Charges were preferred against Cheatham, which upon investigation were found to be substantiated, hence the President concluded the best thing to do was to let him down out of the office.

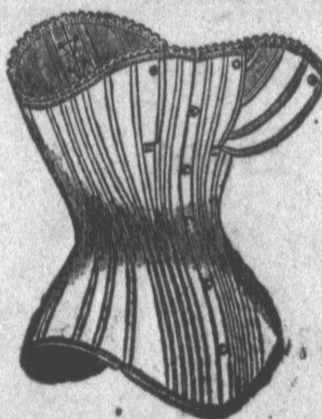

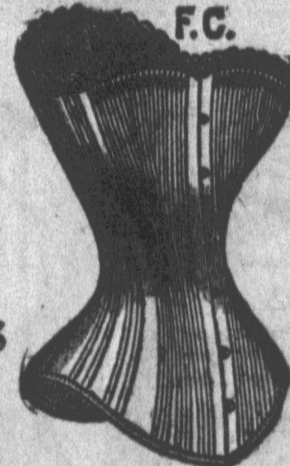
