#### Broke Her Leg.

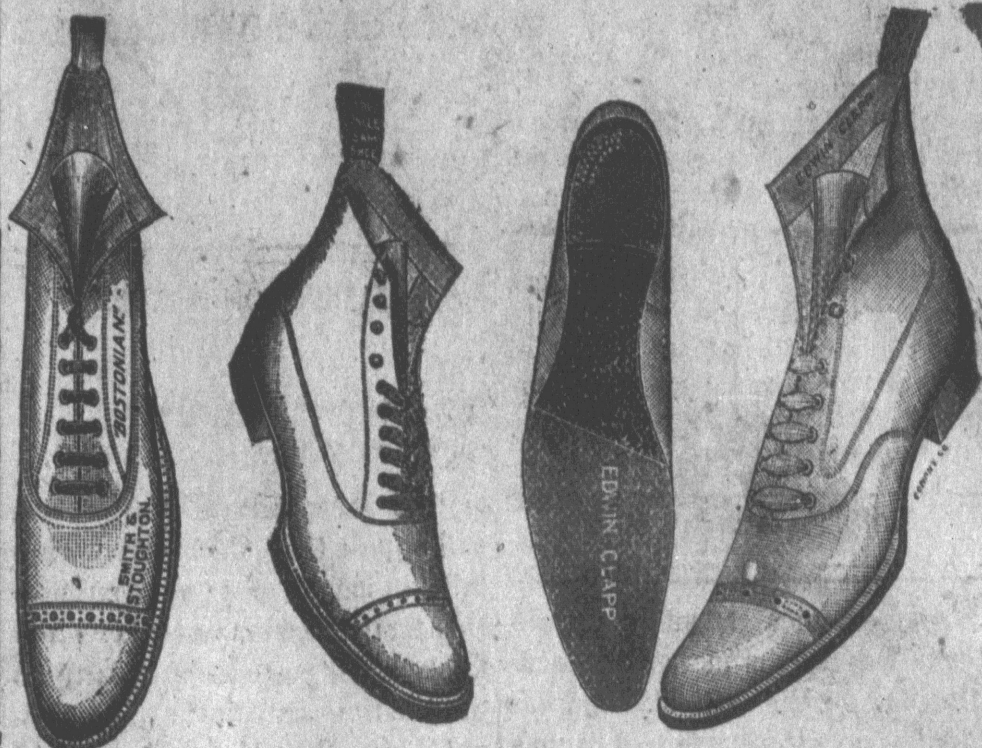

When it is said that there is danger of building too many cotton mills, nobody, so far as we know believes it. The fact is then pointed out that all the mills that are under good business management are paying good dividends. It is further said that many of the mills are being enlarged or their owners are building other mills. It appears to be true of cotton milling as it is of other kinds of business that it pays if wisely managed. The management always settles the question of success rather than the kind of business. We have repeatedly seen men sell out their farms and moved away, because they could make no money on them and their purchasers make a handsome living and lay up money on them. Wise planning and industrious executing usually bring success. This is true of farming, practicing law or any other business.—Lumber Bridge News.

Although the Southern States contain more than one third of the population of the whole number of States. The Atlanta Constitution complains that out of the eight members of the Cabinet there is only one from the South; out of nine Justices of the Supreme Court only two; out of six Ambassadors to foreign countries only one; out of twenty-four Ministers Plenipotentiary only three; only one delegate from the South to the Pan-American Congress, and no Southern envoy to attend the coronation of King Edward. The Constitution insists that such palpable discrimination is a slur upon the Southern people. In this we think the Constitution takes an erroneous view. The South shares with the rest of the country, and in like degree, the consequences of partisan administration. To the victors belong the spoils. The spoils are distributed without reference to the whole population, but with reference to that part of the population which votes the Republican ticket. The Democrats of the North fare as badly as the Democrats of the South. When the time shall come for a political upheaval which shall recall the Democratic party to the control of the Federal Government the South will undoubtedly have its revenge.—Philadelphia Record.

## WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent

WASHINGTON, D. C., Apr. 7.

"The Democrats in the Senate will oppose the Cuban reciprocity bill to a man," said a prominent Democratic Senator yesterday when I asked his position in regard to the pending measure. "The Republicans in the House have held up this legislation until their friend, the sugar trust, has secured options on all of this year's sugar crop and on part of next year's crop. Moreover, by the testimony of their own officials, from the President down, the proposed reduction in the tariff is not sufficiently large to afford any material relief to the Cubans. As a matter of fact, the real purpose of those Republicans in Congress who are championing this bill is to throw a sop to public opinion by appearing to legislate in Cuba's favor while, at the same time, they permit the island to drift into such desperate financial straits that sooner or later she will have to apply for annexation—or the United States will have to interfere to put down an insurrection—and then Cuba will be made a dependency in accordance with Republican policy as demonstrated in the Philippines. No prospect of citizenship will then be accorded to Cuba and she will, if the Republicans are successful, become a possession without a vote in the councils of the nation.

Friday and Saturday both Houses devoted themselves to the consideration of bills providing for the exclusion of the Chinese. Senator Mitchell of Oregon opened the debate in the Senate and Minister Wu was an interested listener in the Senate diplomatic gallery. At times the Celestial gentleman showed unmistakable signs of indignation as the Senator proceeded with his able speech. There is no exact party division on the question of the exclusion of Chinese coolies but there are various differences of opinion as to the best methods to be employed. As soon as the bill is disposed of in the Senate the Philippine government

bill will be taken up and that will be followed by the Cuban bill.

On Tuesday the House of Representatives will take up the Cuban reciprocity bill and, while the debate may, by the stringent rules of the House, be limited in duration it promises to be most interesting. Representative Newlands told me yesterday that he believed the democrats were gradually coming to accept his view of the situation and that he thought a great majority of them would vote for annexation if they had the opportunity.

Quite a romantic marriage took place at Altamahaw one night last week. The contracting parties were Mr. Charles Gillispie and a Miss Evans. There parental objections to the union and the couple went to the home of a Mrs. Moore to have the knot tied. The squire was on hand and quite a little crowd had formed. 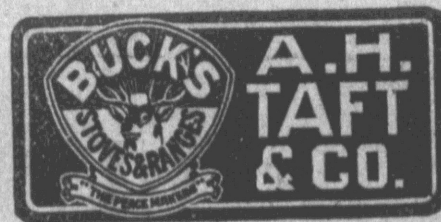
