As To School Children.

The following portion of the new State health law will be of interest to parents and teachers:

The school committees of public schools, superintendents of graded schools and the principals of private schools shall not allow any pupil to attend the school under their control while any member of the household to which the pupil belongs is sick of either smallpox, diphtheria, and measles, scarlet tever, typhus fever or cholera or during a period of two weeks after the death, recovery of removal of such sick person, and any pupil coming from such household shall be required to present to the teacher of of the school the pupil desires so attend a certificate from the attending physician, city health officer or county superintendent of health of the facts necessary to entitle him to admission in accordance with the above regulations. A wilful failure on the part of any school committee to perform the duty required in this section shall be deemed a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall subject each and every member of the same to a fine of not less than one nor more than twenty-five doilars: Provided, that the instructions in accordance with the provisions of this section given to the teachers of the schools within twenty-four hours after the reception of each and every notice shall be deemed performance of duty on the part of the school committee. Any teacher of a public school and any principal of a private school failing to carry out the requirements of this action shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less then one nor amore than twenty-five dollars.
