All Must Make New Applicatton.

The following letter has been sent to all chairmen of the county boards of pensions, and explains itself:

DEAR SIR: I send you today, under separate cover, the blank pension applications prepared under the law of 1901. You will observe that the pensioners now on the list will have to appear, either in person, or, if unable to do so, by certificate of physician, before your board for examination and approval, together with all new applicants for pensions. This was considered very essential to a proper grading of pensioners, as well as to enable the board to drop from the list the names of those who do not now meet the requirements of the law. I urge upon your board the necessity of a careful scrutiny of each case, to the end that no unworthy man be placed on the roll.

Mrs. Virginia B. Y. Swepson, who died in Raleigh a few days ago, left an estate valued at nearly \$200,000. In her will she gave \$50,000 to education and charity, \$25,000 of it being to the Baptist University at Raleigh and \$17,000 to Wake Forest College.

. Beginning July 1st and continuing for four weeks a teachers' in stitute for Greene and Pitt counties will be held at Winterville. There will no doubt be a large attendance of teachers and others throughout the entire session. It is more than likely that this institute would have come to Greenville if there had been a suitable building here in which to hold it. But as there was no such building here this town could not even be considered in the selection of a place. If Greenville had her graded [school there would be suitable buildings for holding such assembles, and we would not have to see small towns like Winterville going ahead of us in such things. The fact of Greenyille not having a school building worthy the name ought to make every citizen in favor of the graded school,

We understand that there are few of our citizens who yet have some misapprehension about the clerical error contained in the graded school bill in which the tax clause was made to read not less than 10 cents nor more than 50 cents on the \$1.00 valuation, instead of on the \$100 valuation as the original bill read when introduced. Secretary of State J. Bryan Grimes wrote that the intent of the bill was so clear that our people need give themselves no concern about this clerical error, and that Governor Aycock and Attorney with him in this opinion. So THE REFLECTOR; thinks that any fears our people may have that an excessive tax may be levied under the bill are groundless. WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. U., May 17. Such of the Washington relics which were taken from Arlington House at the beginning of the civil war, and which have been on exhibition in the National Museum for some years, as the desired were this week turned over to Miss Mary Cutis Lee, representing her brother Gen. G. W. C. Lee, their legal owner, by the U.S. Government. Several of the relics, including one of Washington's tents, a treasure chest, a lantern, and a glass candelabra, were left in the National Museum, subject to the order of the owner. Gen Fitz Lee, her cousin, accompanied Miss Lee in her visit to the museum. The final disposition of the articles removed from the museum has not been determined upon. This act of rightful restitution has not seriously injured the Washington exhibit, in the museum, as many of the articles were large pieces of furniture, which have been stored away and others were duplicates which properly belong to the government.

The alleged investigation of the commissary stealing, at Manila, is resulting in the old, old story. Some insignificant persons are being made scapegoats and the big thieves who have a pull, are not touched. Friends of the administration are pointing to the sentence of a sergeant to three years imprisonment and of a civilian employe to five years, as showing that the thieves are being punished, but thoughtful persons regard that news as indicating that the thieves only are to be punished, while the big thieves are left at liberty to enjoy the fruits of their

Ex-Governor McCreary, Chairman of the Kentucky State Democratic Committee, is in Washington. Asked what the democratic outlook in this State was, he replied: "The party is thoroughly organized throughout the State and is in perfect harmony. At no time has there been a better feeling within the party. At the election this fall I think we will carry the state by fifteen or twenty thousand, i having a majority in both branches of the legislature, and a large majority on joint ballot. The legislature then elected will choose a U.S. Senator' If this prediction as to the legislature holds good, Gov. McCreary will be a candidate to succeed Senator Deboe. Speaking of republican claims of many converts in the South and the alleged growth of republican sentitiment in that section, Gov. Mc Creary said: "I know that in Kentucky the tendency is not toward the adoption of republican policies. On the contrary, democratic sentiment is growing stronger. Lobserve that this is true General Gilmer both concurred also of Alabama, where I am familiar with conditions, and I believe that democratic sentiment is growing stronger in the South generally. The Southern people do not believe in high protection, in colonization, in a large standing army, nor in trusts. 
