Of Interest to Shippers.

The express office will be open some earlier than usual on both Monday and Tuesday mornings for the convenience of those wishing to send Christmas presents by express. No package that reaches the office after 8 o'clock can be forwarded on the morning tran, so those expecting to make shipments should not wait until the last min mte. A better plan would be for those to bring in packages during the day Monday that they wish to go off Tuesday morning. The express business is very heavy for the holidays, and shippers can facilitate matters by being far enough ahead to avoid the rush.

State Auditor Dixon has issued letters to a large number of registers of deeds in various counties advising them that under the law they can only collect the merchants' tax provided by the present revenue act from January 1st, 1901, to January 1st, 1902. This tax is now in the form of a pur chase tax, the merchant being re quired to give in the gross amount of his purchases during the year from January to January and Auditor Dixon's letter is to correct an impression that the purchases must be given in from October. This error was due to the fact that the revenue act in operation prior to the 1901 legislature provided a merchants' tax on the capital stock instead of the gross purchases and this capital was given in for taxation in October. 
