MURDER AT FALKLAND.

John Parker Slays Alex Little.

We do not believe Pitt county has had a more cold blooded and unprovoked murder than one that occurred at Falkland Saturday, when John Parker wilfully slew Alex Little, both parties white.

Saturday morning John Parker was sworn in as a special police officer at Falkland. During the day he heard a noise in Nichols' bar and went in to tell the parties inside to make less noise. Alex Little was in there quietly settling some bills. Parker said to Little "You are the very man I have been looking for. I understand you said no Falkland policeman could arrest you."

To this Little replied "I have made no such remark and had no occasion to make it, for I have done nothing to be arrested for."

"Come take a drink with me then," said Parker.

Little agreed to take the drink with Parker. They went up to the counter and the drinks were poured out, when Parker stepped back and said. "Before we take this drink I want to know if you take back what you said."

Little again replied "I have said nothing to take back. What is the matter with you?"

Quick as a flash Parker drew his pistol and emptied it into Little, killing him almost instantly. Parker made his escape.

Coroner Laughinghouse went out to hold an inquest and found the above particulars of the murder.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 21st.

McKinley is eating the crow prepared for him by the Senate when it thoroughly Americanized the Hay-Pauncefote treaty before ratifying it as though he enjoyed crow as much as he did Christmas turkey. But that isn't strange. He is always in favor of what the majority favors. He has heard from the people as well as from the Senate, and will direct that the amended treaty be forwarded to the British government with as much complacency as though it hadn't been amended at all. Secretary Hay made easier for him by giving out an official statement saying that he was personally responsible for the wording of the original treaty, and that it was agreed to by the British Ambassador without the crossing of a "t" or the dotting of an "i". This action of Mr. Hay was but following the example of Alger who made himself a scapegoat to save Mr. McKinley's feelings. It is the belief of most Senators that England will accept the amended treaty, but many of them do not hesitate to say that it is perfectly immaterial to them whether she does or not.

Senator Hanna took occasion before Congress adjourned until January 3, for the holiday recess, to do some vigorous cracking of the party whip over the heads of those republican Senators who have dared to express opposition to the Ship subsidy bill. He threatened them with all sorts of things if they did not get into line for the bill by the time Congress reassembled, and added that no republican who opposed the bill need expect any favors from the administration. Whether those tactics will win cannot be told until the Senate is again in session.

Extravagance is in the Washington atmosphere, and all sorts and conditions of men are trying to get some of the Treasury surplus which they expect Congress to appropriate at this session. When the House committee on Rivers and Harbors met, at the beginning of the session, it was understood by the members that the bill to be prepared should not carry a total of more than \$40,000,000. The understanding was knocked into a cocked hat by the provisional agreement by the committee to items in the bill which, with provision continuing contracts, nearly doubled the amount first named. That frightened the committee and a decision was reached to cut the total of the appropriations carried by the bill down to \$60,000,000, which in the opinion of most persons, be a sizable amount.

Wilmington's Police Census is 69 People Shy.

Wilmington, Dec. 20.—The police census of the city of Wilmington has been completed. It gives the population as being 20,907, which is just 69 less than the government figures made it. Before the nose count by the police was made, the impression prevailed that the government had considerably underestimated the population. Neither the police count nor the estimate of the government includes the cotton mill and trucking settlements on the suburbs.
