Foundations are being laid for the new dormitory of the Winterville High School for boys and the same will be completed before the opening of the next session.

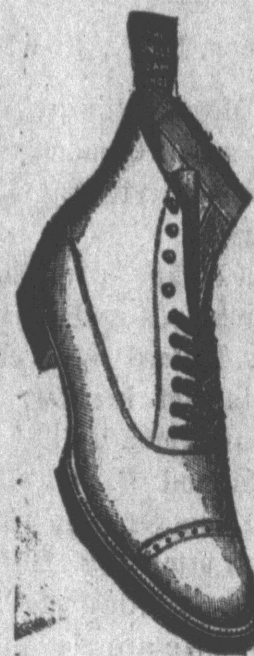

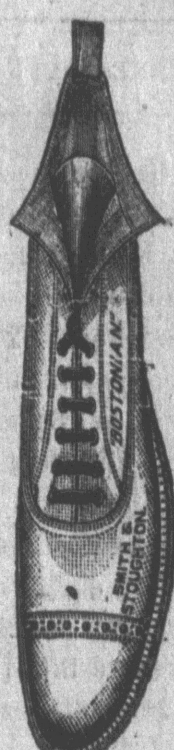

The Greene county Democratic convention held Saturday endorsed Claude Kitchin for Congress, E. C. Beddingfield for corporation commissioner, J. Y. Joyner for superintendent of public instruction, and J. E. W. Suggs for the state senate. For chief justice, Judge Walter Clark was practically endorsed, having received fifty-two of the fifty-eight votes of the convention. For associate justice Connor received fifty-two and Brown two. For solicitor of the Third judicial district, Larry I. Moore received fifty and a half and D. L. Ward seven and a half.—Kinston Free Press.

The Jones county convention gave Mr. Moore 14 votes and Mr. Ward 4. Counting Pitt for Mr. Moore enough counties have already held convention to assure his nomination for Solicitor, with Pamlico and Carteret yet to hold theirs. He will get the greater part of the vote in both those counties which will give him the nomination by a large majority.

Call for State Convention.

To the Democratic Voters of North Carolina:

In pursuance of a resolution passed by the State Democratic Executive Committee, at its meeting in the city of Raleigh on the 25th day of March, 1902, notice is hereby given that the State Convention of said party will be held in the city of Greensboro on the 16th day of July, 1902.

This convention is called for the purpose of nominating a candidate for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, two candidates for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, and one member of the North Carolina Corporation Commission; also a candidate for Superintendent of Public Instruction, and for the transaction of such other business of the party as may be brought before the convention.

In compliance with its terms, I call your attention to the following resolution adopted at the aforesaid meeting of the Democratic Executive Committee, to wit:

"Resolved, That the Chairman of this Committee shall in his call for the next State Convention state that said convention will determine whether the Democratic party will choose its candidate for United States Senator by primary, by the Convention, or otherwise."

Each county is allowed in the said State Convention one vote for every one hundred and fifty Democratic votes cast in the last election for Governor and fraction over seventy-five.

It is earnestly desired that each county shall be fully represented.

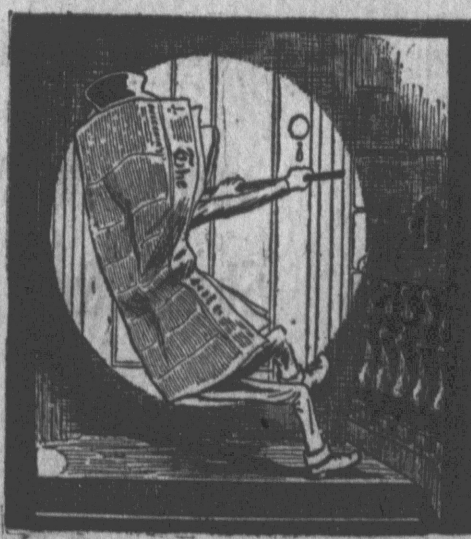
