and universities of the country, from the bandit element which appears to have captured these institutions. It is a pleasure, in this connection, to call attention to the absence in Southern schools, of any such brutality as that which has been recorded in recent dispatches. Pic For Lawyers.

In 1894 the Hon. T. J. Jarvis, then a United States Senator, made a speech in Statesville. The old man, with prophetic ken doubtless foresaw the defeat of the Democracy that year, for in the course of his remarks he told the voters, while urging them to support the Democratic ticket, that if they insisted on defeating the Democracy he could stand it if they could, because he believed such a result would make much business for lawyers and being a lawyer himself he would participate in the benefits.

Gov. Jarvis was right. The advent of a fusion administration in North Carolina made an immense amount of business for the lawyers, as everybody recalls. (We are reminded of this fact by the report of the committee which has just completed the examination of the books of the State Treasurer, which report sets forth that for the past two years (1899 and 1900) the State paid out for legal services nearly \$22,000. This expenditure is open to criticism and there is room for reform. The State has an Attorney General who is paid a salary to look after the State's interests. But it is said that Gov. Russell, having an intense personal dislike for Attorney General Walshe, entirely ignored him and employed outside attorneys to appear in cases in which the State was interested, paying these attorneys large fees. Some of this expenditure was doubtless necessary and some of it was not.

Among the lawyers who have fattened off the State Treasury, or who received the largest fees in the period mentioned, are Col. John W. Hinsdale, of Raleigh, who was paid \$2,124; W. C. Douglass, \$2,580; C. A. Cook, \$2,356; J. C. L. Harris \$2,238 Simmons, Pou & Ward \$3,000, Pou & Ward and W. T. Dortch, \$1,983; J. H. Pou, \$1,818 H. G. Conner, \$1,000.

It is to be hoped that the General Assembly can find some way by which this great drain on the State Treasury can be stopped. It is utterly unreasonable.—Statesville Landmark.

Contracts For Warships.

Washington, Dec. 18.—The Board of Naval Construction, considering the bids for the construction of battleships and cruisers, has settled these points:

One of the big armored cruisers shall go to Cramps, one to Newport News, and one to the Union Iron Works in California. One battleship shall go to the Fore River Engine Works at Quincy, Mass.

This leaves seven ships to be disposed of, and while in view of the fact that another meeting of the board is to be held, it is not possible to make the prediction with absolute accuracy, the indications are that these will be distributed as follows:

One cruiser and one battleship to Cramps, making three for them, one cruiser and one battleship to Newport News, making three for them, one cruiser and one battleship to the Union Iron Works, making three for them and one battleship to the Bath Iron Works. There is still a possibility that Moran Brothers of Seattle, may get the battleships slated for the Union Iron Works, or the Bath Iron Works.

Timely Suggestion.

The Lenoir Topic recalls a matter which has been suggested before, and which merits the attention of the next general assembly. The Topic says "some way ought to be provided for supplying the place of a judge who is providentially hindered from being present at court."

Providence is not always respon-

sible for the failure of a judge to reach and hold court, nor for his leaving frequently before his work is finished, but there are occasions when, from one or another good cause, the presiding judge is unable to reach a county and hold court. In such emergencies we agree with our contemporary that there should be some provision for supplying the appointment. In some States members of the bar present are permitted to choose a temporary judge, and thus public business is carried on. It is claimed, too, by this means a decided improvement in the presiding officer is frequently secured.

It is a subject the legislature can contemplate with propriety.—Raleigh Post.

The Christmas order of the South Carolina dispensary is now being filled, the Richmond Dispatch has discovered, and adds: "It consists of 2,200 barrels, or several trainloads, of liquor, and along with it is an order for 150 carloads of glass—half-pint, pint and quart flasks—which will be shipped in five trains of thirty cars each. The purchasing authorities say that the business of the dispensary has expanded enormously of late, and they expect the increase to continue as long as the price of cotton stays up."

Do Not Lay On Sundays.

A subscriber to the Commonwealth says that partridges do not lay on Sundays. He says he has reached this conclusion from observations made both when he was a boy and since he has become a man. This is something not generally known, and no doubt some will have fun at the expense of our subscriber's observations, but nevertheless he says it is true.—Scotland Neck Commonwealth.

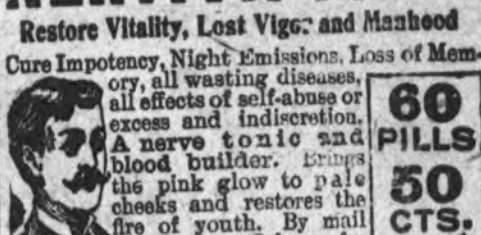
