

Warrants were sworn out against Brown and the two negroes, Staton and McKnee, who were arrested and given a preliminary hearing yesterday at Conetoe. In default of bail they were committed to jail in Greenville.

Brown declares that the negroes are lying about him; that he is perfectly innocent, but all the circumstances seem to completely negative his assertions.

Staton says that he was paid by Brown and McKnee to carry the cotton to Conetoe, and McKnee vows that he did not steal, but





"Let us take another case. A. owns a piece of land which B. desires to purchase. B. has no money but gives A. his note with a mortgage on the land as security for payment. B. gives in the land mortgage. No money existed previous to the transaction but a debwas created by the transfer of the land. We ask The Landmark if this is not a case of double taxation ? "

It is not. If B. had paid A. the money for the land A. would have returned the money for taxation. B. has no money but he gives some thing in place of it-a note and mortgage which represents the money he should have received. This paper is negotiable and tracsferable and it can be used in many instances in place of the money which it represents. It is a separate and distinct piece of property from the land just as much as if B. had traded A. horses or cattle or any other piece of property for the land and both are therefore taxable. No double taxation there .-Statesville Landmark.






