Switzerland has just completed handsome new parliament buildings at Berne, at a cost of \$1,600,000.

A picture by the French artist, Vernet, valued at \$15,000, has been found in an old St. Louis cafe, where its value was for a long time unsuspected.

Representative Heatwole, of Minnesota, is fighting a trust that imposes a hardship on every newspaper reader. It is the paper trust, than which there is none more rapacious.

The Senate Committee on a National University has reported a resolution raising the standard of admission to include only holders of Master's degrees instead of Bachelor's, as under former bills.

Mr. Roosevelt seems to have lost caste by his use of bronco-busting methods in the White House. The people want a President not influenced by the characteristics of a nimrod or a rough-rider. They want dignity, conservatism, toleration and kindly consideration.

The republican policy of muzzling all persons in government service found its latest victim in an Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, accused of giving "interviews" on a public question. So it is a misdemeanor to let the people know how they are being governed.

Foreign artists, to defeat the ends of the tariff on pictures, are opening American studios where their patrons who care more for the foreign name than they do for abler work by native Americans can buy pictures without the custom-house impost. In this way the tax is working a great hardship to the men it is supposedly designed to protect.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent

WASHINGTON, D. C., Apr. 10.

Events in Congress during the past week have operated to seriously discredit the War Department and Secretary Root, and the Senate Committee on Military Affairs has expressed its disapproval by a vote which is almost an affront to the President and his favorite Secretary. I refer to the refusal of the Committee to report favorably the nomination of Captain Crozier as Chief of the Ordnance Bureau. Through the publication, at the demand of Congress, of the correspondence between General Miles and the President, the Senate Philippines Committee became aware that while the Secretary of War had professed to submit to the Committee all the reports touching on military affairs in the Philippines, he had withheld that of the civil governor of Tabayas, which reflected seriously on the military conduct in the islands. A resolution of the Philippines Committee brought the report with a very feeble excuse from Secretary Root.

The Senate Committee on Military Affairs is indignant because the Secretary withheld from it the report on the transport service which afterwards was sent to the House on the demand of that chamber. The report contains unquestionable evidence of gross extravagance of administration, political favoritism, etc. That these facts should have been made known

only by the invention of the democrats, who introduced the resolution calling upon the Secretary for the reports, is a source of mortification and charge in to the republicans who appreciate that the onus of suppressing the information to which the public is entitled, rests upon them. While space will not permit a recitation of the many disgraceful facts which the reports reveal, it may be said that they bear evidence, among other things, that the expenditure of large sums of money was entrusted to political favorites without the slightest qualifications for their disbursement; that, for instance, \$400,000 was paid for the transport "Mead," a vessel already twenty seven years old and which has since required repairs which have cost upward of \$580,000. According to General Young, preference was shown to particular firms and goods purchased through them which they were not in a position to supply and for which they charged, in some instances, 100 per cent more than the current market price. Extensive purchases were made from political favorites without competition or even the supervision of a competent officer.

With our recent island acquisitions, the area of the United States is now placed at 3,690,822 square miles. Including the population of these islands, we now count about 84,233,000 people, with a variety of colors and a multiplicity of languages.—Wilmington Star.

The State Democratic Convention, that is to assemble in Greensboro, N. 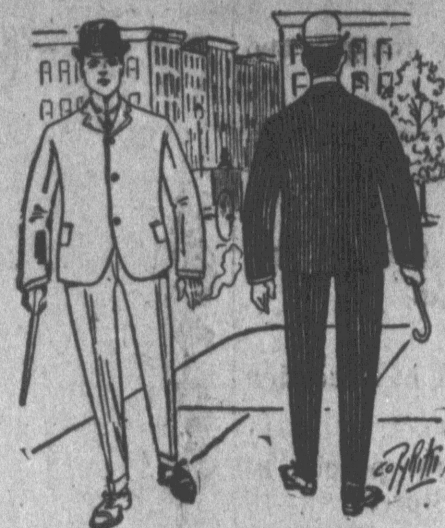

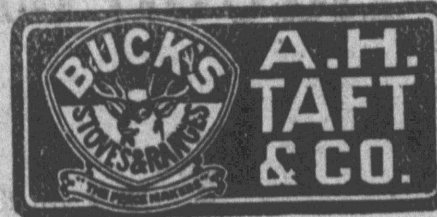

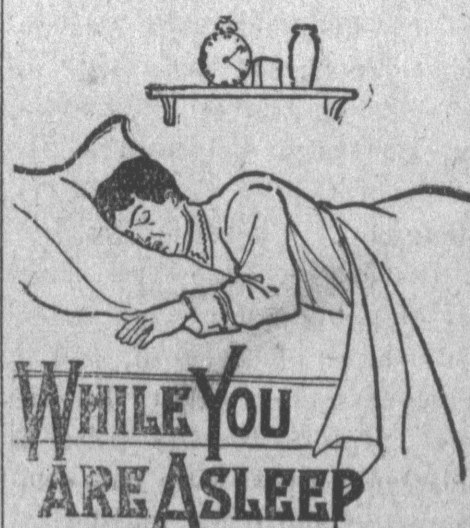
