### AN ACT.

To Establish Graded Schools in the Town of Greenville N. C.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Sec. 1. That all the territory embraced within the following limits in the town of Greenville, Pitt County to wit: Beginning on Tar River at the River Bridge foot of Pitt street, thence up said River to the first branch commonly called Skinner's ravine, thence with said ravine or branch to the Eastern boundary line of the W. & W. Railroad where it crosses said branch, thence with said Eastern boundary of right of way said Railroad to Tar River, thence up Tar River to the present corporate limits of said town, thence with said corporate limits of said town to the River road at a point where 5th street extended would cross said line, thence with said River road for 5th street to J. L. Suggs, northwest corner on said street, thence his line so as to include his lot to the western line of the right of way of the W. & W. Railroad, thence across said Railroad to John Flanagan's southwestern corner on said right of way, thence his back line and W. H. Bagwell's Miss Martha O'Hagan's, and Dr. C. O. H. Langhoush's back line to Pitt Street, thence across Pitt Street an air line to S. T. Hooker's back line, thence his line, Miss McKenny Perkins and J. A. Andrews' back line to C. D. Rountree's corner on his back line, thence C. D. Rountree's line to Greene Street, thence down Greene Street to the Methodist Parsonage's Southern corner on said Street, thence with said Parsonage line to R. W. King's line, thence his line to Frank Tyson's, thence with B. F. Tyson's back line including said Tyson lot to Dickinson Avenue, thence with Northern side of Dickinson Avenue to R. A. Tyson's first corner on said street, thence his back line including said lot to Greene Street, thence across Greene Street to C. D. Rountree's Northeast corner, thence his line so as to include his lot and R. A. Tyson's line to Pitt Street, thence up said Pitt Street, to B. C. Shepherd's northeast corner, thence his line to a point one-half distance between Pitt and Clark Streets, thence from his point a line parallel with Pitt Street an air line to Zeng Moore's line, thence his line to Clark Street, thence with Clark Street to Dickerson Avenue, thence with Dickerson Avenue in a westerly direction to the first ditch crossing said street, thence up said ditch crossing said street, thence up said ditch to the W. & W. Railroad trestle over said ditch, thence an air line from said trestle to the northeast corner of old college lot, thence with old college line in westerly direction and southerly direction including said College lot, to old plank road, thence along and across in a south westerly direction old plank road to E. A. Moye's Northeast corner, thence his line to a point 60 feet north of Broad Street, thence a line parallel with Broad Street and 60 feet north of said street to the western boundary of the right of way of the W. & W. Railroad, thence along said right of way to a point where Eleventh Street extended would cross said railroad, thence with the line of

Eleventh Street to a point where an air line drawn from the Eastern side of Liberty Warehouse would cross said Street, thence a line made by extension of eastern side of Liberty Warehouse to Ninth Street, thence Ninth Street 200 feet in an easterly direction, thence a line parallel with the eastern side of Liberty Warehouse to Twelfth Street, thence with Twelfth Street to the road leading from Greenville to Greene's Mill Run, thence with said road in a northerly direction to Alfred Forbes' northeast corner of the lot on which he now lives, thence his line to the livery stable lot of G. M. Tucker and Rickey Moore, thence their eastern line to Fifth Street, thence with Fifth Street in an easterly direction to a point midway between Cotanch and Read Streets, thence a line from this point parallel with Cotanch Street to Second Street, thence with Second Street to Evans Street, thence with Evans Street to a point midway between First and Second streets, thence a line midway between First and Second streets to eastern line of Washington Street, thence with Washington Street to a point midway between Second and Third Streets, thence this line parallel with Washington Street to Second Street, thence with Second Street to Washington Street thence with Washington Street to a point midway between First and Second Street to Pitt Street, thence an air line parallel with Second Street to Pitt Street, thence with Pitt Street to the beginning, shall be and is hereby constituted the Greenville Graded School District, No. 1. That the Aldermen of the town of Greenville are hereby authorized and directed to submit to

the qualified voters of the above described district at such time (not later than the First Monday in June) under such rules and regulations as they may prescribe, whether an annual assessment shall be levied in said district for the support of the graded schools for the children of said district, and at said election such qualified voters as are in favor of levying the assessment here in after prescribed for the purpose of maintaining the graded schools shall vote a written or printed ballot with the words "for school" upon it and such voters as are opposed to the levying of such assessments shall vote a written or printed ballot with the words "against school" upon it, and the penalties for illegal and fraudulent voting shall be in all respects the same as in the annual elections for Mayor and Commissioners of the town of Greenville.

Sec. 2. That in case a majority of the qualified voters of said district shall be in favor of the assessment hereinafter prescribed for the purpose of a graded school the same shall be levied and collected by the town Commissioners of the town of Greenville under the same rules and regulations by which other assessments are levied and collected. And the town tax collector shall be subject to the same penalties and liabilities for the collections of said assessments and the payment thereof to the town treasurer as he may be for other town assessments.

The REFLECTOR has received from Mr. A. D. McNair, Superintendent of the experimental farm of the North Carolina State Horticultural Society, located at Southern Pines, a pamphlet entitled "Experiments with Fertilizers." This pamphlet has been published for the purpose of instructing farmers how they can carry out practical field tests on a simple scale. It is for free distribution and any one can get a copy by addressing the Superintendent of Experiment Farm, Southern Pines, N. C.

It strikes us that the farmers of this section can raise corn cheaper than it costs to buy it from the west and pay freight on it. If last year's crop was not enough to last to planting time this year, as is evidenced from the fact that corn is already being shipped in, then it does look like it would be wise to avoid a recurrence of this by planting a larger corn acreage this year and not so much cotton. We never could see the wisdom of a Pitt county farmer buying corn and hay when they are about the easiest crops he could make.

Jacksonville, Fla., was visited by a fire Friday that came near destroying the whole city. The fire extended over a territory thirteen blocks wide and two miles in length, sweeping one hundred and forty-eight blocks clear of buildings. The property loss will amount to \$10,000,000 and several people perished. Ten thousand people were rendered homeless and much suffering follows the disaster. The government has forwarded a lot of tents to Jacksonville to give immediate shelter to the sufferers and many cities have already sent large donations. Every section of the country should send aid as quickly as possible.

These are the locations of the other routes as furnished THE REFLECTOR by Mr. Wm. A. Barr, special agent.

Route No. 2.—From Greenville along the Old Plank Road to T. E. Hooker's corner, thence to Forbes' Schoolhouse, thence to R. Tripp's corner, thence to J. J. May's gin house, thence to H. Tyson's corner, thence to Amos G. Cox's corner, thence to Reedy Branch church, thence to the Tar road at J. N. Vinson's, thence to Greenville. Length 22½ miles.

Route No. 3.—From Greenville along the Newbern road to Samuel Cory's store, thence to F. Cox's gin house, thence along the Taft road to the Black Jack road, thence to the River road, thence along the River road to Greenville. Length, 22½ miles.

Route No. 4.—From Greenville along the Bethel road to Hous Station; thence to L. Fleming's corner; thence to K. Staton's corner; thence to Richard Teel's corner; thence to Gum Swamp church; thence to Bell's X roads; thence along the Tarboro road to Whitehead's X roads; thence along the river road to the Bethel road; thence to Greenville. Length 22 miles.

By direction of the Postmaster General it is required that on all rural free delivery routes hereafter to be established those desiring the service must be prepared to put up, in the manner prescribed by the Department, boxes to be selected from the accompanying list, the boxes on each route to be uniform. Which particular box shall be selected must be decided by the patrons themselves, either through the appointment of a committee or in some other way:

The short school term is the bane of the public schools of this State, and this is caused by the lack of money to pay teachers. A movement for volunteer teachers has begun. Miss Lena Brinkley, of Scotland county, is the first to volunteer. She offered to teach eight weeks without compensation in order that the school in her district may have a longer term. Miss Fannie Heck, of Raleigh, who is in North Carolina somewhat like Miss Helen Gould is in New York, writes the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Gen. Toon, that she has arranged for the continuance of 50 public schools by volunteer teachers. The superintendent has replied in a letter, warmly thanking her for her interest in the work, and assuring her of his co-operation. This movement is likely to spread. It is argued that young men and young women might do quite as much in volunteer teaching of public schools as they do in teaching Sabbath schools, and in this way the stain of illiteracy may in a few years be wiped from the State. Probably the most unique movement of the kind in the country.
