The statistical report submitted to the recent N. C. Conference at Fayetteville made the following showing: Members in the bounds of the conference, 65,837; churches, 654; value, \$900,115; parsonages, 130; value, \$156,385; new members received on profession of faith 3,348, by certificate, 3,165; pastoral charges, 160.

Andrew Carnegie has made an offer to donate \$10,000,000 to the United States for the purpose of establishing a university for higher education in Washington City. The President will submit Mr. Carnegie's offer to Congress with a special message.

Summons has been served upon Governor Aycock in the suit brought by the State of South Dakota against the State of North Carolina for the redemption of Western North Carolina railroad bonds. The case is returnable before the United States Supreme Court at Washington on the 3rd of next March.

## OUR MEMBERS AND THEIR NEIGHBORS.

Washington, Dec. 9.—The North Carolina members in the House are most pleasantly situated and especially are they in good company.

Mr. Pou has as his near neighbor Mr. Sparkman of Florida, while just one seat removed from him is Mr. Claude Kitchin who sits between Mr. Sparkman and Mr. Lever, of South Carolina. Just back of Mr. Claude Kitchin and in speaking and touching distance is Mr. W. W. Kitchin his brother, who sits between Mr. Davis of Florida, and Mr. Butler, of Missouri. Mr. Klutz is in the row of seats just ahead of Mr. Claude Kitchin and is next to Mr. Bartlett, of Georgia. Just a few seats from Mr. Klutz and on the same row is Mr. Richardson, of Tennessee, the minority floor leader. Mr. Small has a seat near Mr. Claude Kitchin. Mr. Ball, of Texas, being on the right and Mr. Snodgrass, of Tennessee, being on his left. All these North Carolina members are in the middle tier of seats on the Democratic side. Mr. Thomas and Mr. Bellamy did not fare so well in securing seats. They are on the extreme right of the speaker and near the rear. Mr. Thomas has Mr. Patterson, of Tennessee, for his near neighbor, while just in front of him is Mr. Robinson, of Indiana, who will probably be in charge of Mr. Thomas' contest in the House. The proximity gives Mr. Thomas constant opportunity for consultation. Just behind Mr. Thomas is Mr. Bellamy. Mr. Moody and Mr. Blackburn have fairly good seats on the Republican side.
