CLARK, CONNOR, WALKER.

Named for Supreme Court Judges—
Beddingfield For Commissioner—
Joyner for Superintendent.

The Democratic State convention met at Greensboro Wednesday and nominated the following ticket:

For Chief Justice Supreme Court, Walter Clark, of Wake.

For Associate Justice of Supreme Court, from the East, Henry G. Connor, of Wilson.

For Associate Justice of Supreme Court, from the West, Platt O. Walker, of Mecklenburg.

For Corporation Commissioner, Eugene C. Beddingfield, of Wake.

For Superintendent of Public Instruction, James Y. Joyner, of Lenoir.

The convention was a large one, every county in the State being represented. Judge Clark's nomination was by an overwhelming vote on first ballot. Judges Brown and Connor were presented for the nomination for Associate Justice from the East, and the vote was very close, Connor winning by only five and one third votes on first ballot. Walker was nominated for Associate Justice from the west on third ballot. Beddingfield won for Corporation Commissioner on first ballot and Joyner was nominated by acclamation for Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Greensboro took care of the convention in splendid manner and the delegates were delighted with it as a meeting place.

GREAT TIME IN RALEIGH.

Raleigh is getting ready for a magnificent time next week. The North Carolina Firemen's Tournament will be held there on July 22, 23 and 24, and this means a series of thrilling events.

All the railroads give reduced rates. Raleigh will have its doors wide open and guarantee a jolly time to all. The fire departments of over thirty-two towns will be here, and there will be excitement of all kinds—such as steamer contests, hook and ladder contests, hand reel races, hose wagon races, egg races, sack races, hurdle races, wheelbarrow races, individual foot races, band concerts, great baseball games. Three days will be filled with enjoyment, and big money prizes are offered.

At night there will be lawn parties and vaudeville. The city is very attractive now. Pullen Park and the Zoo draw crowds. A visit to the Capitol and to the splendid State Museum should not be forgotten.

Remember the dates and go. President McNeill, of the State Fire Association, says this is going to be the greatest meeting yet held. The programme of the different events certainly promise great sport and enjoyment.

Excursion.

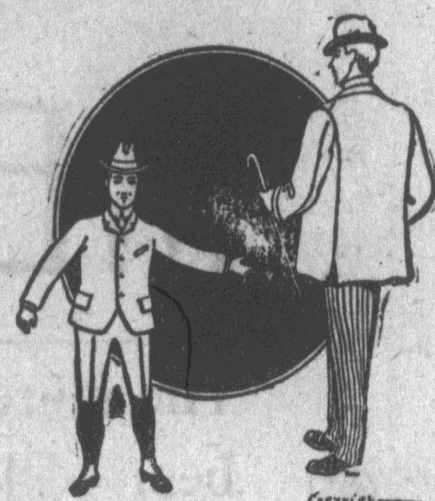

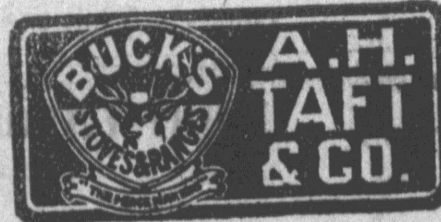
