Largest Wholesale Grocers in Eastern Carolina.

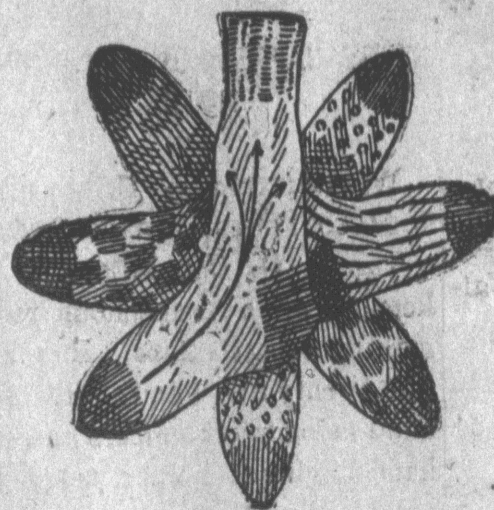
Greenville has such a quiet way of moving along that the outside world does not realize the magnitude of business done here. THE REFLECTOR has found that what it believes to be the largest wholesale grocery business in Eastern North Carolina is done right here in Greenville by the Greenville Supply Company.

While making our usual trip to the depot this morning we noticed such a hustle of business in their place that we dropped in to see what was going on and to ask some questions. Mr. E. B. Higgs showed us through and cheerfully answered all questions. We found them with a large stock of all kind of goods needed by retail grocers and they are doing an immense business. Besides supplying home merchants and those in the county, they ship large quantities to other towns. Their books show shipments made this week to Kinston, Scotland Neck, Tarboro, Rocky Mount, Whitakers, Enfield, Elm City, Fremont, Goldsboro, Mt. Olive, Selma, Smithfield, Benson, Four Oaks, Dunn, and other places. This gives some idea of the territory they cover.

They handle the very best lines of goods, representing such concerns as Swift & Co. of Chicago, the largest provision packers in the world; the Lynchburg Milling Co. of Lynchburg, Va., who lead in the product of meal; Thoman & Bro., of Lansing, Mich., whose fine flour is known everywhere, and others of equal prominence.

Mr. Higgs also told us that so far this year—in a little less than four months—the Greenville Supply Co., had sold 30 car loads of meal, between 500 and 600 barrels of sugar, many car loads of flour and meats, and other goods in proportion. In fact, he said, the outlook is that his firm will sell \$200,000 worth of goods this year. Taking their business all together we do not believe any wholesale grocers in Eastern North Carolina can surpass them. They keep two salesmen on the road much of the time. Such a business is worth a great deal to Greenville.

The Potato and Onion Crop.

Washington, April 19.—The
Census Bureau has issued a report
showing that in 1899 the total
number of farms reporting Irish
potatoes was 2,836,204, with
2,938,952 acres and a product of
273,328,307 bushels valued at
\$98,387,614. The total number of
farms reporting sweet potatoes
was 1,001,878, with 537,447 acres
and a product of 42,526,696 bush-
els, valued at \$19,876,200. The
largest yield was in North Caroli-
na, which had 68,730 acres and a
product of 5,781,587 bushels, val-
ued at \$2,119,956; Georgia follows
with 70,620 acres and a product
of 5,087,674 bushels, valued at
\$2,354,360. The other principal
States are Virginia with 40,681
acres and a product of 4,470,601
bushels, valued at \$1,820,188;
Alabama with 50,865 acres and a
product of 3,427,386 bushels, val-
ued at \$1,687,046. South Carolina
with 48,831 acres and a product of
3,369,957 bushels, valued at \$1,
538,505; Texas, with 63,561 acres
and a product of 3,299,135 bush-
els, valued at \$1,689,015.

The total number of farms re-
porting onions was 214,360 with
47,983 acres and a product of 11,
791,121 bushels, valued at \$6,676,
625. Farms reporting vegetables
other than potatoes and onions
numbered 8,515,470, having 2,
115,545 acres and a valuation of
the product of \$113,333,533.

"A National Evil"

One of the peculiar, strange
things among northern church
papers is their proneness to fail to
understand the southern situation.

They blunder when ever they

Read this from the Boston Congre-
gationalist: "North Carolina,
Wyoming and Colorado citizens
lynched negroes last week. The
time for sectional criticism on this
matter has passed. It is a nation-

al evil." The brief comment of
the Charlotte Standard is to the
point exactly: Ex cty so. And
a national evil can only be cured
by national protest against the
crime which lynching avenges."

People in the north, even in New
England, will go as the south does
under equal provocation. It they
had 8,000,000 of negroes, and Bos-
ton was blessed with 100,000 or
more, the whites would hang as
freely in 1902, as Massachusetts
hanged most cruelly old women
once as witches. The Messenger

for years has told the better class
of negroes and the ignorant north-
ern encouragers of rapes and mur-
ders in the south, that if they
would cease to defend scoundrels
and cause the crimes to cease that
Judge Lynch's occupation would
be gone and the "court in the
woods" adjourn sine die. And all
this would happen. Lynchings
are indeed a "national evil" and
not strictly southern.—Wilmington
