Goldsboro, March 12.—J. W. Williamson, of Mount Olive, and Mrs. P. S. Carllis, of California, if not already man and wife, are to wed very soon. Williamson, having done two years service in the Philippine Islands, returning to his home, stopped some weeks in California where Mrs. Carllis became infatuated with him. Williamson, a few weeks since, came to Mount Olive, to be followed later by the widow to claim him as her own. Since Saturday the couple have been guests at the Kenon Hotel, this city. Yesterday they telegraphed Williamson's parents at Mount Olive that they were married here. Today the couple boarded the west-bound train for some point in Colorado. Mrs. Carllis says they will stop en route tomorrow and be married.

The woman is reported to be quite wealthy, owning a large estate in California and a profitable mining interest in Colorado. She seems to have plenty of cash and is paying all expenses. She is a woman of culture. With her is her child, a little boy about 8 years old. The little fellow is very bright and talks quite freely. His mother claims that Mr. Carllis is dead, but the child says his father is alive and resides at Cape Nome. The woman claims that her love for Williamson is heaven-born and that she cannot live without him and she is amply able to provide for him. Williamson is about 25 years of age. The woman is older.

### Keep Your Money At Home.

In Modes and Fabrics for March, issued for dealers in millinery, there is taken for the text of an editorial one of Aesop's fables that tells of a dog crossing a stream with a piece of meat. He saw its shadow in the stream and thinking it larger than the one he already had, plunged in after it. Result: the loss of that which he already had. The following application is then made.

"If the money which is yearly expended in the purchasing of merchandise for home consumption, is retained at home and put back into circulation through the business firms of our city, many satisfactory results can be obtained.

"For instance, there is not a merchant of our place who has not exercised the greatest care in choosing his stock of goods to meet the demands of every consumer among the people from whom he draws his patronage. Suppose, then, one of these patrons of his store chances to read an alluring announcement from a dealer in some distant city. This patron drops the choice the home merchant has bought for her use, and sends her money away, chasing shadows in the stream of a far off market.

"What is the result? The lady is disappointed in her purchase. The merchant at home from whom she should have bought, is left with his goods on hand, and the money which should have been retained at home to encourage home industry, to beautify our parks and improve our city's streets, has gone to do the same good deeds in another place."

### Blizzard in the West.

St. Paul, Minn., March 12.—Special dispatches report a bad blizzard raging throughout a portion of the Dakotas, Minnesota and Wisconsin. In Northern Wisconsin a heavy snow is falling which is drifting badly and blocking roads. The temperature has fallen fifty degrees. Twelve inches of snow has fallen at Rice Lake, Minn. There was a squally time in the Senate Wednesday afternoon. While one bill was under discussion, Senator Gudger, of Buncombe used language in criticising the committee that was deemed too personal and objectional.

Former President Benjamin Harrison died of pneumonia, Wednesday afternoon, at his home in Indianapolis. He was about 68 years old, had been much in public life, and in his death the country loses one of its foremost men.

How The Money Flies.

It will be remembered what a howl was raised over the extravagance of the congress which first touched the billion dollar mark with its appropriations.

But the billion dollar congress has been made to appear almost parsimonious by the unbridled extravagance of the congress which went out of existence yesterday.

It boomed out of sight so far past the billion dollar point that it reached about a billion and a half.

At its first session its appropriations amounted to \$710,150,862, and at its second session it authorized expenditures amounting to \$750,000,000.

This terrific raid upon the treasury is not only defended by leading Republicans, but they go to the extent of speaking contemptuously of the billion dollar congress as fit only for our parochial days.

They are already laying schemes to make the next congress even more extravagant than the one lately deceased. On their programme are such additional items as a ship subsidy bill, a Pacific cable bill and others that will involve a total expenditure of several hundred million dollars.

The Republican party seems ambitious to give the country a two billion dollar congress.—Atlanta Journal.

WORKING FOR HIS STATE.

W. E. Porter Wishes to Have It Well Represented at Buffalo.

Each county in North Carolina should vie with the rest in making preparations for a display of their products at the Pan-American Exposition. The Exposition authorities will have prepared a very large bound book, which will be put in a prominent place for the purpose of giving every province, county or territory of each country or state the privilege of entering therein descriptions of geographical position and the adaptability of soil, climatic advantages, water, water power, timber, important rivers traversing territory, and manufactures.

We can see at once the great good that might be accomplished, at small cost for our different sections of the state, in presenting the advantages and resources of North Carolina. We could truthfully say that our state possesses a variety of soils, productions and climatic advantages not possessed by many other countries.

We would first present to the reader the adaptability of our soils for the different crops and products. Reference could be made to the western portion of our state and its suitability for all kinds of grasses, grains, stock raising, etc.; the Piedmont section for tobacco, cotton and all the different cereals; and the eastern section for turpentine, rice, lumber, manufactures and fisheries.

I have had the pleasure of being in the city of Buffalo for some time, and have been in close touch with the Pan-American officials. I find that they are exerting every effort within their power to make this Exposition a grand success.
