The debate on the Philippine bill, which still occupies the attention of the Senate, was marked by a very able speech by Senator Bacon, of Georgia, on Tuesday in The Remedy Is Free To All Who the course of which the Senator compared the concentration camps in the Philippines with those established by Weyler in Cuba. This bill, which conveys to the company named funds and privileges estimated as being worth nearly \$7,000,000 provides for the erection of a "union" depot and the elevation of railroad tracks within the city limits. It is the second measure in favor of which Senator Hanna has seen fit to speak at this session of Congress, the first having been the Ship Subsidy bill.

The House, after days of consideration, has at last passed the Naval Appropriation bill. An amendment which makes it illegal to purchase any copies of Maclay's history for use in the Naval Academy at Annapolis was adopted and also one changing the title of what are now "uaval cadets" to "midshipmen". The most significant feature of the debate which led to the prohibition of the Maclay history was the statement of Representative Dayton, of West Virginia, that after the record of the Schley Court of Inquiry had been read by the members of the House there might be a Congressional investigation of Admiral Schley's case. This is considered a direct affront to the President who has ordered that the Schley affair be considered closed.

A BRICK PLANT.

Would Pay Handsomely in Greenville.

As much building as is going on in Greenville all the time, it does look like some of our people would see the need, as well as profit, of establishing a plant here for making brick. Every year hundreds of thousands of brick are shipped here, while we believe they could be made just as cheap at home, save the freight to the consumer, and give employment to a large number of hands.

Take the sash, door and blind factory as an example. For years Greenville had to depend on getting all these building materials from elsewhere. Finally the Greenville Manufacturing Co. was organized and went to making these things, and now they have one of the most convenient and best paying enterprises in Greenville.

And it will be the same thing if a brick making plant is established. It will stimulate building by making material easier to get and will prove a paying investment for those who engage in it. Somebody start for a brick plant, and don't be long about it.
