#### OUR RALEIGH LETTER.

RALEIGH, N. C., April 21.

The poll tax question is creating a great deal of interest just now among the politicians, professional matter. and otherwise. There are less than ten days in which to pay this tax, as required by the new election law, and yet probably less than one-half the voters in many counties have complied with the law in this respect. The news from Guilford county for instance, is to the effect that at the end of last week some 3,000 voters, white and black, had not paid their poll tax. ### A Quarrel Ends Fatally.

Henry Stocks, a farmer living in the Hull section of Greene county near Snow Hill, is confined in the Greene county jail, charged with killing Henry Weber, a young man who was in his employ." Stocks and Weber quarrelled, the result of a misunderstanding about some work being done. The lie was passed and Stocks struck Weber with a pair of kauckles. Shortly after the difficulty Stocks went before a magistrate and submitted to an affray, being discharged, a small fine was imposed. In the meantime Weber was enroute to Snow Hill. On reaching the home of Mrs. B. Moore, his sister, he went in, expiring soon after. Hearing of Weber's death, Sheriff Edwards hastened to the home of Stocks and arrested him. All the parties are white.
