Sometimes we wonder whether the fundamental error which humanity makes is not its theory of sin.

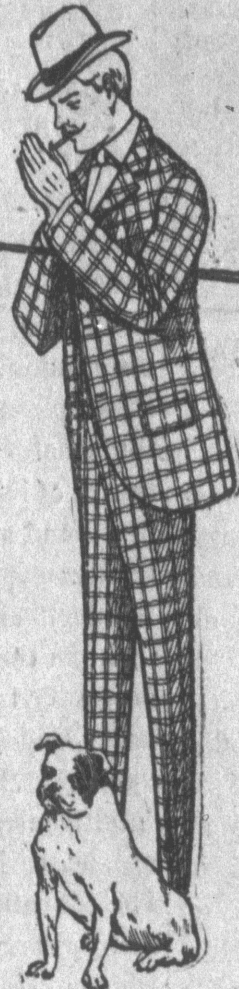

GREENVILLE NEEDS A HOSPITAL.

EDITOR REFLECTOR:

Why should not Greenville have a hospital? Is not such an institution needed to meet the demands of our enterprising county and developing town?

Think about it. Many of the diseases which attack our bodies are most successfully treated in institutions of this kind where all the sanitary precautions can be taken; hence the frequency of people leaving home and undergoing the fatigue and expense of a trip to a hospital elsewhere. A great deal of this could be avoided if we had a hospital at home. Among us are numerous people living in the houses of others, boarding in hotels, or rooming in quarters fitted up in business houses. When they are sick, they are in danger of being neglected or put to extra expense for attention from trained nurses and so on. It would be a great advantage to them if they could with a minimum of expense and no fatigue in traveling be placed in a hospital right at hand.

With people who live in their own houses, a hospital would be a great advantage; as better results can be hoped for in the treatment of most diseases, under the conditions provided in such institutions, than in the average home where too little is known and less thought of the laws of sanitation. If the sick member of the family could be put in the hospital, attended by the family physician, and ministered to by trained hands, the patient would have a greater prospect of recovery while the other members of the family could be engaged in their usual avocations with no risk of infection from the disease. In this way time could be saved, expenses diminished and epidemics prevented.

These and many other reasons might be urged showing the advantage of such an institution to our community; but the practical question is can one be had? I am glad to be able to say, yes. A little pull in the right direction by all of our people both in the town and the county and a little pull all together will effect the early establishment of such an institution in our midst. I am informed by one who is enthusiastically interested in it, that some very flattering substantial encouragements are in sight, provided the people of the town and county will give efficiently to show their own interest in the enterprise.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Apr. 18.

The Civil Government bill will come up for consideration in the Senate tomorrow is an iniquitous measure, said Senator Carmack of Tennessee, yesterday, when I asked his opinion. "As a member of the Philippines Committee," continued the Senator, "I have had an opportunity of listening to testimony at first hand and there is no ground whatever for postponing the establishment of a permanent government in the islands. Neither is it necessary that a census be taken in order that Congress may act intelligently. The Filipinos are an intelligent people quite capable of at least, local self government. The educated people of the islands, and by that term I refer to those who can read and write Spanish, are of a particularly high class, many of them having enjoyed the advantages of higher education and their fathers before them for two hundred years. General MacArthur and Whittier, Dr. Schurman, Hon. John Barret, ex-Minister to Siam, Admiral Dewey and the educators now in the islands have all given testimony as to the education and intelligence of the people and have all practically declared them capable of representation in a legislative assembly of their own; and this would be particularly true were their government to be organized with an upper chamber, the members of which were appointed by the President. The claim that it is necessary to take a census is simply a ruse to

permit the disposal, to favored capitalists, of the franchises and grants in the islands before the people have a voice in such disposition. As an example of the methods which are being followed there, the first railroad, which will be built with the Filipino's money, is to be constructed from Manila up to a place in the mountains which will be used solely as a place of recreation by the American residents during the heated term. It will serve no industrial purpose whatever. It is all distressing. The exploitation of the islands by favored corporations, if the administration's policy is successful, will be a disgrace to the fair name of this country. Yes, I shall make a speech on the subject as will a number of democratic senators.

"As to the conduct of the American troops on the islands, that too is a disgrace. Take the report of the governor of Batangas in which he shows that one third of the population of acclimated natives have died during the last year of 'malaria.' I am afraid that if the administration were not systematically suppressing the facts that form of malaria would be spelled 'starvation.'

"Yes, I shall offer one amendment which I sincerely hope will be adopted. It will provide that any American corporation, company or individual who shall make any contract for slaves or slave labor, shall forfeit all its rights, grants and franchises. I am credibly informed that there are American syndicates which have contracted with the Moro chiefs for the performance of labor on certain rubber plantations by the slaves belonging to such chiefs."
