#### TOWN MATTERS.

##### Proceedings of Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met Thursday night in accordance with requirement of town charter, all but one of the members being present.

The Tax Collector presented the insolvent tax list, which was allowed. The insolvent list on general tax amounted to only about \$103, which showed remarkably good collections. The list was ordered published.

The Finance Committee reported in hands of the Treasurer \$264.24 in general fund and \$66.34 in cemetery fund.

The Cemetery Committee for white cemetery reported eight lots sold and thirteen interments during the year.

The other standing committees had no reports to make.

The Chief of Police made report of collections during the month.

The matter that brought out most discussion was the Supreme Court's decision on the bond injunction and whether to proceed to refund the special taxes collected as interest on bonds and for graded school. Some favored issuing orders at once for refunding, while others thought best to postpone for further consideration. It was finally determined to hold a special meeting Monday afternoon at 5 o'clock, the last day the present Board can exist, and also to invite the incoming Board to meet and consult with them over the matter.

The reports of the Finance Committee and special accountant on the books of the Tax Collector and and Treasurer were also deferred to the special meeting Monday.

A petition of the Greenville Supply Co., to permit a railroad side track to extend across the street so as to reach their property, was laid on the table.

The account of L. I. Moore for \$150 for expenses incurred in going north trying to effect a sale of the bonds, which was presented and deferred at last, meeting was taken up again, and after considerable discussion the question was called for. The vote resulted in a tie—Aldermen Ficklen, Cobb and White voting to pay the bill, Aldermen King, Coward and Hooker voting against. The Mayor decided the question by voting to pay the bill.

The usual monthly accounts were allowed.

The Board was in session until nearly midnight.

C., on Thursday, July 10th, 1902, at 12 o'clock m., for the purpose of nominating a Democratic candidate for solicitor of said district.

## STAND FOR HIGHER MORALS.

### EDITOR REFLECTOR:

Now that the moral sense of the community, feeling itself so deeply outraged as to take summary measures to rid the town of one very objectionable and abominable character, the fact is suggested that there are men living in our midst whose lives are a disgrace to civilization and a damning shame to their race. There are men living in Greenville whose lecherous, beastly lives are defiantly pointed to by boys just merging from the knee pants stage as a justification of their own departure from the path of right. There are men in Greenville whose daily walk in life is an insult flagrantly flung in the face of every self-respecting man in the town, and while their shame, as a reeking crime against even decency is not so horrible to contemplate as the one perpetrated in our midst by the brutish wanderer from other parts, yet it is equally as shocking to the moral sense, and in its effect upon the young manhood of the town it is far more powerful and dangerous, because the one was committed by a comparative stranger without means and its hideous cruelty so aroused the indignation of the people that his departure was demanded without preliminary preparation, and the other by men of influence and means, gained no doubt by questionable methods, and the manner in which they are treated by their fellows is a premium placed upon debauchery and crime and an encouragement to others to do likewise.

So long as the recognized element of the eminently respectable citizenship give their endorsement to these degraded beings, who defy the laws of man and disregard the laws of God, just so long will the moral status of the community remain impure.

When a community finds itself face to face with a proposition demanding such prompt attention as the one with which our people had to deal last Monday, it is high time that they go a step further and create such a vigorous demand for healthy morals, as to make the town wholly undesirable as an abiding place for any such characters.

## Prohibition in North Carolina.

There are now forty seven counties in North Carolina that have no licensed saloons. There are five counties in which there are dispensaries and no saloons. This leaves forty-five counties in which there are saloons, and of this number twenty have saloons only in the county seat. Thus there are only twenty five counties in the State where the saloon has "free course" over the county. And that is going to be less before many more moons.

This is far better than it was ten years ago. The towns and counties are learning that they can do without the revenue and the crime that come from the saloon.

North Carolina is advancing Industrially and Educationally and with these onward sweeps for the well being of the old State it is indeed timely that she should be shaking off the licensed saloon. And she will!—Anti Saloon Workers.

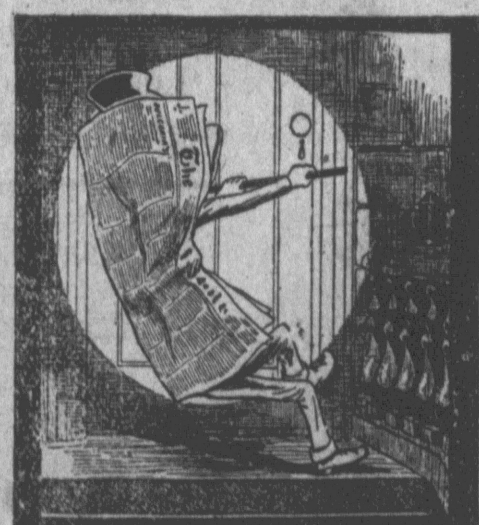
