#### ANOTHER AYDEN FIRE.

Block of Buildings Destroyed Sunday Morning.

At about 1:15 o'clock Sunday morning the town of Ayden, 10 miles south of Greenville, was visited by another disastrous fire, destroying property to the value of \$12,000, with a little less than \$1,000 insurance. It was just four weeks, almost to the hour, since that town had a fire in which the losses were about \$40,000 with only about \$9,000 insurance.

This last fire, like the former, is supposed to be of incediary origin. It started in the rear of J. W. Taylor's jewelry store and could not be checked until several buildings had been destroyed. It was only by most heroic efforts that the large stores of J. W. Quinerly & Bro., W. M. Edwards & Co. and Cannon & Tyson were saved.


