## A Change of Sentiment.

The report in yesterday's paper that there is a great deal of smallpox at Mt. Olive, taken in connection with frequent items in the newspapers to the same effect as to other localities, suggests the great change which has taken place in the public mind with reference to this disease in a very few years But recently the announcement that a case of smallpox had developed in a given community was sufficient to occasion a panie and cause the people to take to the woods. Indeed, the people of far distant towns took alarm and established quarantine. If a distant newspaper told of the case it incurred the enmity of the people of the locality where the case existed and it was denounced as "trying to injure our town." Now all this is changed. The local paper itself announces the fact, without display or evasion, and the townspeople take it as quite a matter of course. The patient is quarantinea and everybody else goes about his business. The change may be due to the fact that the disease manifests itself in milder form than in former years; maybe the doctors know better how to handle it; or it may be that contact with this as with any other evil begets a tamiliarity which disarms fear. Whatever the reason or reasons the fact remains that smallpox is not the dreaded thing that it once was.
