Call at the Office.

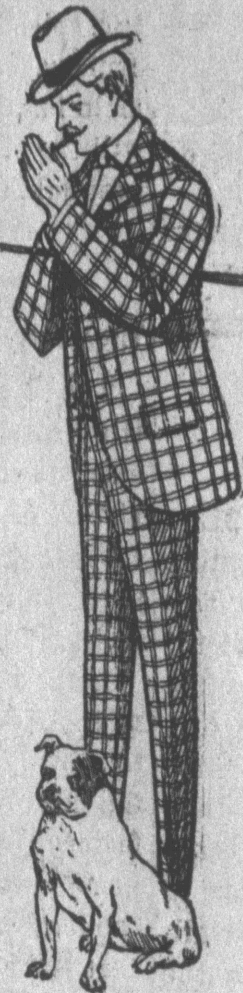

OUR RALEIGH LETTER.

Special Correspondent of Reflector.

RALEIGH, N. C., April 21.

The poll tax question is creating a great deal of interest just now among the politicians, professional and otherwise. There are less than ten days in which to pay this tax, as required by the new election law, and yet probably less than one-half the voters in many counties have complied with the law in this respect. The news from Guilford county for instance, is to the effect that at the end of last week some 3,000 voters, white and black, had not paid their poll tax. This sort of thing is prevalent all over North Carolina, and one hears on all hands inquiries and expressions of doubt as to whether the constitutional amendment is as good a thing as we Democrats expected it to be at the time of its adoption.

It is a rare thing to find either Democrats or Republicans nowadays discussing the passing of the Supreme Court on the constitutionality of the Amendment. The Republicans seem to be making no effort to get up a "case agreed" for the Supreme Court to pass upon. In fact, I have heard politicians of both parties say they were entirely satisfied "if the other fellow" was.

That makes the poll tax situation even more troublesome than before, and in some instances the prepayment of the tax by officeholders and candidates for office seems to be the only way out of the difficulty. It is a bitter pill for the politicians to take, but from general appearances take it they must.

The \$50,000,000 capital Imperial Tobacco Company of England, has formally entered this State and will compete with the American Tobacco Company. It will have buyers at each market. A license tax of \$1,000, State and county, was paid here, and the entry of the company officially made. The American is making things lively in England, and, in fact, Europe generally, and now the Imperial proposes to make things lively on this side of the water for its "American cousin."

Principal John E. Ray of the Institution for the Blind, states that the attendance at both institutions has during the present term broken all previous records. There are 175 white blind and 140 negro deaf mutes and blind. The health of all has been usually good. Auditor B. F. Dixon will deliver the annual address to the white blind June 11, which is the closing day.

They Keep Back Local Development.

The Newberne Journal very truly says that the residents of every town or city, are either assisting in its development or retarding its progress. There is no such thing as neutrality in this matter.

Local development, and its promotion, does not necessarily mean that every citizen must have a cotton mill, saw mill or some kind of factory, but it does mean that all home industries should receive all the local patronage.

It is the exceptional town that does not lose many thousands of dollars, yearly, because of the neglect of the citizens to trade at home.

And it is this buying away from home which starves to death the local trade, which keeps the local merchant in the small store building, because his business will not permit him to enlarge his premises.

And it also keeps the small merchant carrying small and poorly assorted stocks of merchandise, because to purchase larger stocks, means to have them left over, year after year.

It is this same neglect of local support which keeps the churches poor, and unable to administer to the wants of the community, as they would be capable of doing if their members gave as they were able to give to the support of the churches.

In the way of local institutions libraries, hospitals, charities, these should all receive a generous support. They are important factors in every city's development and as such demand a liberal support.

Another local factor in every town or city's progress and development, and a most important, is the proper maintenance of its news papers.

Success and prosperity has never

come to any community, which failed to give generous and unqualified support and patronage to its home papers.

There are citizens who borrow the local paper from a neighbor. There are merchants who will not advertise in the local paper, and there are merchants who will not advertise in a home paper, but will in an outside paper. And there are citizens who buy outside newspapers, refusing to take the local paper, but who will criticize the home paper for being small in size and poor in extent of its news.

Here are the elements in a community which keep back its development, and yet are surprised that their town does not advance in business and prosperity, and cannot understand that they are the bulwark which keeps down all educational, social, moral and mercantile advancement.

Every citizen in a community is either advancing its best interests, or keeping back the advancement of these interests. There is no middle ground to occupy. It is for or against the community's interests, and every citizen is personally responsible.
