#### Fire at Goldsboro.

Goldsboro, N. C., July 23.—Property estimated to be worth about \$20,000 was destroyed by fire out in Lamb's stables here tonight. It is stated that several horses were burned in their stalls.

The flames were discovered about 11 o'clock and spread with alarming rapidity. Dr. Creech's store and dwelling, J. W. Lamb's harness store, Robinson's ice house and Weill's warehouse were all blazing fiercely and the situation indeed looked desperate.

The people acted promptly and worked with a will. Though most of the firemen were in Raleigh attending the great tournament, the men who took their places acted with the coolness and celerity of veterans. As a result of their efforts the fire at 1:30 this morning had been gotten under control.

While fighting the flames Henry Tew had his foot severely injured by the wheel of the hook and ladder wagon passing over it, and Will Grainger sustained a sprained ankle. No other accidents are reported.

The amount of insurance on the burned buildings could not be learned this morning.

## FLEMING FOR SENATOR.

PACTOLUS, N. C., July 23, 1902.

EDITOR REFLECTOR:

While names are being mentioned for State Senator, I desire to name a man well qualified for the position, and who is entitled to it from a point of just merit as well as party service, and that man is Jim Fleming.

He has been active in the canvass of every campaign since his majority, and has indeed rendered great service in the interest of his party by giving his time, talent and money for the advancement of the cause of Democracy. I have been reliably informed that he has neither had nor called upon the Executive Committee for any of his campaign expenses, but has borne it himself for his pure and untarnished party interest.

He is an honest man, a conservative fighter, but bold, daring and independent in his fight for the cause he advocates. No charges have ever been made against him in the prosecution of his profession, and all know him to be a man of strong determination, strong conviction of principles, and at the same time conservative in all things.

One thing is certain to my mind, that is, that we should be careful in the choice of a Senator this year, and be sure we choose such as really and truthfully favor these, the two burning issues in the coming campaign.

We should also be careful to choose able and conservative men to make the fight for us upon these issues.

It seems to me we need a lawyer and a good one to represent us in the Senate, and we all know Jim Fleming as a lawyer of recognized ability, unretiring in any fight he undertakes. He is a Pitt county boy raised on a farm, and is therefore allied with the farming interest. By his own zeal and energy

he has paved his way to success, having built up for himself a good law practice. And I can say unequivocally that he is not only deserving, but no more suitable, more capable, more honest, nor more conservative man could be named by our convention. Therefore let us go with our hands untied and nominate James L. Fleming by acclamation. M. T. SPIER.

Fifteen couples participated in the pleasures of the evening and all expressed themselves as being most delightfully entertained.

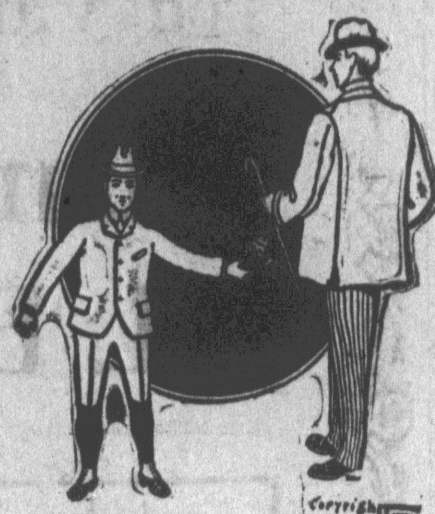
